Cabinet Minister Says New Service Rendered

NORTH RUSTICO—It was announced at a Conservative rally held here by P.E.I.'s representative in the federal cabinet, Hon. J. Angus MacLean, minister of fisheries, that two research boats with highly qualified scientists on board were currently located in the Gulf of St. Lawrence. The boats are operated by the department.

The minister told the fishermen which largely comprised the audience, that if these boats should find quantities of fish, then they would quickly notify shore as to the location, quantity and quality of these fish.

The cabinet minister happily assured his audience, that these "floating laboratories" which he called the boats would very definitely be sent out next year as soon as the ice broke up, adding that they would cover all of the waters surrounding Prince Edward Island.

Prompt Action Saves Girl From Drowning At Cardigan

MONTAGUE—Nine year-old Gaylene Matheson of Cardigan was saved from almost sure death by drowning in the Cardigan River by the quick action of Ronnie MacDonald, 23-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Earl MacDonald of Cardigan.

He immediately jumped in and swam fully clothed to the spot, a distance of about 30 yards from shore and brought the child safely to shore.

Due to the swift action of Mr. MacDonald she suffered no ill effects.

MONTAGUE—An unauthorized car ride Friday night has resulted in Vernon MacKay of Murray River being taken into custody by the police and booked on a charge of joyriding, taking a motor vehicle without the

consent of the owner. The accused is slated to appear in County Magistrate's Court next Wednesday.

MONTREAL (CP)—Montreal retired its last streetcar Sunday. A 10-mile-an-hour parade followed the last tram as it creaked its run from the northeast Rosemount district to the Montreal Transportation Commission barns.

Diesel buses and trolley buses have replaced the slow, traffic-jamming trams.

Prominent N. Glasgow Man Dies Suddenly At Residence

The death occurred suddenly at his home in New Glasgow, P.E.I. of Revel L. Dickieson in his 50th year. His passing came unexpectedly late Saturday night sometime between the hour that he retired to bed and midnight. A son of Mrs. (Rev.) Paul

Richardson, New Glasgow and the late Breaton Dickieson, he had always been a resident of New Glasgow and one of the district's most prominent businessmen.

In 1928 he opened a small general store in the village in a building directly across the street from where his business was located at the time of his death. Two years ago Mr. Dickieson completely remodelled the store and shortly after became affiliated with one of the larger Maritime food chain stores.

Besides being a well known general merchant he held the agency in that district for the Imperial Oil Company since 1929. Despite the amount of work involved in these two occupations, Mr. Dickieson also found time to carry out the duties of sales manager for the New Glasgow Dairying Company.

A lifetime member of the Christian Church of New Glasgow, he was also the secretary-treasurer of the New Glasgow Medical Centre. In sports he was an ardent golfer, fisherman and hunter and also had a great interest in harness racing.

Besides his wife, the former Margaret MacLean of Graham's Road, and his mother, Mr. Dickieson is survived by two children, Frederick, at home, and (Sheila) Mrs. Angus MacLaren of Charlottetown. Also surviving are two brothers, Wallace and Harold, both of New Glasgow and one grandson, Ronald MacLaren.

This morning his remains will be transferred to his home where they will lie until Tuesday afternoon. Funeral services will be conducted at 2 o'clock at the Christian Church with interment in the New Glasgow cemetery.

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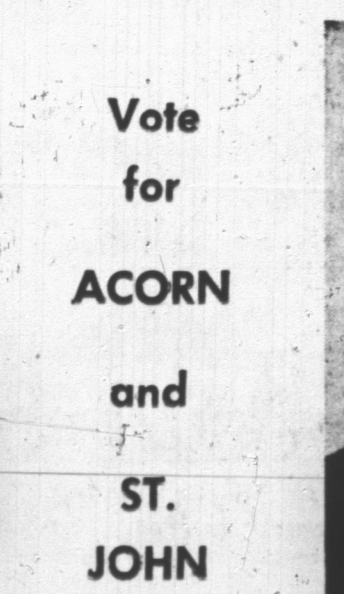
