

Canadian Golf Open Has 3-Way Leadership Tie

KITCHENER, Ont. (CP) — A change of sub-par golf Thursday finally worked out into a three-way tie at 136 for leadership in the Canadian Open at the half-way mark.

Veteran Henry Ransom of St. Andrews, Ill., finishing late, shot his second successive 68 to join Fred Hawkins of El Paso, Texas, who fired a five-under-par 66, and Doug Ford, leading pro money winner from Mahopac, N.Y., who shot 67.

The Westmount Golf Club course took a shelling, with upward of 40 golfers breaking par compared with only 16 Wednesday. The upsurge was undoubtedly helped by accommodating officials of the Royal Canadian Golf Association. As something of a gesture of international goodwill, the officials obligingly made the course easier on Wednesday.

The day's hottest round was a blazing six-under-par 65 fired by young Gay Brewer of Cincinnati, who joined a select runner-up group at 137. Brewer lambasted the par-35 front nine with a 30. His 65 was reported as a record, by one stroke, for competitive play.

FOUR OTHERS
With him at 137 were Ed Oliver of Canton, Mass., co-leader with Ransom Wednesday, adding 69 Thursday; Pat Schwab of Dayton, Ohio, with a second round 66; Bill Usasper of Bonita, Calif., with 67 and Bo Winger of Odessa, Texas, with 66.

Low Canadian was fast-talking, fast-playing Norman, home town pro and twice Canadian amateur champion, who shot 69 for a 36-hole total of 138. At the same level, two strokes behind the leaders, were John Knight of Springfield, Ill., George Bayer of Los Angeles and Marty Furgol of Leont, Ill.

The par-creating kept the ultimate leadership in doubt until nearly the whole field of nearly 150 had finished. It began with the first threesome and kept going merrily along.

After the about course conditions Wednesday, the greens and fairways were cut and the pins were placed in preferred positions.

When Doug Ford finished, he cracked: "All the cry babies ought to be Matisse. I mean, there wasn't anything wrong with the course. As for myself, I'm going good now and playing like gang-busters."

THREE EAGLES
Were fired by Brewer. Winger shot three eagles were scored at the 296-yard par-four first hole, apparently another result of the

daintily up of the course. They and Leo Blagetti of St. Paul, Minn., who finished with 69 in the 140 bracket.

Johnny Henrick of the Ottawa Gatineau Club, one of the smallest pros in the field, came in late with 67. He moved up into the 139 bracket with Joe Conrad of San Antonio, Texas, Mike Felchick of Mahopac, N.Y., and Gerry Kesselring, Kitchener, playing out of Toronto Downsview. Kesselring, familiar with the course, fired a 69 to go with Wednesday's 70.

Hawkins was the first man to whip through with a 66 to snatch the lead from Ransom and Oliver who were playing well behind. Freddie shot six pars and went over regulation only once. He birdied the first, third and eighth to make the turn in 32. He bog-

ged another birdie at the 10th, but at the long par-five 11th took a six after pushing his drive into the woods. He recovered with two quick birdies and finished with pars.

HAS WON \$36,000
Ford, with more than \$36,000 this year as leading money winner on the tour, was never over par all the way. He had three birdies on the front and his fourth at the 11th, followed by a straight par run.

Ransom, 46-year-old veteran, likewise was never a victim of par and played with the same steadiness he showed Wednesday, chased course or not. He birdied the first two holes and got his next at the short 12th.

Brewer, who was a one-day sensation at the Canadian Open last year in Montreal with 65, eagled the 296-yard first hole by running down a 35-foot putt after hitting the green with his drive. He birdied the third, fifth, eighth and 11th.

The 25-year-old Cincinnati pro, on the tour 18 months, might have created real havoc among the field if more of his birdie putts had dropped. At the 18th his 30-foot bid just rimmed the cup. It didn't break at the 15th where he hooked his drive into trees. The ball bounced out on the fairway. He reached the green in two and two-putted for a par.

Brewer had 30 putts on his round, 14 on the front nine and

16 coming back. He has never won a PGA-sponsored tournament.

HELD LEAD
For a while Pat Schwab, 225-pounder who stands six-two, held the lead with 137. It didn't stand up long under the assault on par. He was out in 32 and back in 34 for his 66, running down birdie putts of three to 20 feet.

Oliver made a bold bid to hang on to his first-round lead. He was out in 34 and needed another 34 to tie. A six at the long par-five 11th cost him the stroke that would have created a four-way tie. He came down the back nine in 35, with birdies at the 13th and 18th.

Mo Norman, with swarms of supporters following the popular Kitchener golfer, went par to the eighth where he dropped a four-foot birdie putt. He played his second shot at the 41-yard ninth four feet from the pin and was down in birdie three.

Mo parred the 10th and 11th, birdied the 12th with an eight-foot putt and the 13th with a seven-footer. His one miss at par came at the 17th where he three-putted. His second putt was only 18 inches from the cup. It didn't fall. "I didn't line it up; it was too easy. I'm happy; I missed one in 36 holes; I'm happy," ratted off Mo.

