## \$900,000 Spent For Oscar Awards

By BOB THOMAS HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Oscar pushed into his fourth decade Monday night, out to prove that there's life in the old boy yet.

The 31st Motion Picture Academy Award, were set to be handed out at the Pantages Theatre in a two-hour telecast. As though in defiance of reports of its death, the movie industry shelled out \$900,000 to make it the best show ever.

Producer Jerry Wald was aiming for the kind of hit created by Kirk Douglas and Burt Lancaster in their song-and-dance act last year. The two stars were to repeat in another routine to open the show.

Previewers predicted a hit in a number called 'It's Bully Not to Be Nominated, done in Cockney tones by Joan Collins, Dana Wynter and Angela Lansbury.

There were some last-minute changes. Alec Guinness couldn't make the trip from England to present the best actress award.

All but six of the 20 performer nominees were expected to be present. Sidney Poitier, Paul Newman, Arthur Kennedy and Maureen Stapleton are in New York and Wendy Hiller and Deborah Kerr are in Europe.

But even Spencer Tracy, who hates such affairs, agreed to attend. Burl Ives interrupted a Las Vegas engagement to make the affair.

Eddie Fisher was another Nevada escapee. He chose, with excellent logic, to sing the nominated song To Love and Be Loved. He also was to escort one of the nominees, Elizabeth Taylor. The trip would not interfere with his establishment of Nevada residence to obtain a divorce from Debbie Reynolds in six weeks.

## Maritime Leaders Extol J.O. Hyndman's Career

The leadership, integrity and keen intellect of the late J. O. Hyndman are extolled in tributes received by this newspaper yesterday from three other active Maritime leaders: A. Murray Mackay, chairman of the Maritime Transportation Commission; Dr. Frank MacKinnon, president of the Atlantic Provinces Economic Council; and W. R. Shaw, provincial leader of the Progressive Conservative party.

Mr. Hyndman, former president of the Maritime and Canadian Railway Association, died in Charlottetown late Sunday night. His funeral will take place this afternoon from St. Peter's Cathedral, services commencing at 2:30 p.m.

"It was with great sadness that the Maritime Transportation Commission learned of the passing of Mr. J. O. Hyndman," Mr. Mackay said. "With him, passes one of the most distinguished leaders of an era which has meant much to the Maritimes."

Dr. MacKinnon, former president of the Maritime Transportation Commission, said that the late Mr. Hyndman was a man of great vision and determination, and that he was a man who was devoted to the economic resurgence of the Maritimes which he loved so well.

"He contributed generously of his talents by serving with distinction on the Maritime Transportation Commission from the time of its reorganization in 1934 until 1940."

"In his work on the commission he proved himself not only an outstanding son of Prince Edward Island but indeed, as a leading citizen of the Atlantic region. His contribution to transportation will not soon be forgotten."

Mr. Shaw, provincial leader of the Progressive Conservative party, said that the late Mr. Hyndman was a man of great vision and determination, and that he was a man who was devoted to the economic resurgence of the Maritimes which he loved so well.

"The growth of the Maritime economy and the spirit of Maritime enterprise has always depended on the efforts of distinguished leaders," Dr. MacKinnon asserted. "One of these leaders was J.O. Hyndman, whose passing marks the close of a life of service and devotion to this province and its people."

"His knowledge of public affairs and determined advocacy of the Island's confederation rights, as well as his business activities and board of trade work were 'well known and widely appreciated', the president of APEC declared.

"It was an inspiration to all who participated with him in special projects such as the railway activities, the field of transportation," Dr. MacKinnon continued.

"A frank, kindly and interesting man, he will be greatly missed by all who knew him as a friend, a great Islander, and a great Maritimer, he will always be remembered by a generation who knew him as one of its most distinguished leaders."

"This passing," Mr. Shaw said, "removes from this province a man of outstanding worth. His was a keen, intelligent and investigative mind, and his findings on the transportation and economic problems facing this province were always constructive and all-embracing."

"Active on Maritime and provincial boards and commissions his voice in our interests carried respect and conviction. This province has not produced a greater champion for provincial rights and economic stability."

"In his chosen field of insurance he was a recognized and honored leader during his lifetime, but his activities always indicated a great, questing urge in many other endeavors."

"He was a fine friend of our farm people and made substantial contributions to the industry through his progressive farm practices at Fort La Joie."

"KINDLY, COURTEOUS" "Aside altogether from his many public activities, Mr. Hyndman was to all people a kindly, courteous gentleman. While strong in his convictions he was never prejudiced or narrow, but rather kindly and considerate."

"The death of John O. Hyndman has removed from our midst a citizen of high honor, integrity, loyalty and worth. The whole province has suffered a great loss in his passing."
