Avro Employees Seek U.S. Visas

TORONTO (CP) — The Globe and Mail says it has learned that at least 1,000 former Avro Aircraft Limited employees have applied for United States visas. Avro and its sister company, Orinda Engines Limited, laid off approximately 15,000 workers last Feb. 20 when the Arrow jet interceptor program was cancelled.

The Globe says it is not known how many visas have been issued. The story quotes U.S. immigration officials as saying it is impossible to determine who among Canadian citizens receiving visas are former Avro workers.

Red Countries Hold Sessions

WARSAW, Poland (Reuters) — Eight Communist nations Monday finished their first day of Warsaw pact sessions designed to present a massive show of solidarity for Russia's stand at the forthcoming Geneva east-west meeting.

Russian Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko during the four-hour discussions was believed to have outlined the Soviet line for Geneva to foreign ministers of Poland, East Germany, Hungary, Czechoslovakia, Romania, Bulgaria and Albania.

Looming powerfully in the conference background is Communist China, a non-member of the pact but described by the Polish press as taking "full part" in the proceedings.

Political observers expect the meeting to wind up today, to exploit as much as possible the present discord among Western powers, themselves meeting in Paris Wednesday in preparation for the East-West talks at Geneva May 11.
