

MISCELLANEOUS.

Carlism is said to be cropping up in the Basque Provinces.

A Socialist congress will meet in Zurich during the year 1881.

The steamship "Great Eastern" has been safely undocked at Milford Haven.

Sir Henry Bossemer has been presented with the freedom of the city of London.

Earl Beaconsfield has returned to the Hugbenden tenants 20 per cent. of their rent for the past year.

At Londen, N. J., a few days ago, Ella Gibbs, aged 10, while milking, was trampled to death by an infuriated cow. The shock made Mrs. Gibbs dangerously ill.

A Liverpool crimp was lately sent to hard labour for one month for boarding a ship in dock without the permission of the master. He was charged under the new Merchants Shipping Act.

A despatch from St. Michael, Azores, says the British steamers "Robina" and "Benalla," from New Orleans, were wrecked inside the harbor during a hurricane. The S. S. "Stag" also went ashore, and is full of water. She has been surveyed and recommended to be sold.

The Marquis of Lorne, writing to the London "Army and Navy Gazette," urges the rising of a small sum, the interest of which shall be given yearly by the Governor General on the part of the auxiliary forces of Great Britain as a prize at the Dominion Rifle association meeting.

The New York craze over the appearance of Sara Bernhardt has resulted in the sale of tickets for the first six performances amounting to \$36,000. The speculators into whose hands they have mainly fallen are already selling them at heavy advances on the original prices of \$10 per ticket for a single performance. All this it must be remembered, before Sara has sailed from France.

One of the saddest incidents recorded in Port Neuf, Quebec, for some time past, occurred recently, when the parents of a young infant took it to church to be christened. On arriving at the church, and just before the ceremony began, the covering was taken from the child's face. It was dead. The parents in bringing the infant to church, had covered it up so closely that it had been smothered to death. Their grief can be imagined.

LORD NELSON.—An aged resident of Kent recalls an incident connected with Lord Nelson's visit to a school in Wimbledon, a short time before he went to take command of the fleet with which he gained the victory of Trafalgar. The admiral was very fond of boys, and when he visited the school the boys always got a holiday. On one of his visits, which took place at the dinner hour, he came into the dinner hall; the boys rose to salute him, when he told them to resume their seats, as he wanted to see them eat. They did so, while he walked round the table, much enjoying the sight. At another time, during a theatrical performance at the school by amateurs, Lord Nelson called one of the boys to him, where he remained during the evening, and while there admired the star on his coat. Lord Nelson endeavored to remove it for the boy, but, finding he could not do so, he took the sash of some order he was wearing and decorated the urehin.

USE OF STALE BREAD.—Make a dressing of meat—crumb it fine, turn hot broth over it, season, add butter and a well-beaten egg, or more, according to quantity. Make bread pudding—soak two hours in sweet milk, then beat eggs, sugar and spices and bake. I sometimes add fruit. Make biscuit—soak over night in sour milk, add well-beaten eggs, cornmeal and Graham flour to a batter and soda and salt, or bake on a griddle or a gem pan. Crumb fine and in the next omelet you make. Toast your bread; at a pan of milk on the stove but do not remove the cream from it; add butter and salt, dip the bread in this and send to the table for supper or breakfast. Crumb fine and put in your tomatoes when you are serving them. Pound fine, season and roll oysters or fish in them and fry in nice lard.

IN pursuance of an Act of the General Assembly of this Island, made and passed in the eighteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to Incorporate the Town of Charlottetown," and also in pursuance of an Act of the General Assembly of this Island, made and passed in the forty-third year of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled, "An Act to Incorporate the Town of Charlottetown, and all Acts amending the same," I do hereby give Public Notice than an election of

One Common Councilman,

to supply the vacancy in the office of Councilor for Ward No. Two in the said City, instead and place of WILLIAM KOUGHAN, Esquire, will be held on

SATURDAY,

the Sixteenth (16th) day of OCTOBER, A. D. 1880,

in the said Ward, and at the place following, that is to say:

At or near the Warehouse of Richard Heartz, Esq., fronting on Sidney Street, between Great George and Prince Streets; and at the said Election the Poll will be opened at nine o'clock in the forenoon, and continue open until five o'clock in the afternoon of the same day.

DESCRIPTION OF WARD.

Ward Number Two shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies south of Richmond Street and north of Dorchester Street.

NOMINATION DAY.

Act 43 Victoria, Cap. 5.—"Seven days before the time of any and every Election for Mayor or Councilors the persons or candidates for the office of Mayor or Councilor shall give their names in as such candidates to the City Clerk, and the City Clerk shall duly enter the names, residences and additions of such persons, together with the office and Wards for which they are candidates, and such entry, when made, shall be deemed nomination for such candidates. There shall be paid by each person so nominated for Mayor at the same time a fee of Ten Dollars, and by each person so nominated as Councilor a fee of Five Dollars, which sums shall go towards paying the cost of the Election. No person shall be qualified either for the office of Mayor or Councilor unless such nomination be made in manner and at the time aforesaid."

The time appointed for the nomination of candidates shall be from the time of Twelve at noon until the hour of Four o'clock in the afternoon of the day fixed for that purpose.

Qualification of Electors:—See Act 43 Victoria, Sections 20 and 63.

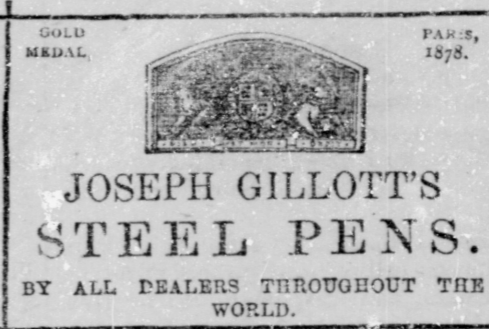
