### Understaffed Moncton Hawks Clip Beavers 4-2

MONCTON (CP)—An understaffed band of Moncton Hawks stayed off a spirited comeback by Saint John Beavers here Wednesday night for a 4-2 triumph over the Atlantic Coast Senior Hockey League leaders. Hawks, displaying a hustling brand of hockey, jumped into a 3-0 advantage in the first period on goals by Billy Sinnett, Ray Lacroix and Ray Leduc. Beavers struck for a second period marker by Vip Palladino and clicked midway through the final period with Steve Brklacich on the firing end. Seeking the equalizer, Brklacich yanked goal-tender Jim Shirley with two minutes left in favor of an extra skater. The move backfired when Orin Carver slid the puck from behind his own bludge into the unguarded cage. The win, Moncton's third over the Beavers, pushed them back to within one game of third-place Fredericton Capitals, who were idle. The loss left Saint John four points up on second-place Amherst Ramblers.

## 5-Goal Splurge Gives Rangers Win Over Wings

NEW YORK (CP)—Blanked 3-0 at the end of the second period, New York Rangers exploded for five goals in one final session Wednesday night to defeat Detroit Red Wings, 5-4. It was the National Hockey League champions' sixth straight New York visit without a victory. The Rangers, badly outskated and outscored through the first two periods and saved only from a worse fate by the fine goaltending of Gump Worsley, eked like an entirely new team, they stormed in on the Red Wings goalie Glen Hall, in the final session. Jack Evans started the Rangers off at 1:26 of the third period. At 6:28 Andy Heberton counted and a little more than a minute later came through again to tie the score. Larry Popein put the New Yorkers out in front at 12:30 and little Wally Hergeshelmer gave them a two-goal working margin at 18:10. Red Kelly, who had scored the first Detroit goal at the 2-minute mark of the first period, tallied again with less than a minute remaining to narrow the margin. The Red Wings pulled the goal-tender out of the nets in the final 15 seconds in an attempt to

dealtack the score but the Rangers threw up an air-tight defence. Detroit, now trailing the second place Rangers by seven points, scored their other two goals in the second period.
