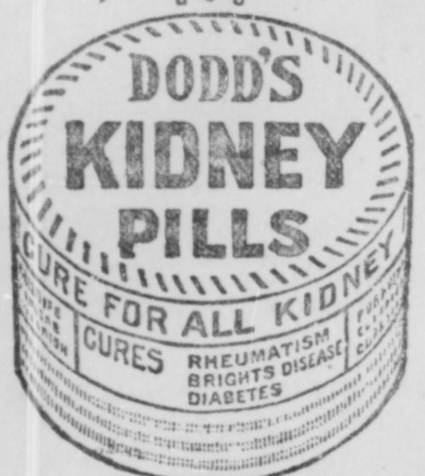

D-O-D-D'S

A By-Law for Levying and Specifying the Rate of Assessment on Real Estate and Personal Property and Poll in the City of Charlottetown for a Waterworks Fund, under Statute 50th Victoria, Chapter 8.

Be it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows:—

1st. The rate of Assessment on Real Estate or a Waterworks Fund under said Statute for the year commencing the first day of January, A. D. 1899, and ending the thirty-first day of December, A. D. 1899, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one-eighth of one per cent on every dollar of the value of Real Estate as assessed by the Assessors of the said City of Charlottetown in the General Assessment Book and Valuation Roll of all Real Estate and Personal Property liable to taxation in said City, and all persons liable to pay Poll Tax therein made and duly returned by them on the twenty-third day of March, A. D. 1899.

2nd. The rate of Assessment on Personal Property for such Water Works Fund for the year commencing the first day of January, A. D. 1899, and ending the thirty-first day of December, A. D. 1899, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one-eighth of one per cent on every dollar of the value of Personal Property as assessed by the Assessors of the said City in the said General Assessment Book and Valuation Roll, made and duly returned by them as aforesaid.

3rd. The amount of Poll Tax to be paid by every person returned by the said Assessors in said General Assessment Book and Valuation Roll as liable thereto for such Water works Fund under said Statute, for the year commencing the first day of January, A. D. 1899, and ending the thirty-first day of December, A. D. 1899, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one cent on the poll of every person so assessed and returned as aforesaid.

A By-law for allowing a Rate of Discount on the Assessments on Real Estate and Personal Property in the City of Charlottetown for general civic purposes for the current year ending the thirty-first day of December A. D. 1899.

Be it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows:—

1st. A discount at the rate of Two and One-half Per Cent shall be allowed to all taxpayers who shall, on or before the Fifteenth day of July next, A. D. 1899, pay to the City Clerk, at his office, the taxes severally due by them for the current year on Real Estate and Personal Property, for civic purposes.

1st. The rate of assessment on Real Estate for general civic purposes under said Statute, for the year commencing the first day of January, A. D. 1899, and ending the thirty-first day of December, A. D. 1899, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one per cent on every dollar of the value of Real Estate, as assessed by the Assessors of the said City of Charlottetown in the General Assessment Book and Valuation Roll of all Real Estate and Personal Property liable to taxation in said City, and all persons liable to pay Poll Tax therein, made and duly returned by them on the twenty-third day of March, A. D. 1899.

Sons of Temperance Meet at Hunter River.

G. W. P. Kirby's Report—Strong Resolutions.

The Grand Division of the Sons of Temperance of P. E. I. opened at Hunter River at 11 a. m. yesterday with Grand Worthy Patriarch, Rev. W. J. Kirby, in the chair. After the opening ceremony the Past Most Worthy Patriarch of the National Division of North America, Rev. Dr. Alder, Temple, was introduced to the Grand Division. The Grand Worthy Patriarch received and welcomed him. He took his position of honor, and, being called upon, made a very stirring and excellent address. The reports of the Grand officers were then read and referred to the proper committees. The following is the Grand Worthy Patriarch's Report:—

Hunter River, P. E. I. April 20th, 1899. TO THE OFFICERS AND REPRESENTATIVES OF THE DIVISION OF P. E. ISLAND.

With much pleasure do we meet you in our semi-annual session, in this beautiful village of Hunter River. We are particularly pleased to come into a place noted for its morality and staunch and progressive in temperance principles and the place where our Order is advancing with such rapid strides as in "Hunter River Division." We must congratulate this division in its encouraging growth during the past quarter. Yet, while we rejoice with this Division in its success, we mingle our sympathies and our tears with it, and with those families from which our Heavenly Father has removed a son who was an honor to his parents and a blessing to this order; and a daughter whose loving and sincere disposition made her such a favorite in the Division Room. We trust our loving Father in Heaven will bestow consolation and grace upon our friends Mr. and Mrs. John Wayne, and Mr. and Mrs. George McCleod and their respective families in their sad bereavements. We cannot understand why these young lives, budding into great promise of usefulness in our order and the world, should be so early cut off, but we bow in submission and humbly say: "He doeth all things well."

