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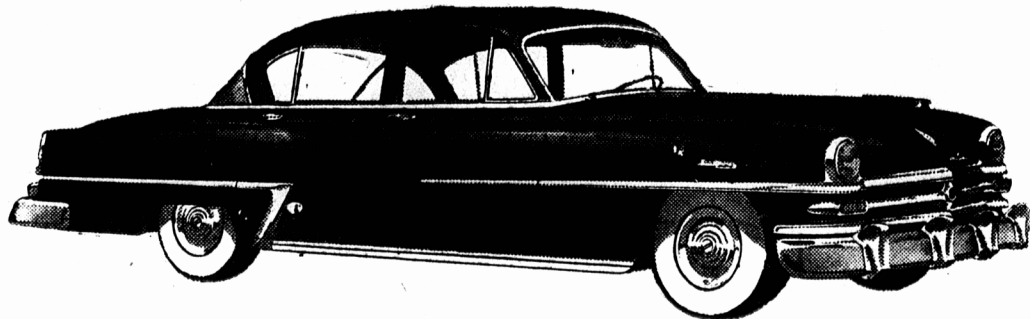
was startled, "You mean there is a leak in the dam?" she asked.
