THE METHODIST GEN. CONFERENCE.

Discussion on the Superannuation Question.

PROPOSAL OF RETIREMENT AFTER FORTY YEARS.

Gives Rise to a Warm Debate—Proposal Finally Lost.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

TORONTO, Sept. 17.—The Methodist General conference was chiefly occupied yesterday, with the superannuation reports.

Rev. D. Chambers caused a warm debate by proposing that ministers who have been forty years in effective service should have permission to go on the superannuation list by simply electing to do so.

Some hot speeches for and against the proposal were made, the conference deciding against the proposal, and enacting that such ministers must pass a medical examination before being granted superannuation.

Ministers leaving the ministry will hereafter get a commutation of fifty per cent instead of a return of their payment to the superannuation fund in full. The conference held that they had an insurance benefit while in the fund.

Spain Votes For Peace

MADRID, Sept. 15.—Both houses of the Cortes have passed the bill sanctioning the signing of the peace protocol. The vote on the bill sanctioning the signing of the peace protocol was 171 to 43. The Government has decided to suspend the session of the Cortes to prevent a repetition of the violent scenes that have occurred in the Senate.

HOME NEWS FROM ABROAD.

The Lake Winnipeg Leaves To-day.

WILL CALL AT CHARLOTTETOWN EN ROUTE.

Will Probably Arrive Monday—What Her Cargo Will Be.

MONTREAL, Sept. 17.—The Beaver Line R. M. S. Lake Winnipeg, which leaves Montreal today will be the first steamer with cold storage to call at Prince Edward Island and then proceed to England.

She will take a shipment of 5,000 boxes of cheese, besides butter and eggs, 800 sheep and 100 lamb, from the Island. Prince Edward Island expects to ship some fifty thousand boxes of cheese this season.

ON THE BRINK OF A CRISIS.

Trouble Over the Dreyfus Affair.

A MILITARY COUP D'ETAT IS FREELY CONJECTURED.

President Faure Said to be Acting the Part of Dictator.

PARIS, Sept. 15.—France is on the brink of the gravest crisis since the birth of the third republic. The situation is briefly this: Premier Brisson and all the members of the cabinet with the exception of Curliadin, minister of war, and possibly Lockroy, are convinced of the absolute necessity of revision in the Dreyfus case in the interest alike of justice and of the state. Brugere has signified his willingness to take the portfolio of war and accept revision. At Saturday's meeting of the cabinet a decision will be taken and it is almost certain that revision will be decreed. President Faure has caused it to be rumored that he will resign if it is granted. No one believes that he will resign, but every one sees that the threat to do so is a desperate expedient to get rid of one blow of Brisson's cabinet and it is fondly hoped, of revision also. But Faure's unconstitutional action in directly interfering with responsibility in the cabinet affords an example of the lawlessness in high places which is the first step toward revision. He is accused of dictatorship, and if he succeeds in destroying the Brisson cabinet it will be the act of a dictator. The Dreyfus agitation can now be suppressed only by the exercise of arbitrary power. President Faure has made himself the champion of the army and its tainted chiefs, who will do anything to avoid the exposure that revision would entail, and they are ready to place that arbitrary power at his hands. A military coup d'etat is therefore freely conjectured as the probable outcome of the crisis should President Faure's effort to bulldoze the Brisson cabinet fail.

PARIS, Sept. 15.—The Matin today says that while the cabinet is divided as to the authenticity of certain documents in the Dreyfus case, all the ministers admit they were not communicated to the defense. Hence, "the paper adds, a revision of the trial will bring up the question of the responsibility of Gen. Mercier, who was minister for war at the time Dreyfus was convicted. This is the reason for the hesitancy of the cabinet.

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A DOZEN SEATS ARE VACANT.

Possibly of a General Election Soon Not Unlikely.

OTTAWA, Sept. 15.—At last it is officially announced that Judge Dugas, of Montreal, has been appointed to succeed Judge McGuire in the Yukon district, the order-in-council having been signed by his Excellency the Governor General. Mr. Beausoleil, M. P., for Berthier, will succeed Judge Dugas, as Police Magistrate at Montreal. This will make another vacancy in the House of Commons, and there are now so many vacancies owing to deaths and appointments, that it will not be surprising if there is a dissolution and a general election before another session. There are now nearly a dozen seats vacant, or about to become so, through appointments to office, and therefore more than a dozen members who "want to get something," and will insist upon having it before another session. The Government will scarcely want to have fifteen or twenty bye-elections, and the possibility of a general election being sprung on the country in January is not so unlikely as may be supposed.
