"Teachers should be retirees at 40"

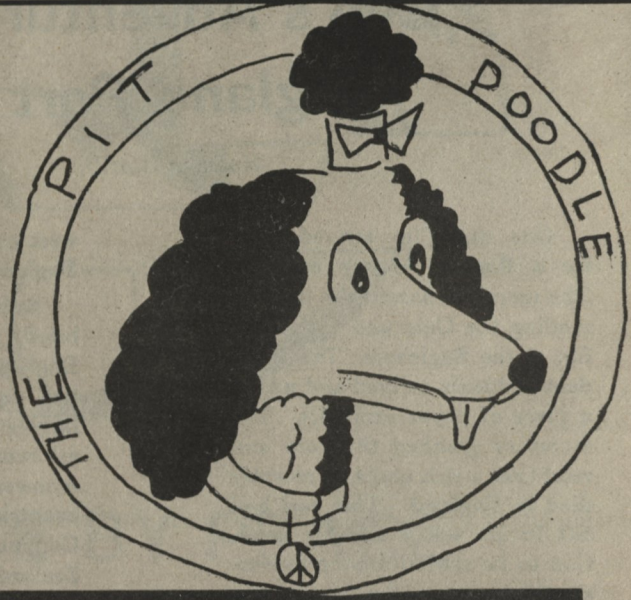
"The price of souls is to great."
