

## New Magazine Has Difficulty

MONTREAL (CP) — Publisher Robert B. Hershorn of Montreal says in the third issue of Exchange that the magazine may have to cease publication unless it obtains more financial support.

In a statement in the February-March issue, Mr. Hershorn said the magazine needs an additional \$40,000 capital or an additional 6,000 subscriptions within the next month to become self-supporting.

Paid subscriptions now total approximately 1,700. Efforts were being made to form a syndicate to raise the necessary capital.

The magazine, designed as a Canadian review of current thinking in French and English Canada, first appeared in October. It was meant to be a monthly. A second issue appeared in December. The Canada Council gave the magazine a \$4,000 grant to help with a combined February-March issue.

Editor Stephen Vintancey said in an interview experience has shown it is possible to go broke even in publishing a high-class magazine which people want to read.

## Police Force Is Disbanded

MONTREAL (CP)—City council in suburban LaSalle has decided to disband its police force and entrust law enforcement to the Philips Investigation Bureau.

LaSalle Police Chief Edouard Lefebvre, who was dismissed from his post last month, later charged he was fired because of "political revenge."

Cost of the service by the agency is estimated at \$52,000 a year, about \$12,000 less than the cost of maintaining the regular force, a town official said.

The service will include a patrol car, a chief, a sergeant, a secretary and 11 constables.

The city is to advise the policemen's union of the change this week. The Philips agency also polices the town of Lachute, Que.

## Common Market Called Threat To Commonwealth

LONDON (CP)—Arthur Woolley, director of a British company with interests in Canada, told an Anglo-Canadian audience here he is "gravely concerned" that Britain's entry into the European Economic Community may weaken Commonwealth links.

If that happens, he said, it would be "disastrous." The "entity of the Commonwealth" must be preserved at all costs.

Woolley was addressing a luncheon meeting of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce in Great Britain. His company, Booker Brothers, McConnell Limited, with sugar and rum interests in the Caribbean and British Guiana, has a \$10,000,000 stake in Canada.

Woolley was thanked by Rene McMullen, agent-general for Alberta. The two once served together in the British South African police.

## Race Upsets Seen Sat.

In a spectacular upset, Physican, a rank outsider, won the \$145,000 Santa Anita Handicap at Arcadia, Calif., Saturday. Alberta Ranches' Four - and-Twenty, the 3-to-5 choice, finished third.

Physican, a five-year-old gelding who ran as an entry with Prove It and Olden Times, came tearing out of nowhere in the stretch and was pulling away from Olden Times and Four-and-Twenty at the wire.

The winner, a probably 100-to-1 shot if he had run alone, won by 2 1/4 lengths over Olden Times. Physican carried 114 pounds, 15 less than Four-and-Twenty and one more than Olden Times.

It was upset day at Hialeah Track near Miami, Fla., too. There, Calumet Farm's Yorky beat Carry Back at a neck in the \$134,800 widener handicap.

It was the first victory for Yorky, five-year-old son of Bull Les, since he won the same stakes last year. Yorky ran as an entry with Beau Prince at odds of 19-50-5.

Carry Back, 11-to-10 favorite, staged a pulse-tingling finish and was beaten by a neck. Amphipose was third, three lengths back, and Beau Prince fourth.

## Starr Is Queried On UIA Changes

OTTAWA (CP) — Labor Minister Starr has told the Commons that amendments to the Unemployment Insurance Act must await recommendations by the special committee of inquiry now studying its terms.

Paul Martin (L—Essex East) asked whether the government would give the Commons an assurance the amendments would be proceeded with before Parliament is dissolved for a general election.

Mr. Martin said the amendments were first promised four years ago and were mentioned in the throne speech for last session.

Mr. Starr said he was not aware of specific promises and that the special committee was still studying the act. Mr. Martin called the study "a diversionary tactic" and said the unemployment insurance fund had reached a "perilously" low level.

# Hillcrest Site Is Chosen For Housing Development

A decision by the department of national defence to build new housing units on a Hillcrest Park site at Summerside was announced Saturday afternoon by an official of Hillcrest Housing Ltd. who told the Guardian they had been advised that the Hillcrest site has been chosen as the location for the 275 units.

The new construction will bring the total to 575 units at the Hillcrest Park site, represented by 100 units completed two years ago, 200 others now under construction and the newly announced 275 which will be commenced this summer.

## BIG BOOST FOR TOWN

Based on actual figures for the first 100 units that have been occupied, G. Keith Pickard, architect for Hillcrest Housing Ltd., pointed out the financial benefits that the town of Summerside will enjoy when the entire project is completed.

On the 575 housing units, he said the real estate taxes will be about \$100,000; personal property taxes about \$15,000; poll taxes about \$8,400; tax on automobiles about \$22,500 for a yearly total town revenue of about \$148,000 from the Hillcrest housing development.

Added to this, he pointed out, will be 575 steadily employed RCAF personnel members with a combined earning income of about \$2 1/2 million annually, and apart from this will be business expansion in the area providing more civilian employment to supply the additional goods and services that will be required by some 2,500 RCAF family members who will be living in the Hillcrest Park area.

Mr. Pickard said that these 275 new housing units simply completed the plan envisaged from the beginning when Hillcrest first approached the town.

## ENDS CONTROVERSY

The decision to build on the Hillcrest site ends a controversy that has delayed the project while one of three or four offered sites was selected. Main contenders for the location of the project were the successful Hillcrest Housing Ltd. group and the town of Summerside.

The town offered a site on town-owned property near the new Elm Street school on the Northwest side of the town, while the Hillcrest Company proposed that the new units be built on a site adjacent to and north of the present Hillcrest Park project on either side of Granville Street North. It is on this latter site that the new rental homes for RCAF personnel will be constructed.

Word of the decision to build on the Hillcrest Park site was received from Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation who

## BEGIN THIS SUMMER

The letter indicated that they expected to complete preliminary work that would enable construction to start during the coming summer, even before the completion of the 200 units now under construction, which company officials say will be ready for occupancy by September.

It is expected that the newly announced units will be completed during the summer of next year. Announcement that 275 more units for urban military housing in Summerside was planned was made last September 11th.

Summerside's Mayor W. A. Currie said last evening that the decision to proceed soon with the new housing project would be welcomed by all citizens of Summerside and said "I am indeed pleased that the project will be located within the town."

## Renewed Missionary Charge Denied By Harvard Officials

BINGHAMTON, N.Y. (AP)—A Protestant missionary has renewed reports that warfare among native tribes in Dutch New Guinea was encouraged by a Harvard expedition, of which Michael Rockefeller was a member, so that films could be made of the fighting.

Harvard officials called it a "baseless charge" and said that the Dutch government had "investigated rumors started by missionaries" and found them to be without foundation.

A spokesman for governor Nelson Rockefeller, Michael's father, said the youth was attached to the expedition as an unpaid art collector and did not have photographic equipment.

The Rev. H. M. Lake, 36, on leave until July from the Christian and Missionary Alliance Church in New Guinea, said however, that he could "speak with authority" because some natives from the area in which he worked took part in the battles.

"We know that some were killed," he said.

"We have no doubt in our minds" that members of the expedition were the cause of the fighting, the missionary said.

Mr. Lake said natives were offered steel axes to renew warfare with traditional enemies.

The anthropologists wanted "to get movies of every possible phase" of tribal life, he said.

Michael Rockefeller, 23, was lost last November when a boat in which he was riding capsized off the south coast of New Guinea in what were described as shark-infested waters.

He had stayed in New Guinea
