CONNAUGHT RIFLE RANGES, Ottawa, Aug. 16—(Special)—Sgt. G. A. Coles continued to lead Island rifle shots here at the close of the third day of Dominion competitions. His 388 total was two better than Mary MacLennan in second position among Island team members. P. T. Hooper was in third place with 385 followed by P. J. Landrigan and A. M. Johnston, each with 384. A. J. McCabe, R. Jenkins and W. M. Beatty were bracketed in fifth place each counting 392. A. F. Gormley, Ray MacDonald and E. R. Burke were tied in sixth position with 391's.

Lt. P. T. Hooper (17th Recce)

placed 28th in the MacDonald-Brier competition with 119 out of a possible 125. Mary MacLennan placed 37th with 118. Other Island team members placing in the match were, P. J. Landrigan, A. M. Johnston, A. F. Gormley, W. M. Beatty, F. Hooper, A. J. McCabe, G. A. Coles, E. R. Burke and J. E. MacKenzie.

CONNAUGHT RIFLE RANGES, South March, Ont., Aug. 16—(CP)—The MacDonald Match was the feature today at the annual shoot of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association near Ottawa, as Gilmour S. Boa of the 48th Highlanders Regiment, Toronto, posted 122 out of a possible 150 to capture the MacDonald Challenge Shield.

Two other marksmen, W. E. E. Wright of Montreal and C. W. Thomas of Edmonton, tied with scores of 121 from 300 and 600 yards.

Twelve posted scores of 120 and 15 posted scores of 119 in the 244 entries.

The Royal Horse Artillery of Hamilton, Ont., won the Kirkpatrick Cup with a score of 1,131, highest aggregate score in the Tilton, Connaught, Bankers' and MacDougall Matches. It is the second consecutive year that the Hamilton team carried away the cup.

## Kid Gavilan Wins By Kayo

MONTREAL, Aug. 16—(CP)—Kid Gavilan, of Havana, Cuba, tonight knocked out Johnny Greco, of Montreal, Canadian welterweight champion, at 2:21 of the sixth round in a scheduled 10-round boxing match here. Gavilan weighed 147 1/2, Greco 150.

Greco was leading by a wide margin when the dusky Cuban dropped the Canadian-Italian with a blistering right cross to the jaw. Greco stayed down for the full count, lying on his stomach. The lethal blow came at 2:21.

It was Gavilan's second appearance in the Montreal ring, last spring he earned a 10-round decision over France's Laurent Dauthuille.

Bud Abner was also the leading winner of that event, taking wins in the last two dashes, while Sunny B., owned by Don MacAulay of Pughwash, N.S., was the winner of the first dash.

The other leading winner of the night was Miss Judy Dale, owned and driven by Earl Buell, coping off honors in the first and third dashes of the Classified Trot while Judy Kalmuck was the winner of the sandwich dash.

Josedale Hoosier, Jean Henley and Eleanor G. split the top honors in the A. Pickard classified pace, Dr. Bishop's Hoosier horse taking the first with Burt driving, Kennedy piloting his own Jean Henley in the second, while Teddy Wier brought Mrs. P. C. Brown's Eleanor G. home, the big winner in the final dash of the night.

The only two accidents to occur this week took place during last night's meet, and both in the same division of horses. The first occurred in the second dash of the Henderson and Cudmore pace, when Ed Spruce and Lee Brewer collided as a London horse, Sam Winnie's Grean (Gould) was rounding the first turn on to the backstretch, with Red Spruce going down and up again to drag driver Wier for some distance before he brought him under control. Neither horses or drivers suffered serious injury as all were out on the track for the next dash, in fact Lee Brewer C. and driver Claude O'Brien came through for a place position in the next event of that division.

It was Sunny B. and driver Frank Daniels that suffered the other spill. Going wide open and take the big event. More than 10,000 fans crowded the village for the meet and saw the most competitive race in derby history.
