LIMESTONE FINDINGS
 C. C. Baker asked the minister of industry and natural resources:
 (1) In what areas and on whose properties have borings or diggings been carried out in an effort to find deposits of limestone in commercial quantities?
 (2) Have any such surveys been successful?
 (3) If so what progress has been made in having a processing plant established? and when may farmers in these areas expect to be able to procure suitable ground limestone for agricultural purposes?
 (4) If the surveys are not of sufficient commercial value to warrant further investigation will the property owners be compensated for damage and/or expenses caused by diggings, etc.?
 (5) Is Walter DeSilva employed to any capacity by the provincial government?
 (a) If the answer to No. 5 is "yes", (b) Does the provincial government pay any part of Mr. DeSilva's salary or expenses?
 (c) If the answer to No. 5 is "no", are his services available to the City of Charlottetown?

ANSWERS
 (1) Spring Valley area on the farm of Fred Pettit, Darnley area on the farm of Wallace Adams, French River area on the farm of George Howatt. Surface sampling but no digging was done at a number of other locations such as the former Fifteen Point, Salvation Cove, Kirk Corner, Cable Road, Rolle Bay, and Alberton North.
 (2) (a) The surveys have shown a considerable amount of limestone running from 40 percent to 73 percent. Further work on the formations. Further work expected this fall. No progress has been made in establishing a processing plant. (b) A matter of policy.
 (3) Walter DeSilva is employed on a part-time basis in the capacity of professional planner under an arrangement with Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation who contribute \$4,000 per annum to the expense of the division. The City of Charlottetown and the Government contribute the balance on a 50-50 basis. Mr. DeSilva's services are available to municipalities as a limited basis.