The field was cut Thursday night for the third round to 100 low scores and ties. The cutoff point was 151.

Montana & Bernard Win Tag Match; Fred Atkins Beaten

About 500 excited wrestling fans watched two hours of sparkling entertainment last night at the Sports Arena in Charlottetown. The fans screamed and boomed when tough Bull Montana and his partner Big Jim Bernard won the third and deciding fall of their match with popular Frank Valois and Emil Dupre, but they cheered when Len Hughes defeated Fred Atkins in the main event of the night.

In the main event, tough Fred Atkins took advantage of Len Hughes' bloody eye which he received earlier in the match and battered the helpless Hughes around the ring until he decided it was time to pin him. Hughes came back strong on the second fall and made short work of the Australian champion, pinning him to the mat in only a matter of minutes. Atkins however, pounced on Hughes early in the second fall and by way of rough tactics soon had Hughes pinned in the ropes. Atkins proceeded to beat Hughes and referee, Fred Hayter, warned Atkins to move away, with no result. Hayter had the bell rung and held up Hughes hand which signified a victory for the game wrestler from Northampton, Mass.

In the other match of the night, Big Jim Bernard and Bull Montana battered plucky Emil Dupre and his partner Frank Valois in the third fall of their best two out of three falls match. Montana won the first fall by pinning you a young Emil Dupre after he had tossed him around the ring for some time. Emil came in looking for revenge in the second fall and soon succeeded in pinning Montana to even up the match at one fall each.

The third fall was the roughest of them all Montana and Bernard doing most of the dirty work. At one stage in the fall Dupre, a skinned knee of his, was bleeding and went out after him and resumed fighting outside the ropes some unknown fans started to annoy Bernard and he picked up a chair and hit one of the fans with it. Dupre picked up the chair and chased Bernard back into the ring where he teamed up with Montana and resumed their rough tactics. Bernard and Montana eventually came out the winners, much to the dismay of the fans who hurled everything from paper to bottle tops at them as they left the ring.

No Pheasants For Release

The Guardian is informed by the president of the P.E.I. Fish and Game Association, Mr. Ralph Jenkins, that there will be no pheasants released this year due to an infection in the breeding stock which resulted in the death of all young birds within one week of hatching.

The director of veterinary services, Dr. George Fisher, and his staff have had great success in treating this particular disease among domestic poultry, but apparently wild birds do not respond to treatment as readily as domestic types, and in order not to jeopardize the farm poultry and game birds the order was given to destroy all the birds including the breeding stock.

This was carried out during the past week, and no definite plans for further Pheasant propagation are known at the present time.

Dodgers And Braves Win Cards & White Sox Lose

BROOKLYN (AP)—Duke Snider belted a pair of two-run homers and Brooklyn's Junior Gilliam and Cincinnati's Raul Sanchez belted each other in a pip of a player brawl Thursday night as the Dodgers brawled their way to a 6-3 victory over the Philadelphia Phillies.

Snider's 18th home run behind the Brooks from behind for good to cap the brilliant seventh, which had erupted into a two-fisted belling bout after Gilliam hit the dirt ducking one of Sanchez's pitches.

Junior attempted a drag bunt (it popped foul) on the next pitch, then tore into the rookie Redleg right-hander when he rushed off the mound to field the ball. They went at it in a punching tangle on the baseline with players from both benches spilling out onto the field and four or five from each club squaring off in side fight.

When things apparently had been quieted, Dodger Charlie Neal punched Redleg Don Hoak, an ex-Dodger, and Hoak charged the Dodger dugout in pursuit of Neal, who had been swept away by teammates.

Neal, Gilliam, Sanchez and Hoak were thrown out of the game—a development that forced Dodger manager Walt Alton to shift first baseman Gil Hodges to second base to fill in for Gilliam. It was Hodges' first appearance at second in 13 years of play in organized ball. He had no fielding chances in the two innings left.

DETROIT (AP) — Boston Red Sox scored two runs in the 10th inning after pitcher Lou Sletzer committed two errors on one play and defeated Detroit Tigers 9-7 Thursday in a rain drenched contest that lasted almost four hours. Boston led from the first inning until the last of the eighth when Ray Boone homered for Detroit with a man on base and knotted the score at 7-7.

In the top of the 10th Frank Malzone walked and Billy Conso sacrificed. Sletzer kicked the ball in trying to pick it up, allowing Conso to reach first, then threw low for a second error as Malzone scooted to third. Duke Maas replaced Sletzer and retired one man but pinch hitter Gene Stephens singled, past the drawn-in infield for one run and Jimmy Piersall lifted a long sacrifice fly that scored another. The Tigers put two men on base

and scored three on an error and scored when MacKinnon belted a single down the third base line. Kane got his third hit of the night in the fourth inning when he got a triple but Simmons put out the fire by retiring Shephard.

The Dodgers got to MacKinnon in the first inning, MacDonald started the uprising when he singled and stole second, he moved to third on an error and scored on another error.