Our Order has made some progress during the quarter; the report of the Grand Scribe, who has been indefatigable in his labours during the past six months, will give you the figures and show you the strength of the Grand Division to date.

The divisions we have been able to visit during the quarter were in good working order, and very encouraging to your grand officers. The anniversary exercises of "North Star" were most enthusiastic, and the order still

looks to the "North Star" to guide to a successful haven of prohibition.

We called suddenly on "Refuge Division" and found a large attendance on a cold winter night, and the whole working of the session, as well as the initiation of a new member, was most commendable. I am especially pleased to state that the thoughtfulness of this Division was very much appreciated, when by motion the treasurer was ordered to pay the grand officers' expenses. If more Divisions would do that, doubtless more grand officers, whose purses are not very well filled would be encouraged to visit more frequently.

The City Divisions are doing splendid work, and Prince Edward is coming grandly to the front in work for temperance.

I would like to express my thanks to the deputies who have written to me during the quarter, and informed me of the condition of their respective Divisions. I have had a few more letters this quarter than last, but a large number of the deputies are discouragingly careless in writing to the Grand Officers or answering communications when written to.

We cannot be successful unless we do our business in a business manner. The time may come when the grand officers will be compelled to remove careless deputies and replace them with better men or women for the success of our cause.

We regret that your attention must be called to the fact that the charter and paraphernalia of Stanley Division have been destroyed and a like misfortune has overtaken "Forest Home" Division. I have also heard, although not through the deputy, that "Union Division" has also had its charter stolen from the Division Room.

The members of this Grand Division will be asked to take some special action in these cases, and it may be that you will consider the advisability of offering rewards for the capture and conviction of these ruthless violators of the peace and destroyers of the property of our order. If it shall be shown that an act of the Legislature is necessary to meet such cases, the Grand Division will arrange for a committee to draft what is required. There seems to be a certain class of lawless boys in our country places who should be handed over to the law to be dealt with. I trust something can be done to protect ourselves from future losses. We would suggest the appointment at this session of a committee on resolutions, into whose hands all resolutions which have been received shall be placed, and that committee shall be asked to prepare resolutions to submit to this Grand Division regarding (1) The present condition of the Federal government on the late prohibitive, and future prohibition.

(2) A resolution which shall reach the representatives of the Island regarding the bonded warehouse in King's County, on the premises of a violator of the Scott Act.

(3) A resolution looking towards legislation, if necessary, against the selling, in Scott Act counties, of a beer which is doing so much damage in some sections of our work amongst our young men who are led to believe it is not intoxicating.

(4) A resolution which will help and encourage the Charlottetown Temperance Alliance in its efforts to draft some

stringent amendments to the Liquor Regulation Act. This committee might also have liberty to introduce any other resolutions which will help us to reach our desired haven, the total prohibition of the Liquor Traffic.

We are glad to say that strong resolutions regarding the reply of the Hon. Sir Wilfrid Laurier on the plebiscite have been passed by the P. E. I. Branch of the Dominion Temperance Alliance, the Pownal District, I. O. G. T., and one of particular strength and without any side-issue, by the W. C. T. U. of the city of Charlottetown. As a Grand Division we must stand by these societies; indeed our weakness will be found in our vacillation at this time. We are particularly pleased with the Charlottetown press as it speaks out on this question. The whole Temperance electorate of Canada is speaking out on the question, and the ever forward and advanced order of the Sons of Temperance must give no uncertain sound today. I will not foreshadow what you should do I am sure you will do the right. Whether we shall sit back and refuse to do anything more; or whether we shall place on record our loss of faith in the present political party, and with the G. W. P. of New Brunswick "look to the Opposition for help" or whether we shall take some new step, not yet suggested, and make an effort to restore the Prohibition party to life and vitality; or what else you may do we await the issue of this day's session. That something must be done we are agreed, let us try and agree on what we shall do. Nothing would please your Grand Officers more than to find common ground on which we can all stand, and a common resolution on which we can unanimously vote, and one which shall impress the government, and the Rum Traffic, that the Grand Division of P. E. Island, means business; business every time! Let us remember.

Our fathers fought the foe With many a deadly blow And beat of drum. And great will be our shame If we, who bear their name, Accept the blot and blame Of slaves to run. O glad will be the day When rum has lost its sway, And we are free. Glad offerings then we'll bring To our Almighty King And with loud voices sing Our Jubilee.

