## PARLIAMENT OF CANADA.

### Our Marine and Fisheries.

(SPECIAL CORRESPONDENCE OF THE EXAMINER.)

The report of the Minister of Marine and Fisheries for the year ended 30th June, 1892, shows the total expenditure of the Marine branch to have been \$801,434, being \$12,692 less than the previous year, and \$2,957 less than the appropriation. The whole number of persons engaged in the Marine outside service is 1439. The expenditure for maintenance of lighthouses and coast service amounted to \$450,155, and for construction of lights \$36,804 a decrease of \$6,238 as compared with the previous year, and \$14,625 less than the Parliamentary grant.

The total number of light stations, light ships and fog alarm stations in the Dominion on 30th June, 1892, was 611, and of lights shown, 730; the number of steam-whistles and fog-horns, 56; the number of light-keepers and engineers of fog-alarms, with masters of lightships, 624. On 31st December, 1892, there were 198 light-stations, 227 lighthouses, 2 fog-whistles and no fog-horns; on 31st December, 1892, there were 617 light-stations, 841 light-houses, 23 fog-whistles and 34 fog-horns.

**FISHING BOUNTIES.**

The total number of claims received in 1891 was 19,663, against 18,071 in 1890, being an increase of 1,592; 1,177 were rejected for informalities. The number of claims paid in 1891 was 18,506, against 17,959 in 1890. The total amount of bounties paid in 1891, on the basis of \$1.50 per ton to vessels, \$3 per man to boat fishermen, and \$1 per boat to owners, was \$156,892. The number of vessels receiving bounty in 1891 was 705, with a tonnage of 26,535 tons, showing a decrease of 34 vessels, and a tonnage of 1,735 tons, as compared with the previous year. The number of boats receiving bounty was 17,701, and the number of boat fishermen to whom bounty was paid was 33,537, an increase of 533 boats and 262 fishermen since 1890. The total number of fishermen in vessels and boats, to whom bounty was paid in 1891 was 33,859, against 39,050 in 1890.

**STEAMER STANLEY.**

The Stanley began her winter trips on 1st December, 1891, and continued to run between Charlottetown and Pictou till 15th January, when the route was changed to Georgetown and Pictou. The Charlottetown route was resumed on 23rd January for two days only. The Stanley remained on the Georgetown and Pictou route until 25th March, when she returned to the Charlottetown and Pictou route, and continued running there till the 18th April, when the winter season closed. The season was unusually mild, and not much interruption was caused by ice. The vessel was, however, caught in the ice on 2nd March and remained until 6th March, when she arrived at Pictou. From the 8th to 13th March was occupied in cleaning boilers. The number of passengers carried during the winter season was 1276, and the receipts therefrom, including berths and meals, was \$4,093. The receipts for freight were \$23 85, making total receipts \$6,478. The cost of maintaining the boat was \$14,987. On 18th of April, the steamer went to Pictou for repairs, where she remained till 15th June, when she was put in commission in the fishery protection service, in which she continued till 8th of October.

In the year 1885-86, it cost \$505,929 to maintain 625 lighthouses, 23 fog-whistles and 16 fog-horns. Last year, it cost only \$445,140 to maintain 741 lighthouses, 23 fog-whistles and 34 fog-horns. An increase of 116 lighthouses and 18 fog-horns and a decrease of over \$60,000 in cost.

In 1887-88, the cost of maintaining the Dominion steamers—8 in number—was \$150,659; last year it was \$127,406—a reduction of \$23,000.

**ICEBOAT MAIL SERVICE.**

This service began on the 24th February, 1892, and was continued to 31st March. Except where actually required only four boats were employed, which were manned by six men each. An extra boat and crew were put on when necessary. A total of 59 crossings was made, which seems few compared with previous winters, but last winter the work did not commence until nearly two months later, owing to the mild season. 1749 bags of mail were carried and 94 passengers with their baggage taken over. Total weight carried, about 52,000 lbs. The earnings, irrespective of carrying the mails, were \$250, and the cost of maintenance for the year, \$3,309. Plans and specification for a boathouse at Cape Tormentine are in preparation to accommodate the iceboats and a lifeboat for that station, but arrangements have not yet been made to build.

**SICK SEAMEN.**

The amount expended on the Island on account of sick and distressed seamen was \$1,222, and the receipts \$475. Sick seamen are cared for at the Charlottetown and P. E. Island Hospitals at the same rate as is paid to public hospitals in other parts of the Dominion. The P. E. I. Hospital admitted five sick seamen, giving them treatment for 122 days; amount paid, \$109 80. At the Charlottetown Hospital, eighteen men received treatment for a total of 537 days, at a cost of \$482 30.

There is a marine hospital building at Souris, the property of the Government. It is a substantial wooden building, but requires a good stove foundation. Temporary repairs were made to the foundation, costing \$250, to prepare it for renting. It was offered for sale last November, but only one tender was received, and for so small an amount that it was not accepted.

Referring to the meteorological system, the report says that for the six months ended 30th June last, 289 storm warnings were issued, and 228 of them were verified—a percentage of 78.9.

**LOBSTER HATCHING.**

The report on the fisheries branch contains the following remarks upon lobster hatching:

"The artificial culture of lobsters is no longer an experiment, but an established success. Mr. Ogden, the officer in charge of the Bay View hatchery in Pictou County, states that after making necessary improvements, he secured his first supply of eggs on the 19th of May, and continued to do so on every favorable day following until the 6th July. About sixty five millions of eggs were collected from one cannery, less than one hundred yards from the hatchery. The first young lobsters hatched out on the 13th June, and constant attention was given day and night to the eggs and fry till rested to the sea. The distribution covered an area of sixty miles—that is about one million to the mile—extending from Arisaig, Antigonish County, to Pugwash, Cumberland Co. Care was taken to select proper rocky bottoms at a certain distance from the shore, for distributing the young lobsters. These were poured out from the deck of a low steamer, with a dipper from a height not exceeding five feet, or let through a hose about eight feet long trailing in the water. Very few eggs were lost. The officer in charge of the hatchery says that a young lobster when hatched measures about one-quarter of an inch in length; at one year old it measures two inches, and grows at the rate of about two inches every year; so that a lobster of seven and a half or eight inches in length would be four years old."

The oyster experts report the beds at Shediac, Beauceville, Cocagne and Richibucto in a deplorable condition, caused by the ravages of mud-diggers. They say that the rake at present used in Canada must be discarded, as it is very destructive to oyster brood and grounds. Throughout the whole of their inspection they report as a remarkable fact that they did not find a single marine enemy to the oyster. Another cause of destruction is fishing through the ice.
