

Statement Clarified By S'side Magistrate

Magistrate J. H. Hinton, QC, issued a statement in police court yesterday regarding the newspaper reports in the Journal Pioneer and the Charlottetown Guardian as to a man who had been charged with private information laid under a misunderstanding, the Attorney General has pointed out that it has been quoted as saying "I would not have happened if there had been a Crown Prosecutor". "That statement was not made by me in that way, I would hardly have made such a statement, when I very well knew that the charge was laid some days before the resignation of the Crown Prosecutor became effective. I may say in explanation that after the charge in question was withdrawn, some casual remarks were made by me myself and defence counsel Bruce MacDonald and I agreed that the charge should be shown the importance of having a Crown Prosecutor and what the charge was about. "The reporters who wrote the story have taken my remarks out of context and should have checked with me before writing the statement they did". "I trust this will clarify this aspect of the matter."

ECM Bid Delay Poses Problem

LONDON (AP)—A two-month postponement of Britain's bid to join the Common Market had Monday the delicate task of maintaining his support. With support from West Germany, the government strove to put the best face possible on the postponement, reported brought on by French resistance to any concessions to some Commonwealth countries. A high government source denied reports from Common Market quarters in Brussels that negotiations for Britain's membership had broken down. He said the Brussels talks have progressed to a point where the Common Market's 12 ministers conference opening Sept. 10 will have an opportunity to consider a wide range of common market problems. Whether the Commonwealth prime ministers meet a second time when Britain's membership application to join the six-nation market is all butted up is something for the prime ministers themselves to decide, the source said.

Halifax Killebre On Slugging Free

NEW YORK (AP)—Harmon (Killer) Killebre of Minnesota Twins is on the loose with a slugging spree that has moved him into contention for the American league home run and slugging titles. Killebre walked four home runs and drove in eight runs in last week's games, putting him only one behind the leader in each category. He has 29 homers and 77 R.I. Norm Cash of Detroit leads in home runs with 30 while Kansas City's Norm Siebern has the most runs batted in, 18. Since July 8, Killebre has hit 12 home runs and batted in 29 runs. He is batting .247. Pilot Pete Rumetsch of Boston broke a deadlock for the junior circuit batting lead by gaining one point to .332 while rookie Manny Jimenez of Kansas City remained at .332. Rumetsch collected nine hits in 25 times at bat while Jimenez had eight safeties in 25 tries.

ROBINSON THIRD
Floyd Robinson of Chicago White Sox remained in third place despite a seven-point drop to .313. Veteran Stan Musial of St. Louis took over the National League batting lead from Tommy Davis of Los Angeles Dodgers. Musial gained five points to .357 while Davis dropped six to .346. The figures include Sunday's games. Matt, seeking his eighth batting crown, had seven hits in 15 at bats last week. Davis, who drove in six runs to hit his leading R.I. total to 112, also had seven hits, but he went to bat 26 times. Frank Robinson of Cincinnati hit at .338. Willie Mays of San Francisco continues to pace the circuit in home runs with 32. He has before to contact last week.
