DEATH OF AN ISLANDER.—The body of John A. Story arrived in this city by train from Summerside last evening, and will be interred in the People's cemetery this afternoon. Story was about 33 years of age and left the Island about twelve years ago. He has lately been working in Chicago, where the accident occurred which caused his death. It appears that on Thursday last Story was caught in the cog wheels of a hoisting machine in the establishment in which he was employed and had both legs badly crushed. During the process of amputation he died. Story was a member of the Masonic fraternity, and a brother Mason—Mr. Bentley, of Richard Cole Lodge—accompanied the body home from Chicago.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

Change in Tariff.

OTTAWA, July 7. Yesterday Mr. Foster moved that the House go into committee to consider the tariff. He proposed to change molasses below 40 degrees from one-fourth of a cent per gallon to one cent per gallon for each degree below forty. It was intended to place oleaster and degreas, two articles used by tanners upon the free list. Lamb leather for globe making, tin strip waste, nitrate of soda, and crude lime juice, would also be placed upon the free list. A duty of five cents per dozen was to be imposed upon eggs. Continuing, Mr. Foster said that the Government intended taking the power to remove at any time discriminatory duty upon sugars not imported directly from the country of production, and to suspend payment of duties upon sugar, molasses and tobacco imported from certain countries. The British West India colonies had shown a disposition to deal liberally with Canada. They had declined to discriminate against the Dominion in order to obtain advantages offered by the United States, and if other countries were going to discriminate against us, the Government desired to have the power to treat liberally such countries as gave concessions to Canada.

In the tariff matter the resolutions were read a first time.

CHURCH OF ENGLAND SYNOD

HALIFAX, July 7. The Church of England Synod adjourned sine die. Last evening the terms of the Winnipeg Convention were agreed upon and the Quebec scheme adopted.

Homestead strike.

PITTSBURG, Pa., July 7. The latest news from Homestead, Pa., says that at about dusk last night the officers of the Amalgamated Association prevailed upon the strikers to allow the detectives to surrender. At 5 o'clock the strikers guaranteed safe conduct to the detectives provided they left their arms and ammunition behind, and agreed to leave the place under guard. The detectives accepted the terms. On the boats were found seven dead detectives and twenty or thirty wounded, some fatally.

The English Elections.

LONDON, July 7. The latest returns give the Conservatives 94, the Liberals 66, the Liberal Unionists 9, and the McCarthyites 5. After the result of the polling for the east division of Manchester, was announced Balfour, the successful candidate, made an address to an enthusiastic assemblage of his constituents and others. Sir Henry Tyler, running in Yarmouth, is defeated.

American Schooner Capsized.

HALIFAX, July 7. The American three-masted schooner Theresa, captized 25 miles east of this port. All on board were lost except the captain and seven other persons.
