Durnan Was One Of The NHL's Best

Bill Durnan, Montreal's goaltender supreme in the National Hockey League of the '60s, a salesman with the Dow Brewery Company in Quebec, holds the modern record of 309 minutes and 21 seconds of shutout hockey, a mark that will probably never be duplicated, as it means, in effect, five full games and nine minutes and twenty-one seconds of the sixth, without being scored upon. And if there is any goalie around today who seem able to perform a similar feat, his name escapes us.

New 51 years of age, Durnan, who won the Vezina trophy six times, credits his success in hockey to the fact that he was ambidextrous, and it was a coach of childhood days who insisted on Bill's perfecting the art of being able to use both hands equally well. "It was a tremendous asset, and I owe it to Steve Fawcett, one of my coaches in a church league, it shows how much kids can learn from coaches and church leaders," Bill stated.

William Ronald Durnan, who was born in Toronto, came up to the Canadiens in 1945, after their regular goalie, Paul Bibeault went into the armed forces. That year, the Habs walked off with the league championship with the greatest of ease, losing but five games over the 50-game schedule of that time. Of course, it was wartime, and many thought that when the stars who had gone off to conflict returned, that Durnan, who had won the Vezina in his first year, would not shine as brightly. But this was not to be the case, and the crack netminder won the prized trophy every year, with the exception of '47-48 when Toronto's great Turk Broda took it, until his last year in the league.

Durnan, who names Butch Bouchard as the greatest defenceman who ever played in front of him, was nominated to hockey's Hall of Fame several years after he retired, and says "I think that would be the ultimate glory for almost any hockey player, 't winning both the Vezina trophy and the Stanley Cup in my rookie year was a joy which could never be duplicated."

PHILLIES WANT WILHELM

The Philadelphia Phillies of the National Baseball League are interested in acquiring veteran knuckleball artist Hoyt Wilhelm from the Chicago White Sox. It was anyone other than Wilhelm, who is 43 years of age, it would seem odd indeed for a club to be hot in pursuit of a pitcher of this vintage, but it is Wilhelm, and the desire of the Phillies is easily understandable.

The great reliever is a unique case, in that he throws the knuckleball so effortlessly, and keeps himself in such top-notch condition, that he never seems to tire. He can work as often as any relief hurler half his age, and when someone asked him, in jest, whether he still planned to be in the majors when he was 50, he said seriously, "why not?"

Even though Wilhelm didn't pitch until a couple of months after the past season opened, due to a broken finger, the old clogger won five, lost two, and had an ERA of 1.57. The latest issue of the Sporting News states that there wasn't a mounder in the American League who was more effective than the master of the flutterball.

Reply To Yesterday's Letter Concerning Game Birds

Dear Sir,—Since I was to a considerable extent involved in the Hungarian game bird collection program this fall, I think that I should comment on several points in Dr. W.L. MacDonald's amazing letter, published in the Sports Forum on Friday. The purpose of wing collecting is to obtain an age ratio of juvenile: adult birds; from this ratio population status can be inferred. This is a common technique in wildlife biology, being employed with useful results in many parts of Europe and North America. Dr. MacDonald states that anyone would know that a covey contains only two adult birds, and that wing collection is thus of no value. Unfortunately, this is not true; a covey is not always equal to a family group, but may contain non-breeding birds or more than one family group. I am surprised that Dr. MacDonald does not know this rather elementary fact. On another point, I asked for information from hunters on where birds were shot. I am fully aware that Huns do not stay in one place all the time, but move, for example, from sleeping to feeding areas during the day (in fact, all animals, including birds, do this; it is a major part of behavior). I hesitated to make the hunter questionnaire too complicated, believing that hunters would not bother answering too many questions, but would answer a few, which might give useful information on cover preference. Happily, this questionnaire has given us some answers on cover. There is, I believe, little else on which I should comment. Dr. MacDonald's opinions on the effect of declining horse numbers and "interbreeding" I find rather weird, but I am prepared to wait until he produces some evidence on these points. I regret that he found nothing to shoot this fall, but one must always remember that hunting success requires a good deal of patience and knowledge of game. I have commented in an earlier letter about the irrational search for a scape-goat (or scape-skunk) which one can blame for all our game problems, so will not do so again, although I believe that Dr. MacDonald's letter is excellent verification for my case. Unanimous Decision Goes To Dick Tiger After 15 Rounds

By JACK HAND NEW YORK (AP)—Dick Tiger, 37-year-old Nigerian, became the first former middleweight champion in 63 years to win the light heavyweight crown when he dethroned Jose Torres on a unanimous decision in 15 rousing rounds Friday night at Madison Square Garden. Tiger, fighting for the six kids back home in Africa, away weight, age, reach and height while upsetting the 3-0-1 favorite before a crowd of 13,654 that paid \$100,000. Torres piled up a wide early lead and appeared on his way to a decisive victory until Tiger began to catch up with him in the middle rounds. The Nigerian, who lost the middleweight crown to Emile Griffith last April 25, sweat down the stretch with a fine rally. TORRES AMAZED Torres, 175, a native of Puerto Rico now living in New York, stood in wonder when the first scorecard was announced. Referee Johnny Lo Bianco had scored it 10-5 for Tiger. When the cards of judge Tony Castellano, 8-4-1, and judge Frank Forbes, 10-4-1, were announced, Torres went to moping and shook hands with his conqueror. The Associated Press had Tiger the winner 8-4-1. Always a slow starter, Tiger, 167, had trouble untracking himself Friday as Torres scored consistently with his left jab. 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Cowboys Go After First NFL Title With Meredith

Quarterback Don Meredith, recovered from a concussion, will be back in the starting lineup Sunday as Dallas Cowboys aim for their first National Football League conference title. The Cowboys were within eight seconds of winning the Eastern Conference last week when Charlie Gogolak's field goal shattered a 31-31 tie and gave Washington Redskins the victory. Cleveland Browns take their 25 record into St. Louis against the 8-4 Cardinals today in a game that is a must-for-both teams. Either Cardinals win or they are eliminated from the Eastern Conference race; the Browns must win or they have no chance of representing the East in the Miami Playoff Bowl. Should Cleveland come through with a victory or a tie, Dallas wins the East; if not, Dallas must beat or tie the lowly (1-11-1) New York Giants to avoid meeting the Cards in a playoff the following Sunday. The return of Meredith is expected to be a big boost for Dallas. He was sidelined in the second half of the game against Washington last week. Second-string quarterbacks Craig Morton and Jerry Rhoads alternated in running the team from there, producing 24 points and combining for five pass completions in nine attempts for 114 yards. A sellout crowd of 50,000 is expected for today's game between the Cards and Cleveland. In other season finale Sunday, Green Bay Packers, who have the Western Conference locked up, play at Los Angeles; Baltimore is at San Francisco; Minnesota at Chicago; Philadelphia at Washington, and Pittsburgh at Atlanta. St. Louis, hobbled by injuries, again will be without regular quarterback Charlie Johnson and centre Bob Demarco.
