of a 1936 defence treaty with Britain. With Full Equipment The transport planes landed the parachute troops at a Favid airfield with full field equipment barracks bases, rifles, sub-machine guns and other weapons. Then the reinforcements were moved to a wire guarded tent camp in the desert about 10 miles south of Favid, a British command centre. As each man came up, he received a cot from a big pile in the assembly area. Heavy British military traffic was reported in the canal area. Reporters said the British base had normal supplies of food, water and electricity, but the troops were operating as though they were in a state of siege. The strong man of the Wafd (government) Party, Foud Seraz Ed Din, told the Egyptian senate that "hatred of the British against
