

War Situation In Viet Nam Hampers Russian Plans

GEN WAR SITUATION MOSCOW (AP)—Soviet Premier Khrushchev said here the Viet Nam situation has limited the raising of Soviet living standards because the prime task is reinforcing the armed

forces. He accused the United States of raising a threat to world peace. "Any initiative genuinely directed at maintaining and strengthening peace will meet with a positive response and support on our part," he told the Soviet Communist party congress.

Outlining Soviet economic plans, Khrushchev said some goals had been reduced from production promised in 1970 by ousted premier Khrushchev.

Khrushchev said some of Khrushchev's targets were unrealistic.

The premier pictured the 1966-70 economic development plan, however, as promising improved living standards while continuing the tradition Soviet priority to heavy industry. The plan outline was published Feb. 20.

APPROVAL EXPECTED A summary of his speech in the Kremlin was released outside the closed session. The 4,619 voting delegates are expected to give his plan outline unanimous approval late this week. It will then form the Communist party's orders to the government, which carries out the party's will.

The priority of defence ran through Khrushchev's speech as a basic theme. He accused the U.S. of aggression in Viet Nam "which may expand at any moment and constitute a threat to world peace." Because of this, Khrushchev said "the Soviet government had to increase defence expenditures."

The summary gave no figures. Published budget figures show a five-per-cent increase for defence to about \$15,000,000,000 this year after decreases in recent years. But most western experts think a lot of defence spending is hidden in the budget. Khrushchev said the U.S. Congress had voted more than \$13,000,000,000 for the Viet Nam war alone.

"In the circumstances, we naturally cannot afford to relax our efforts in the defence sphere," he added.

CONSIDERS FORCES The Communist party leadership and the Soviet government will continue to "consider it their prime task to reinforce our armed forces," Khrushchev said. He also reiterated Soviet promises to aid Vietnamese communists "in the necessary proportions."

"If matters depended solely on ourselves," he said, "we would surely have made substantial cuts in our military spending and correspondingly greater capital investments in the peaceful branches of the national income."

Khrushchev accused the U.S. of imposing a harmful and dangerous arms race on the world. Then he offered to meet any peace initiative.

Khrushchev did not directly name, in the published summary, his predecessor as Soviet premier. But he blamed Khrushchev both for past failures and for setting too-high targets for 1970.

"In view of that in the new five-year plan somewhat lower targets are set in some branches for 1970 than those envisaged earlier," he declared.

Using the term subjectivism to refer to Khrushchev's methods, Khrushchev said the party "condemned subjectivism in deciding economic matters as an atheistic contempt for the data of science and practical experience."

The ouster of Khrushchev in October, 1964, "put an end to such methods of management," Khrushchev said.

Chilean Copper Price To Change

SANTIAGO, Chile (AP)—The government will readjust the price of Chilean copper at the most opportune and convenient time for the country, Minister of Mines Eduardo Simian said here.

Simian, after discussing the price of the metal with President Eduardo Frei, told reporters government technical bodies are making a study in this respect.

Chile, which produces more than 560,000 tons a year, sells copper in foreign markets at 42 cents a pound. In recent days rumors have circulated that the price would be raised four cents a pound.

Maine Congressmen Counter Opposition To Hydro Plan

WASHINGTON (AP)—Maine members of Congress have launched a counter attack on what they say is a move by private-utility, coal and oil interests to defeat the proposed hydroelectric development of the upper St. John River.

In a speech taped for Maine radio stations, Senator Edmund Muskie accused the coal industry of "talking out of both sides of its mouth" in advocating nuclear power instead of hydro power at the Dickey site in Maine, but opposing nuclear power generators for the Tennessee Valley Authority.

At the same time, representatives Stanley Tupper and William Hathaway wrote Maine's private electric utilities and their colleagues in Congress in efforts to break down arguments by the electric co.-ordinating council of New England against the \$227,000,000 Dickey-Lincoln School hydro project. Congress authorized the 794,000-kilowatt project last year and, after a fight, appropriated \$800,000 for planning in the year that ends June 30. The appropriations committee of the House of Representatives now is considering a \$1,200,000 budget request for continued surveys and more detailed planning in the fiscal year beginning July 1.

Muskie noted a recent newsletter of the National Coal Producers Conference urged the Tennessee authority not to buy nuclear power generators, arguing that nuclear power is "speculative and conjectural." The industry organization urged that nuclear power be "speculative and conjectural."

Muskie recalled that in last year's congressional fight against the Dickey-Lincoln project, the coal and oil groups joined with private electric companies in contending that nuclear energy is the answer to high power costs in New England.
