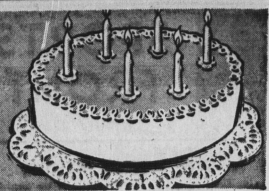

MONTREAL (CP)—Montreal has its first Buddhist priest in Rev. Shih Okada, who was educated at the University of Kyoto.

The induction service was held at the Buddhist church on St. Urbain street, built three years ago by members of the congregation, and was conducted by Rev. Newton Ishura, representing the Buddhist Church in Canada.

Sokichi Ito, president of the congregation, said there are about 100 Buddhists in the Montreal district. Hereafter services have been conducted by guest priests and laymen.

Services are held each Sunday and the church has an active Sunday school attended by 40 to 50 children. A busy community and social life revolves around the church.

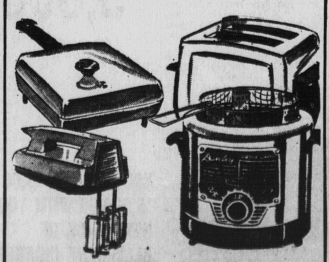
Coinciding with the induction was the annual Japanese folk festival, a Buddhist observance that dates back more than 2,000 years.

**NO CONNECTION**  
BONN (Reuters)—Regimental pride caused a fight between British and Canadian troops after their return from joint manoeuvres at Terfah, in Westphalia last Saturday, a British army spokesman said Tuesday. It was not in any way connected with the reception accorded the Queen in Quebec last week, the spokesman said. Four soldiers were treated for cuts and bruises.

**DENY THREE KILLED**  
JAKARTA (Reuters)—An Indonesian navy spokesman said Tuesday three Malaysian soldiers were killed in a clash with Indonesian border guards off Nunukan Island, East Borneo. He said that two days earlier a British aircraft bombed the Indonesian part of Sebati Island (Indonesia and Malaysia each administer half the island). In Singapore, a British soldier has been lost in "a few days of operational activity for some weeks" and the bombing spokesman said no Malaysian charge was "absolute nonsense."
