Montreal Junior Canadiens At Sports Arena Tonight

Charlottetown and Island hockey fans get their first chance of the season to see a hockey game tonight when the Montreal Junior Canadiens come to town to play a hand-picked Island team at the Sports Arena.

Led by Charlottetown's Forbie Kennedy the Montreal aggregation are a power-packed outfit and will be the most powerful junior squad to visit Charlottetown since the day James ...

Sixteen Island players, mostly from Charlottetown and Summerside were chosen from a large turnout at the Arena last week by coach Walter Lawlor and they will be further strengthened by an additional four players from the Canadiens. As yet it has not been disclosed who the players will be but it is the Rocket, a 13-year-old of the Montreals who will line up with the locals.

While Kennedy is the high scorer on the team the Canadiens are by no means lacking in other scoring strength. In 17-year-old Ralph Backstrom the Canadiens have one of the brightest stars currently performing on the Canadian hockey scene. Ralph does triple time with the Canadiens. In addition to his regular shift at centre he acts as penalty killer and also plays the point on power plays.

Another player who has caught the interest of local fans is Claude Richard 17-year-old brother of Maurice and Henri. Reports have it that the Rocket, a 13-year-old veteran in the N.H.L. and the "Pocket Rocket", a first year rookie in the N.H.L. Canadiens, will have to move over in a couple of years to make room for his younger brother who has been improving fast.

Sports writers in Montreal and elsewhere have been working at the task of picking a nickname to fit Claude. From time to time he has been tabbed with "Vest Pocket Rocket" and "Pocket Rocket" and a host of others.

The local squad will be a little short on condition when they face the Canadiens tonight. It was only a week ago yesterday that the Sports arena opened its doors for the season's activities and the players have had only a couple of

practices under their belts since. Most of the players on the Montreal team have been playing for at least two months and some of them even longer. However the Island players are a hardy lot and most of them keep in shape during off-season participating in other sports. So that, while their chances of winning the game are only slight, the Canadiens will be forced to fight hard for every inch of ice they gain and every goal they score.

New Faces Spot Edmonton Line

EDMONTON (CP)—Montreal Alouettes may see a lot of new faces when they hit the Edmonton Eskimo line in the Grey Cup football final at Vancouver Saturday. But there won't be much change in the backfield personnel.

The defending-champion Eskimos have 10 new men among the 21 linemen they can draw from for the 1955 classic. Four newcomers have been added to the backfield.

Whether the additions and deletions have strengthened the club, coach Frank (Pop) Ivy refuses to say. Asked if he feels his club is stronger than last year when Eskimos nipped Montreal 26-25 in the Grey Cup game at Toronto, Ivy cautiously replied: "You can't compare teams like that."

On the season's play, the Eskis would seem stronger. They have lost only two of 18 games played so far this year while in 1954 they suffered six defeats in 21 games on the march to the Grey Cup.

The Eskimo line averages 210 pounds a man, the backfield 190 pounds. Average age of the team is 24 years with Frankie Morris, 31-year-old guard, the oldest member and freshman fullback Con Kelly the youngest at 20.

Ivy can dress 28 players in the Grey Cup game and among those to be dropped will be two of the 12 imports. The Grey Cup rules say only 10 imports can be used. Ivy has given no indication who will be cut.

Nine players who were in the Eskimo lineup on Grey Cup day in 1954 are no longer with the club. They include four backfielders and five linemen.

Patrick Thinks Canadiens Possibly Best Team Ever

NEW YORK (CP)—One of Muzz Patrick's favorite subjects these days is Montreal Canadiens and each time he discusses the National Hockey League leaders he gets a bit more enthusiastic. Several weeks ago the New York Rangers general manager said the current edition of the Canadiens was the best team in hockey today.

Now he's suggesting the Flying Frenchmen of this season could become the best club the NHL has ever seen.

His remarks may be something of a boost for his own Rangers, holding down second place, because he made the comment after the New Yorkers had held the Canadiens to a 1-1 tie here Sunday night.

The point is that if the Rangers can hold Montreal to a draw, even occasionally, then they're a pretty fair team themselves.

NO COMPARISON Patrick said that if today's Canadiens aren't the greatest team in hockey history, then only Detroit Red Wings of recent years can match them.

"I'd say it's a tossup between the two clubs. Certainly this is the greatest club Montreal has ever had. I saw the old Canadiens with Howie Morenz and Aurel Joliat play many times.

"Their play was so good that I'm not comparing that team with this one. This Montreal outfit is many, many times better."

"It could develop into the best in NHL history... Chances are they'll get stronger with age." UNBEATEN IN 11 GAMES Patrick said the Montreal power play—Maurice Richard, Jean Beliveau and Bert O'Leary up front and Boom Boom Geoffrion and Doug Harvey on the points—is the mightiest such combination ever.

"Even Detroit couldn't equal that," he said. This devastating combination will be without Geoffrion for about five weeks. He suffered a shoulder separation when checked by defenceman Lou Fontinato Sunday night.

The Canadiens haven't been beaten in 11 games and, if Patrick's prediction of improvement with age comes true, they could make a runaway of the current season.

Says National Football League Resentment Leads To Argo Breakup Campaign

TORONTO (Tuesday) (CP)—The Globe and Mail says National Football League resentment toward the Toronto Big Four club may be generating a "break up the Argonauts" campaign.

Whether by intent or otherwise, NFL teams have included a movement which could, if successful, weaken Argos in 1956," the newspaper says.
