John Ruskin, the great essayist and philosopher of the last century, once sat with a friend in the dusk of an evening and watched a lamp-lighter, torch in hand, lighting the street lights on a distant hill. Very soon the man's form was no longer distinguishable in the distance, but everywhere he went he left a light burning brightly. "There," said Ruskin, "that is what I mean by a real Christian. You can trace his course by the light that he leaves burning. It is our job to keep the light burning."

Strawberry Shortcake Is Sheer Joy To Us All

It pleases July to carpet now the pastures with the low white clover, sweet for the cattle-kind to eat, sweet too for trim honeybees to pliff, and to adorn the hunting grounds of robins intent on the cares of their household. We, as do, we suspect other Island farmwives these summer days find more than entertainment in attending to our present cares! We must plan and cook and clean and prepare according to our lights and limitations those foods best suited to our household.

We must consider such questions as to whether we should use the eggs now in goodly supply, in some wholesome and attractive serving, or swap them for a tin of this or that from the grocer's shelves which a turn of the wrist will present at the table. And naturally being of an ancient order of farmwives constrained to use the offerings of the farm as much as possible, we incline to the former practice.

We respect now the trout the lads bring up from the fishing. The fish from the fishman's smart truck. The lobster too on occasion... and the clams that may be had for the digging.

So we take care to include fish in our summer meals finding it often more favored than meats. The gifts of the gardens too are now the farmwives' boon—the crisp new head of lettuce, the emerald green of the onion-tops James enjoys lightly salted, a sprinkle of sugar added to accent the flavour and a dash of vinegar over all; radishes for youngsters' enjoyment, the ruby-red of young beets, and the greens so popular with most of the family. Jeanie promises to save some to can to have them in a tasteful change of vegetable-ware when the crisp frosts of winter white-rim the panes.

Now too, as did also great-grandmother subnominated a d womanly garbed in her day, we may gather if we are fortunate the wild strawberries, or else obtain the cultivated from some commercial-garden or store to fill a craving of the season. It is strange too that appetites trained to have them fresh or frozen in other months of the year seem to enjoy them best at this time.

"What are you making?" one of the small fry will be curious at our door these days. "Not" with a pleased smile, "strawberry shortcake! and will you save a

chuckle of sheer joy "there's a ways room for an extra piece of it!" So we make strawberry shortcake. It may be of sweetened but suit dough or at a fancy, according to a basic tea-cake recipe of a cake-mix. Served with ice cream we are regarded with the respect given a cook who has found her way direct to her household's heart!

Strawberry shortcake, and Madonna lilies bloom. Delphinium thrust promising spikes heavenward. And the young honeysuckle, set to climb toward an eave, blossoms goldenly as these do we are told down in "Ole Kaintuck". And summer full and lovely smiles all over the countryside so with a poet of years ago "Let us, one and all, be contented with our lot."

July is here this morning and the sun is shining hot. Oh let us fill our heads up with the glory of the day. And banish ev'ry doubt and care and sorrow far away! Whatever be our station, with Providence for Guide. Such fine circumstance ought to make us satisfied! For the world is full of roses, and the roses full of dew.
