

Wellington Plebiscite Favors Incorporation

WELLINGTON — Incorporation of the village of Wellington under the Village Service Act was approved yesterday by a 62-45 plebiscite vote.

When the poll closed at 9 p.m. last evening 102 of the 119 eligible persons had voted in the plebiscite making Wellington the last village of its size in Prince County to give approval to incorporation under the Village Service Act. Previously O'Leary, Miscouche, St. Eleanor's and Kinkora have become incorporated as villages. The vote yesterday reversed the result of a few years ago when a previous plebiscite in Wellington resulted in majority opposed to incorporation. The keen interest of yesterday's plebiscite was indicated by a report that of the eligible twelve who did not vote, ten of them were unable to do so for various reasons.

The plebiscite yesterday was conducted by Prince County Sheriff Alfred Gordon of Summerside who acted as returning officer. Herbert Murphy of Summerside was clerk. Scrutineers were John Barlow and John Galant of Wellington.

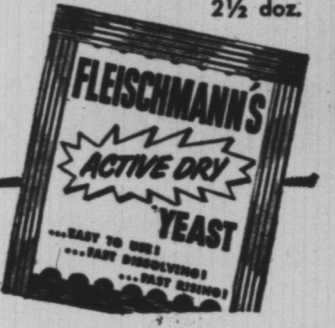

FLAKY CROISSANTS

- Scald 1 cup milk. Stir in 1 tsp. salt. 1 1/2 lbs. granulated sugar. Cool to lukewarm.
- Measure into large bowl 1/2 cup lukewarm water. Sprinkle with contents of 1 envelope Fleischmann's Active Dry Yeast. Let stand 10 min. THEN stir well. Stir in lukewarm milk mixture, 2 cups once-sifted all-purpose flour and beat until smooth and elastic. Work in an additional 1 1/2 cups (about) once-sifted all-purpose flour.
- Turn out on floured board; knead until elastic. Roll out dough into a 12 x 20" rectangle; spread with 1 cup firm butter. Fold 1/2 of dough crosswise over centre third; fold other third over top, making 3 layers. With open end toward you, roll and fold again. Next day, repeat rolling and folding steps twice; wrap and chill 1/2 hr.
- Roll into a 12 x 20" rectangle; cut into 15-4" squares. Cut in half diagonally; roll up each triangle from long edge; tack points under. Place on brown-paper-covered cookie sheets. Curve rolls to form crescents. Brush with mixture of 1 egg yolk and 2 tbsps. milk. Cover. Let rise until double in bulk—about 3/4 hr. Bake in hot oven, 425° about 12 min. Yield—2 1/2 doz.

UNITED CHURCH L.A.

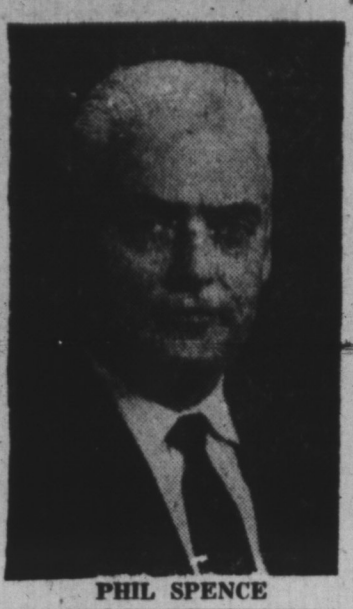
The members of the United Church Junior Auxiliary met at the home of Mrs. R.W. Auld for the February meeting.

Alberton's Western Hospital To Be Enlarged This Spring

ALBERTON — The capacity of the Western Hospital here will be increased by 35 beds by an extension to be constructed early this spring, it was learned yesterday.

In addition to the increased bed capacity, the new extension will also contain new obstetrical and surgical quarters and an enlarged x-ray department.

The Western Hospital, operated by the Sisters of St. Martha, was opened in January, 1945, and had a 15-bed capacity. A new wing in 1948 added thirty beds and 10 bassinets, together with a new x-ray, laboratory, and surgical and delivery rooms.

Keith Pickard has been retained as architect, and it is understood work will commence after the plans have been approved by the Department of Health.

SUMMERSIDE — More than two dozen gaily decorated floats are already indicated for the big parade during the four-day Summerside Lobster Carnival and Exhibition, July 15-18 and many other firms and organizations expected to be represented in the parade of floats, carnival director Charles Hogan told a meeting of the Summerside Lobster Carnival last evening.

Mr. Hogan, accompanied by secretary-treasurer, Mrs. Roy MacLeod, Mrs. Hector Buote read the minutes and financial report.

Sea Weed Lane Resident Died Of Exposure; Alcohol

An inquest into the death of Clovis Blaquiere, Sea Weed Lane, Summerside was held in the Court House last evening presided over by coroner Dr. W.S. Callaghan. The jury found that the deceased died due to exposure while under the influence of alcohol.

Lloyd Perry, caretaker of the town dump, near which Mr. Blaquiere lived, testified that he saw the deceased about 4:30 p.m. on January 6th, when he accompanied Gus Gallant to Blaquiere's shack in order for Gallant to purchase empty bottles. He said Blaquiere had been thinking but was able to walk around on his one leg and crutches. (Mr. Blaquiere had his right leg amputated several years ago.)

The next day he had noticed there was no smoke coming from the flue.

He saw Blaquiere's dog around a pile of wooden boxes and he called to the animal but it stayed where it was. He discovered the body lying beside the pile of wooden boxes and called the RCMP.

Const. Earl Elliott said Blaquiere had received his monthly welfare cheque of \$20 the day before the frozen body was discovered. He stated there was no disarrangement of Blaquiere's clothes or no visible marks of violence on his body.

The autopsy report read by Dr. Callaghan revealed that Blaquiere had been intoxicated.

(Continued from Page 14) teach in their school and to obtain a knowledge of the equipment which will be needed here.

"A year ago the Director of Vocational Training for Canada suggested that we could enrich our courses by undertaking suitable buildings projects. A herdsman's house was required at Riverside and the Vocational School undertook to build it. It has provided a model work program not only for the carpenters but for bricklayers, plumbers, plasterers and electricians.

"We hope not only to continue with projects of this nature, but also to expand our training at the school in this way and make the students' work more interesting and realistic. I expect that members of the House will be making their usual inspection visit to Riverside, and I hope that they will take a look at this project of our Vocational School.

"As was reported in the press some time ago, we have plans to provide for the training of the deaf in this province. Our action in this matter was prompted by the announcement of a decision of the province of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick to erect a school for the deaf at Amherst, Nova Scotia.

"This province was invited to participate in the Amherst school project, but the government decided that if a move was to be made we should try a school in our own province.

"A large residential school has certain advantages, but it is my own feeling that handicapped children should not be removed from their parents for long periods of time. At any rate, we shall make an effort to provide this type of instruction here. At the present time.

"Mr. Michael Hennessey of Charlottetown, who has two university degrees, is taking post-graduate training at the Clarke School for the Deaf in Northampton, Mass., and will return to the province at the end of the school year. I hope that our plans will materialize and that we will be able to give our Island deaf children the training they need in their own province.

ONE STEP FURTHER "Up to this point I have been discussing some of the steps taken in recent years towards the operation of our present program of education in this province. I am going to go a bit further now and very briefly give you my own appraisal of Island education, at the primary and elementary levels.
