New Business Based On Simple Take-It Kit

VANCOUVER (CP) — Two men have started a new business based on simplicity itself. In fact the idea is so simple that many small industrialists will kick themselves for not having thought of it themselves. With the promotional support of the giant lumber enterprise of MacMillan, Blouin & Co., Powell River Company Ltd., Watson and Sisk Winery are producing "make-it" kits—24 by 32-inch plywood panels on which are superimposed colored plans for bird houses, gas stations, peck-a-bol doll houses, a child's blackboard desk, chair and a tool kit. Even a boy with reasonable skill can cut along the edge of the painted lines with a saw and assemble the pieces with a hammer and one-inch nails and glue.

Probe Ordered Of Nazi Youth

LONDON (Reuters) — Education officials have ordered an investigation into the activities for Christmas. Already negotiations are in progress for expansion of the United States. They hope to sell kits across Canada next year. Mr. Watson, a lithographer and skilled silkscreen technician, developed the process of painting the design on the plywood panels. Mr. Winsey, a business man saw the potential of the development and arranged financing.

Criminal Code Offences Mount

OTTAWA (CP)—An increase of nearly 10 per cent last year in Criminal Code offences committed in Canadian municipalities was reported here by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. Assaults, burglary and theft were on the increase and there were fewer murders, attempted murder and manslaughter cases. The report said 431,507 Criminal Code offences across Canada were reported to DBS, but it made clear that this did not represent all of the country's crime. The total did not include cases handled by the Quebec Provincial Police. Also excluded were traffic code offences. Almost half of the reported Criminal Code offences — 46.7 per cent — were offences there were 201,309 theft cases, 13 per cent more than in 1961. Because the number of assaults causing bodily harm — 7,737 — was 18.6 per cent higher, and because entering cases increased by 7.2 per cent to 17,670. The number of murders reported declined five per cent to 189, attempted murders declined 13.6 per cent to 74, manslaughter cases down 30.8 per cent to 48, and cases of criminal negligence causing death down 8.8 per cent to 80.

West led a diamond, and South made the contract with two overtricks. If it were the diamond, drew three rounds of trumps, cashed the remaining diamonds, discarding hearts from dummy, and lost only a club trick. He scored 1,190 points.

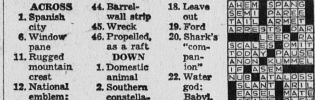
