

Congress was to impeach the President, but in the meantime the people, in the late elections have impeached Congress. Who is going to be tried?

The new Democratic councils of Baltimore have refused to have their sessions opened with prayer, one bold member asserting that "preachers had done more harm than good, and had caused the late rebellion by their praying influence."

The formal transfer of Russian America to the United States has finally been made. General Rousseau received the transfer, which was accomplished with the ceremonies of lowering the Russian and hoisting the United States flag, and the interchange of two short sentences in the way of speech-making.

Monte Rotondo is a small town of 1,200 souls, ten miles north-east of Rome, in the province of that name. It is said that Louis Napoleon proposed to affiance the Prince Imperial of France to Gizelle, the youngest daughter of the Emperor of Austria.

Mr. Maguire, M. P., has left Cork for London to superintend the publication of his forthcoming work on the "Irish in America."

The Hon. C. G. Duffy has been elected to the Victoria Parliament for the county of Dalhousie, in which his opponent was named Sands, whom he defeated by a large majority, although Sands had been in previous possession, and gained the support of many parties.

Charles Lever, the novelist, has been appointed English Consul at Vienna.

A memorial, in the shape of a magnificent Cathedral, to the late Cardinal Wiseman, is about to be erected in London. A site has been obtained close to the Victoria Railway Station, Westminster Abbey, and bordering on the new quarter springing into existence round Buckingham Palace.

The Grand Vizier's remonstrance against this being treated with contempt. The war is being resumed with increased violence and will not close until after the annihilation of Turkish rule.

The Speech of Napoleon before the French Chambers yesterday, was published this morning. It relates to Italian and German affairs, and question of Reform. The document is quite short, making less than 1,500 words.

The prisoners Roberts, Featherston and Gould, were brought up before Commission to-day, and sentenced to five years imprisonment. All the indictments having been disposed of, the Special Commission was dissolved.

The trial of Halpin before the Special Commission was concluded to-day. The jury brought in a verdict of guilty of treason and felony. The prisoner throughout his trial has maintained his claim of American citizenship. The Court has not yet pronounced his sentence.

The Premier announced that the Government would try to pass before the adjournment, the Post Office, Excise Customs, Tariff and Railway bills, and the bill to renew the suspension of the Habeas Corpus Act.

The 'Gazette' publishes the text of diplomatic note from Prince Mianster, Manobra, which declares that the suppression of the temporal power of the Pope is indispensable to the maintenance of good relations between Italy and France.

The execution of Allen and the other prisoners condemned to death by the Special Commission, except Maguire, whose pardon has been announced, will take place on the 23rd inst. in this city.

Though the sentence of most of the Fenians recently convicted at Manchester will be commuted to hard labor for a term of years or banishment, Allen will probably suffer the extreme penalty of the law, Nov. 23rd.

Midnight.—The Manchester Observer says:—There is no hope of reprieve or commutation for Gould and Larkin, and they will be executed with Allen on the 23rd inst., according to the terms of their sentences.

The British Government has received from the West Indies no official advices of the submersion of the Island of Tortola, as reported by a Cable despatch from New York.

The troops of the French Expeditionary Corps in Italy are making preparations to go into winter quarters at Civita Vecchia.

The latest European despatches are to the 23d instant, one of which reports that General Manobra, the Italian Prime Minister, has issued another note wherein the action of France in invading the Papal States is severely denounced. How serious to be sure!

It is reported that the United States have made propositions to purchase the Hudson Bay Territory. The Dominion of Canada had better look sharp.

Austria has signified its willingness to join the European Conference, proposed by France.

Small bands of Garibaldians had lately passed the Papal frontier, but were promptly met by the Papal troops and speedily suppressed.

Despatches containing the gratifying intelligence of the safety of Dr. Livingston, the celebrated traveller and explorer, were received in London on the 22d.

Great efforts were made, but without avail, except in the case of Shero, to have the lives of the condemned Manchester Fenians spared. Ample preparations were being made to secure order and safety at the execution, which were to take place on the 23d. England, which can afford to sympathize with rebels and filibusters everywhere else, is more inexorable than any other civilized country in her treatment of political prisoners.

Ship News. The crew of the Sch. Comet, Capt. McPhee, at this port to-day, were taken sick with fever, after leaving St. Jago, and the vessel put into Inagua. Isaac Day, seaman, of Jegore, died before reaching Inagua, on the 7th Oct. The Comet experienced heavy weather on the passage home, and lost bulwarks and galley, and had boat stove and sails split.—Ez.

Yesterday the Bark Abasco, Campbell, master, cleared for Liverpool, with a cargo of 18,500 bushels of oats and 12,868 feet deals, by James D. Mason, Esq. The Ship, C. Owen, Brown, master, and the Bark Empress, Gillis, master, cleared the same day, the former for Havre, France, with 28,898 bushels of oats, both by Carvell Bros. To-day the brig, Italia, Robert, Paul, master, also cleared for Havre with 13,852 bushels of oats, for the same parties.—H.

1st. To dredge the Southport side of Charlottetown Ferry, as follows:—A channel to be cut through the flats from the main channel to the landing slip at the Southport side; the first 150 feet, leading from the main channel, to be dredged out 3 feet deep, and 60 feet wide.

2dly. The remaining distance up to the outer edge of the stationary Wharf and under the Floating Blocks, (supposed to be about 400 feet), to be dredged out 2 feet deep throughout, and 60 feet wide up to the docks, and from side to side within the docks.
