PARTITION OF CHINA.

Russia in the East Takes

POSSESSION OF A STRATEGIC POINT

On the Road to Peking.

ST. PETERSBURG, Dec. 30.—The Russians have occupied Kin-Chau, north of Port Arthur. Kin Chau is about two miles from the sea coast at the northernmost point of the Bay which is closed by ice for three months of the year. The city is on the road to Peking and commands all the communication by land between the capital of the Chinese Empire and the province of Shanghai, of which Port Arthur is the principal port. It is a point of prime military importance in connection with Russia's strategic dispositions on the Korean frontier.

Plague in India.

BOMBAY, Dec. 30.—There has been a recurrence of the plague, especially in the Mandvie district where the inhabitants are seeking safety in flight.

The total plague returns for Bombay up to date are 14,257 cases and 11,882 deaths.

Lord Lansdowne's Assurance.

LONDON, Dec. 30.—Hon. Dr. Borden, Minister of Militia, has had an interview with Lord Lansdowne, who promised him every possible consideration and assistance in promoting the welfare of his schemes affecting Canada.

Butter for Bermuda.

OTTAWA, Dec. 30.—The Commissioner of Agriculture is going to send to Bermuda per steamer Beta, trial shipments of butter in one and two pound tin boxes from the dairy station at Nappan, Nova Scotia.

The Grand Old Man.

LONDON, Dec. 30.—Yesterday being the 88th birthday of Mr. Gladstone, the usual congratulations were sent to Hawarden and Cannes where Gladstone is.

French Press Shouting.

PARIS, Dec. 30.—The French press is protesting loudly against French inaction in the far east and the alleged subservience of the government to Russia.

The executive of the Local Union of Christian Endeavor have decided to hold a public rally in Grace Church at 3.45 Sunday afternoon, January 9. Programme will be announced later. It is expected that this will be one of the most interesting religious gatherings held in the city for some time.

A GAY DECEIVER.

Bigamist Caught and Prosecuted

HALIFAX, Dec. 30.—A tall, smooth-faced, neatly dressed, sanctimonious-looking man, named Herbert M. Coates, was arrested in Everett, Mass., on Monday on a charge of bigamy. Coates is a native of Amherst, and was married to a lady in his native town about twenty years ago. With his wife he went to Boston and lived in several places. Following his occupation as a shoe stitcher, he wooed and won the affection of a Miss Cockhar, a highly respectable lady of fifty years,—eight years older than Coates. Last October they were married. It did not take long for wife No. 2 to learn that she had been deceived and that Coates had another wife living in Nova Scotia. She refused to live with him longer and eventually prosecuted him.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 27.—Eli T. Shepard, who has recently returned from China, commenting upon the reported occupation of Kian Chau by Russia, said today: "The seizure of the port shows Russia has practically taken possession of the Korea, Manchuria and the Gulf of Liantung, and possesses a significance which will cause consternation among the diplomats of the world. Its situation is such that its possession practically places Russia in a position to defy the world."

WASHINGTON, Dec. 28.—From the advice of the Canadian Minister, it is likely that Skaguay will be chosen, instead of Dyea as the terminal point of the relief expedition. The reason for this choice is said to be the fact that Skaguay has wharves at which the ships can discharge cargoes directly, while at Dyea there are nothing but lighters to land the goods. Mr. Sifton said tonight that he hoped to conclude his visit within the next two days, and that there was no doubt that the two governments would make arrangements which would be mutually beneficial in extending relief to the Klondike miners.

OSBORNE, Isle of Wight, December 28.—Queen Victoria received the Venezuelan minister in audience yesterday.

LIVERPOOL, December 28.—The White Star line steamer Teutonic, which sailed for New York to-day, took among her passengers Robert Guinness, the well known oarsman, and John Redmond, the Parcellite leader.

OTTAWA, Dec.—The Premier of New Zealand cabbed the postmaster general yesterday that the New Zealand legislature having passed the mail subsidy bill, the alternate services to Vancouver and San Francisco will commence on the 8th proximo. Hitherto New Zealand steamers carrying mails from San Francisco have been somewhat erratic, often sailing within a day or so of Vancouver steamers. Under the new arrangement made by the New Zealand government, the Frisco mails must be carried intermediate with the Vancouver mails, so that from Canada and the United States the result will be fortnightly mail. The first mail under the new arrangement will leave Vancouver on February 10th.

SEATTLE, December 29.—The steamer Alki, arrived here yesterday, bringing advices from Dawson City up to November 25. The Alki's passengers include thirty persons who left Dawson between November 22nd and November 25th. All without exception say there will be no starvation at Dawson City this winter or next spring. When informed of the action being taken by the United States government to send out a relief expedition, they said it was unnecessary and uncalled for. Several thousand men have gone from Dawson to Fort Yukon, where there is an unlimited supply of provisions. Those remaining in Dawson have 3 regular meals each day and have enough supplies in sight to last well along into the spring.

No sickness is reported at Dawson, and everybody there is in much better circumstances and worrying less over the food situation than their friends in the outside imagine.

Nearly all those who arrived on the Alki to-day were at Dawson City only three months, having started in with the first rush in the latter part of July. They came out to purchase their outfits for next season.
