### Let's Talk It Over

In the Choral reading of the recent Music Festival grade 10 pupils were given 117 lines of poetry to commit to memory, almost half of what they are required to memorize during the whole school year in their regular class work.

PLAYGROUNDS COMMISSION A delegation from the Playgrounds Commission headed by Brig. W. W. Reid presented a brief to the Council stressing the aims and needs of the commission, the main point of which were as follows:

Hope that the Council would be able this year to equip one playground for city children (Connought Square possibly) was expressed in a report submitted from the Charlottetown Playground Commission.

"For a grant of \$1,000 per annum," the report stated, "citizens of Charlottetown have been getting as good as program as citizens of other cities similar in size are getting out of \$25,000 to \$30,000 expenditures. Comparing results obtained here and those of other cities, it would appear that our efforts are more than worthwhile. However, in order to carry on two things are necessary—new equipment and sites for playgrounds. All funds available in past years have of necessity been used up in paying supervisors' salaries. Hence there is no reserve fund on hand with which to purchase equipment."
