Dr. Bailey Delivers Powerful Sermons

Another capacity congregation last night listened to Rev. E.J. Bailey noted evangelist who is conducting week long services at the Charlottetown Baptist Church.
Taking as his theme, "What Think Ye Of Christ", Dr. Bailey said many people want to argue about religion in order to evade the issue of making a decision for Jesus Christ.
"Many people," he said, "say they believe in God but they want to think of God as a being far away from them. They do not want him to come down here where he belongs. In our lives and in our daily work."
Dr. Bailey as well as being classed among the best preachers in Canada is possessed with an outstanding baritone voice which he says he developed as a young lad working in the coal mines of native Wales.
He gave a moving personal testimony recalling how as an immigrant he was helped in his decision to embark upon his theological career in Western Canada.
Tonight Dr. Bailey will sing two Negro spirituals entitled "Joshua Fit The Battle of Jericho" and "Were you there When They Crucified Our Lord".

Mr. Morrissey is the provincial champion here this year and will compete in the big championship match on Thursday of next week. He is also expected to compete in a visitor's match earlier in the week. It will be Mr. Morrissey's second participation in Canadian championship plowing. He represented the province several years ago at a similar match elsewhere in Ontario.
Mr. Morrissey will be met at Brantford, Ontario by Gordon Cleator of Cocksbutt Farm Equipment who is looking after him. Brian Llewellyn, area manager here, said last night that Cocksbutt head office has assured the local office here that they will provide a suitable plow and other equipment for Glen at the match. The company's office here is also helping out on expenses, it was learned.
Going with Mr. Morrissey today is Wendell Jenkins of Millview, second place finisher in this year's provincial match here, and also eligible for the Canadian championship match. It is understood that Mr. Jenkins is being helped by the Massey Harris people here and that he will use their equipment in the match.
Through the co-operation of R.C. Parent, Experimental Farm superintendent here, Mr. Morrissey has been able to take time off during the past week or so to practice the fine points in plowing. He has been paying particular attention to scratch crowns and the water furrow, both of which are demanded in the Canadian championship match.

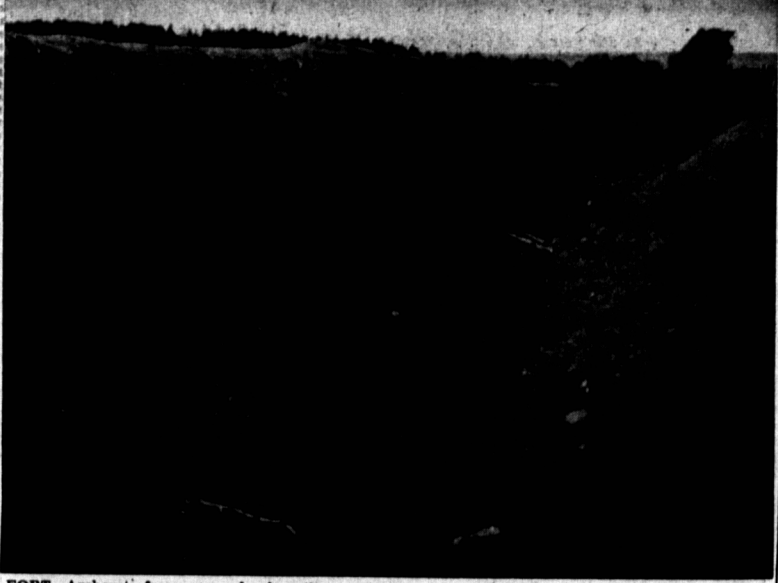

Historic Port La Joie Dates From French Regime

A recent news release from the Prince Edward Island Historical Society states that Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell, Prince Edward Island's representative on the Historical Sites and Monument Board had recommended to the Board that Fort Amherst at Port la Joie be made a national historic site. The Chief Justice, in company with Mr. Justice H. L. Palmer, President of the society, T. E. MacNutt and F. A. S. Jones had accompanied J. O. Hyndman to the site and had been greatly impressed. The release indicated that "all felt that the condition and history of the Fort warranted its preservation as an historic site. Its ideal situation and the topography of the surrounding area called for its development as a national historic park." The old fort is on the farm of Mr. Hyndman and is in the Rocky Point district.

UNDER FRENCH REGIME

"History records that the old fort is tied in closely with the early history of this province. D. C. Harvey in his "French Regime in Prince Edward Island" records that Denys de La Ronde had said on November 6, 1721, "We are in Port La Joie one of the most beautiful harbors that the eye can behold." The French made it the provincial capital and Harvey records that "although it was comparatively poor in natural resources Port la Joie remained the capital throughout the entire French period, and under the English the City of Charlottetown was erected on the same harbor not far from the original site so hastily selected by Gonteville de La Ronde. In this sense the capital dates from 1720, twenty-nine years before the founding of Halifax." As the Guardian noted in an editorial several years ago, the place is rich in historical significance. In the first place it was founded in 1720, a few months after the first French settlers arrived in the province. There, too, in 1722 was built the first Christian church on the island. It was dedicated to St. John the Evangelist and there were continued on page 12