It is said that when Abraham Lincoln witnessed an auction of slaves and saw husbands sold away from wives, and children torn from the arms of mothers, and the heartless manner in which the slave buyers dealt with these human chattels, he forced his way through the crowd and gripped the arm of his friend and with voice husky with suppressed passion said, "If ever I get a chance to hit at this thing, by the Eternal God I'll hit it hard."

The time has come, representatives, when we must hit hard, we have too long been playing at prohibition, and not striking definite death blows at the liquor curse. Let us rise and show we are in earnest, and be like the quaker who raised his gun to shoot a burglar, at the same time saying, "look out friend I don't want to hurt thee, but I am going to shoot just where thou art standing." We must shoot, and if the political party is the way we can't help it, we must shoot or be charged with cowardice and insincerity.

We are glad to welcome to our Island and our Grand Division the Rev. Dr. Alder Temple P. M. W. Patriarch, and one of our most earnest workers.

We shall place before you the encouraging report of the Grand Superintendent of Juvenile work showing four companies in good working order and nearly 300 members, let the Divisions all adopt a company and thus train our future politicians, and public men in the elements of temperance.

And now brethren I will not detain you longer from the duties of today, but trust you will do your best to make this a most memorable session.

After this the Division took recess until 2 p. m. At that time the Grand Worthy Patriarch took the chair and proceeded with the usual business. Five new members were initiated into the Grand Division. Bro Ernest S. Weeks, G. Scribe, was elected to represent the Grand Division at the National Division in October next.

It was moved and carried that an invitation be extended to the National Division to meet in Charlottetown in July, 1900. The following resolutions were unanimously adopted:—

(1.) We exceedingly regret the attitude of the Dominion government in refusing to enact a prohibitory law and deem the answer given by the Premier unprecedented and unsatisfactory.

(2.) We condemn in strongest terms the opening of a bonded warehouse at Cardigan in the house of a notorious Scott Act violator, and ask our friends in every part of the province to use their influence with our representatives at Ottawa to have this glaring wrong speedily rectified.

(3.) With regard to the prevalent use of beer we realize that this is a difficult matter to legislate upon, while parties make oath that it is not intoxicating.

Our only course is to discountenance in every possible way and teach our people to give this devil's kindling wood a wide berth.

(4.) We sympathize with our friends in Charlottetown in their endeavor to lessen the sale of intoxicating liquors. We deem them to be the best judges of what course to be pursued. We trust however they will never sanction any course bearing on its face the resemblance of license.

In the evening a public meeting was held and an interesting programme read.

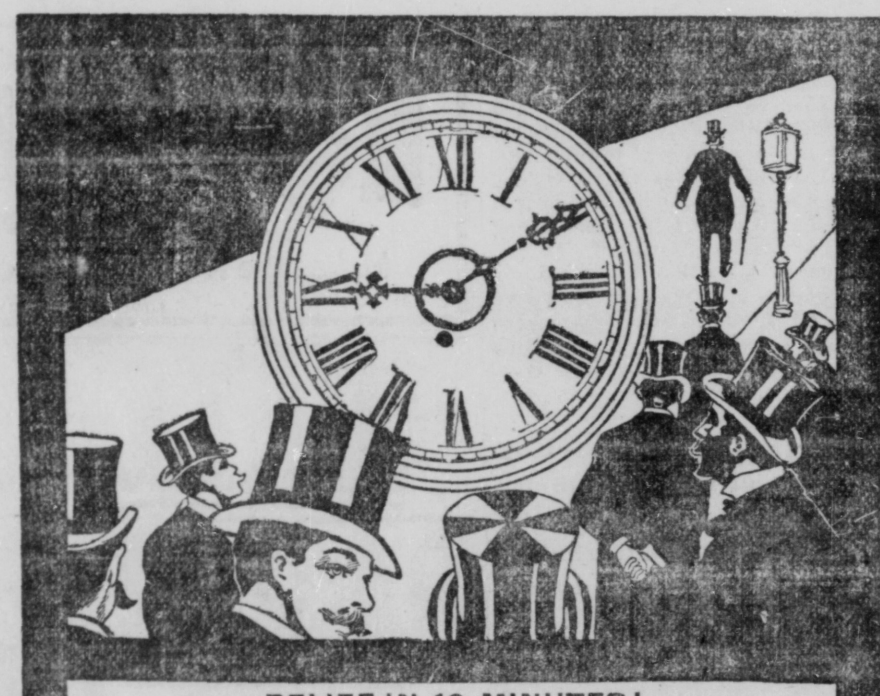
