Council Settles impeachments

The Student Council held a meeting in the Robertson Library last Sunday night.

Leo Bradley, Mike O'Brien and Bill Morris were impeached as according to the Student Union Constitution, no councilor may miss three consecutive meetings in a row, or a total of four. Mike McKenna brought up the question of the fairness of the impeachment procedures, since accurate attendance had not been taken of all Council meetings this year. According to the constitution the recording secretary takes attendance, but as of the early part of the first semester there was not a recording secretary. Several of the minutes of the meetings recorded do not state the actual names of Councilors in attendance. It is known that several more members of the student council are guilty of this infraction, but they cannot be impeached since their names (were never written into the records.

Communications officer Elisabeth Burke reported to Council that the student directory which was to have been published by the Bathurst Printing Co. would cost more than the actual price approved by Council. The directory would have to be type set in another fashion costing approximately 900 dollars, this price was further reduced to \$620. A cost estimate has not yet been received by two

island printing companies- Council passed the motion that the Student Directory would not be printed this year, as it would cost too much.

Since according to the constitution, the publishing of the student directory is a duty pertaining to the Communications officer, Pat O'Brien asked on behalf of Council for Elisabeth Burke's resignation. Elisabeth informed Council that her resignation had been given to Derek Key, and she would resign as of the end of March. The question arose as to whether the Communications officer would receive her salary for the month. The motion was made by Comptroller Gerald McKenna and Treasurer Alan O'Keefe that Elisabeth would receive payment for the first two weeks of March. The motion was withdrawn and the matter was not solved. Discussion on the topic ceased and speaker of the Student Union Gordon Coffin summed up the situation by stating that he recognized some of the Councilor's wish for the Communications officer to resign, but should not have to, if it was her wish to remain in office as of the end of March. There were no impeachment procedures in effect so the matter was dropped.

In regards to the moving of the Student Union offices to the Barn no action will be taken as yet. Paul Currie inform-

ed Council that a number of years ago Pat Duffy, a former Pres. of the S.U., had made a verbal agreement with Mr. Dennis Clough of the University. The agreement was that until the Student Union had a new building the offices were to remain in the basement of Memorial Hall. The Student Union has been receiving pressure from the Director of Student Services, Jim Griffith and the House Committee of Memorial Hall to relocate their offices. Dennis Clough will have the final word on the matter.

A CUP conference will be held this weekend in Ottawa, and a delegate will be sent on behalf of the Cadre.

The Personnel Board brought several recommendations before Council. The first being that Gordon Coffin be accepted as Speaker of the S.U., the motion was approved. It was suggested that the former speaker Gail Murphy receive an honorarium of \$90.00, this motion was tabled. Some controversy arose as to whether the Cahirmaen of the Movie Club Andy Gallant and Garth Reeves should receive honorariums of \$15.00 each. The motion was tabled until the Treasurer of the S.U. Alan O'Keefe could look into the financial status of the Movie Club and report back to Council. At the beginning of the year 200 dollars was given to the Movie club.

It was passed by Council that the Honorariums for the Yearbook were not to be given out until last year's Yearbook had been delivered and given out to the students. The orientation committee will receive an honourarium of \$100.00.

During New Business the motion was passed that for the positions vacant on Council because of impeachments and resignations, these positions would be filled by the newly elected Councilors who were elected during the General Student Union Elections held in February. The vacancies would be filled by the Candidates who had the highest number of votes in that constituency.

The next Student Council meeting shall be held on Sunday, March, 27th.
