U. S. Takes Lead In Golf Pros Team Competition

By W. R. Wheatley MONTREAL, Aug. 26 (CP)—The United States picked up a lead of 7 1-2 points to 1 1-2 over Canada today in the four-ball matches opening the two-day international team competition between golfing pros from both sides of the border.

Canada scored a single point through the combination of Bobby Locke, the South African golfing wizard and holder of the British open championship, and Jules Huot, veteran pro from the Montreal Laval Club.

They finished the 36-hole morning round of today's 18-hole play with a one-up margin over Julius Boros, U. S. open champion and Doug Ford, but the American pair came back in the afternoon with some brilliant play by Boros to take over the lead and win two on the day.

Stan Horne of Montreal, Lesmer, and Gordon Brydson of Toronto Mississauga came in all even with Jack Burke, Jr., and Cary Middlecoff to split one point for the 18 holes of afternoon play. But they lost six holes on the day.

Defending Golf Champ Bows Out Of Tourney

VANCOUVER, Aug. 26 (CP)—Defending champion Walt McElroy of Vancouver today bowed out of the Canadian amateur golf championship.

Bob Roos of San Francisco eliminated the 23-year-old McElroy 3 and 2 in a second-round match highlighted by the United States player's ability to get out of trouble with brilliant recovery shots.

But a good share of the Canadian contingent stayed in the running to advance into tomorrow's third 18-hole match play round over the jagged Capilano Course.

Nick Weslock of Windsor, Ont., swamped Mike Banks of Seattle 9 and 8, winning all but the third hole. The blazingly-dressed Ontario Willingdon Cup player finished out the round in a try at the course record of 62 set two years ago by Al Menger of Spokane, Wash.

Weslock was eight under par 72 at the 13th but failed to crack par after that and finishes with a 64. He had an eagle and four birdies on the first nine a five-under-par 32.

Bill Mawhinney of Vancouver, the 1950 champion, disposed of George (Porky) Andrews of Victoria, 6 and 5 without extending himself. Big Bill has been plagued with a lame back for two weeks. He was one over par for the 13 holes.

McElroy said before he started out on the sun-drenched course that he didn't feel confident off the tee because his left wrist was sore.

He kept pulling his drives to the right, under-clubbing with his irons and putting poorly. He was

three over par on the first nine and five down. Roose fired a two-under-par 35 on the out-going nine.

Bill Campbell of Huntington, W. Va., drove an average of 300 yards off the long-hole tees to over-power scrappy Mel Galetta of St. Albans, N. Y., 2 and 1. It was easily the best match of the day.

C., eliminated Dougherty 5 and 4; Bill Clintworth, Seattle, put out Jouney, 3 and 2, while Colin Brown, London, Ont., disposed of Steele on the last green, 1 up.
