The Presidential Election.

In the United States the row about the next presidential election is now in full swing. Both parties are discussing, in vigorous language, the strength and weakness, the good qualities and the bad qualities, of those who are most likely to be chosen as candidates.

For Arthur—Alabama, 20; Arkansas, 14; Delaware, 1; Georgia, 24; Illinois, 6; Indiana, 6; Kansas, 2; Kentucky, 4; Louisiana, 15; Massachusetts, 12; Minnesota, 2; Mississippi, 17; Missouri, 9; Nebraska, 2; New York, 28; North Carolina, 8; Pennsylvania, 17; South Carolina, 18; Tennessee, 18; Virginia, 22; Wisconsin, 2; District of Columbia, 2. Total, 250.

For Blaine—Delaware, 5; Indiana, 7; Iowa, 2; Kansas, 4; Kentucky, 2; Maine, 4; Maryland, 12; Michigan, 16; Minnesota, 3; Mississippi, 1; Missouri, 11; New Jersey, 12; New York, 30; Ohio, 27; Pennsylvania, 43; Tennessee, 4; Wisconsin, 2; Arizona, 2; Dakota, 2. Total, 189.

The Democrats have not yet reported; and it is uncertain whether Tilden and Hendricks, or some other team, will bear their standard.

As to the general result, the Boston Advertiser says:—

There are 401 electoral votes to be divided between the parties, 202 being a majority. The democrats see their way easily to the electoral votes of these States:—

The Republicans, in the table, lacking fifty-one electoral votes of the required 202, could secure a majority without New York and Indiana, if they carried Ohio, California, Connecticut, New Jersey and Virginia. These states would give them fifty-eight votes, or seven more than the number needed.

Ecclesiastical News.

The Easter services in the St. John churches were more than usually bright this year. All the principal churches, including Trinity, St. Paul's (the Valley), the Mission Chapel, St. Jude's, Carleton, and St. Luke's, Portland, were decorated with beautiful flowers.

Surplised choirs are gradually supplanting, throughout Canada, the somewhat troublesome mixed. There are now several in the diocese of Fredericton where a few years ago there was none, and in the dioceses of Nova Scotia, Quebec, Montreal, Ontario and Toronto, they are increasing year by year.

The Synod of the Ecclesiastical Province of Rupertland will meet at Winnipeg in August. Mr. Young will then be consecrated to the new Canadian bishopric, which is to extend over the southern part of the Diocese of Athabasca.

Trinity Church, New York, possesses an annual income of \$500,000, of which \$75,000 comes from the offertory. It has six churches and chapels in its parish, eighteen clergy, and nearly 5000 communicants.

The aged Bishop of Salisbury is about to apply for a suffragan.

The Church of England Temperance Society has offered two prizes—one of \$3,500 and the other of \$1,000—for common drinks that can be used as substitutes or beer.

The results of Easter meetings throughout Nova Scotia speak of a satisfactory state of things. In many cases salaries have been raised, and in many others the churches show a balance on the right side.

Dynamite in Ontario.

ATTEMPT TO DESTROY THE ONTARIO PARLIAMENT BUILDINGS—THE PLOTTERS EVIDENTLY SCARED AWAY—THE CARTRIDGES READY FOR THE BATTERY.

(Special to St. John Daily Telegraph.)

A profound sensation was caused around the Parliament Buildings, Toronto, on the 30th ult. The buildings contain a regular population of many persons, who live there with their families for the care and protection of the buildings, in addition to a great number of clerks.

TWO DYNAMITE CARTRIDGES OF THE MOST POWERFUL KIND were discovered. Wire and fuse were attached, and though the connection has not yet been traced to a battery, there is not the slightest doubt that they were ready for an explosion at a very short notice.

WITH THE SAME DEADLY PURPOSE. Again the same arrangements were completed. The dynamite was in two cartridges; the wire was attached. The preparations had been made for the attachment of the dynamite to the building.

The officials at the Parliament buildings say that they have not seen any suspicious character about the buildings lately. The dynamite, however, must have been placed in these ventilators on the 30th, else they would have been discovered before.

THE EXPLOSIVES. The cartridges found are about six inches long by an inch and a half in diameter. They weigh between a quarter and a half a pound. They are called "Eva No. 2," and are manufactured by the A. N. Powder Co., of Chicago.
