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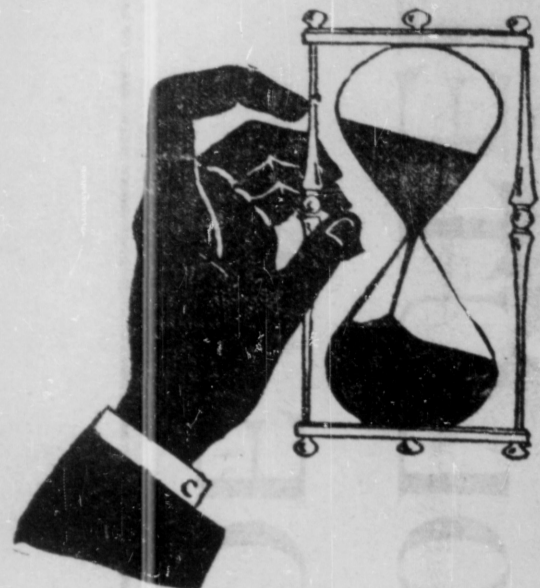

SIR CHAS. TUPPER

SAYS FAREWELL TO PUBLIC LIFE.

Hopes that Canadians will Enjoy
a Common Heritage and a
Common Future.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

MONTREAL, Nov. 10.—Perhaps there never was tendered to any public man in Canada such testimony as awaited Sir Charles Tupper on his arrival in Montreal yesterday.

There were letters and telegrams from every part of the Dominion, expressive of sympathy and good will, and amongst them were messages from six provinces, from the sitting members, offering to resign their seats and promising to work to elect Sir Charles.

When asked what his decision was to be, Sir Charles was firm in the declaration that, under no circumstance, even if offered a seat by acclamation, would he consent to re-enter political life. "I am deeply moved," said Sir Charles, "by the expressions of good will, but my decision is final. For four years I have worked in season and out of season for the good of the party to the best of my ability. I have shortened my life by privations incident to campaign work. My friends are good enough to say very kind things of me and about that work. They are too considerate. But I thank them cordially for their expressions of good-will. In the quiet of my home life I will not be an indifferent spectator of public events. I will take the greatest pleasure in seeing the Conservative party, now united to a man, taking its place in the House of Commons, and before the country, waging their battle by younger men full of vigor, hope and endurance, and having behind them a good cause, securing for the people of Canada wise legislation, righteous laws and fair play to all creeds and nationalities. As I step out of public life I am proud to be able to say that I never used nor countenanced using any but one policy in each and all the provinces. I defy any man to say that I have ever reflected upon any nationality or done other than help to cement the bond of union between all the races as Canadians with a common heritage, and a common future. God forbid that there should be anything but peace and good will throughout the Dominion. There is a great future for the Conservative party, and its future has not, at any time in four years, looked as bright as today.

A bystander said, at these words "It is very generous of you, Sir Charles, as you are quitting public life to give the new men a message so full of hope."

Report at Ottawa.

OTTAWA, Nov. 9.—Local Conservatives have heard with profound regret of Sir Charles Tupper's definite intention to retire from politics. The warmest feeling prevails for the grand old man who put up a fight that commanded the admiration of his friends and foes alike.

French Politics.

PARIS, Nov. 9.—At the close of a long session yesterday, culminating in several exciting discussions, the chamber of deputies adopted a resolution of confidence in the Wad-deck-Rousseau government by 329 votes against 222. The chamber had previously adopted a resolution expressing regret that the government had surrendered to Belgium Spido, the assailant of the Prince of Wales.

FOSTER'S FUTURE.

He Will Probably Secure a Seat.

OTTAWA, Nov. 10.—It is generally expected that Mr. Foster will secure a seat in Parliament, but he will not be able to take up parliamentary duties until two or three weeks after the session has opened. It is a curious thing that while there is ample provision in the law for the resignation of a member during the session or prorogation of parliament there is absolutely no provision existing in the statute for a member resigning his seat after a general election, or before the meeting of parliament. A seat becomes vacant however, by the acceptance by a member of an office of emolument under the Crown.

Newfoundland Elections.

ST. JOHN, Nfld. Nov. 10.—Harbor Grace returns two Tories—C. A. Dawes and Mr. Munn; also one Liberal, E. Dawe.

McKay (Tory) is elected in Port de Grave. Morris in St. John. Both Liberals are elected for Harbor Main, Woods and Knight. Both Liberals for Bay Dwyde. Ferryland elects two Liberals, Cashin and Ryan. Carbonear elects one Liberal, Mr. Maddock by a majority of 84.

Russian Annexation.

TIEN TSIN, via Shanghai, Nov. 8.—General Linevitch, the commander of the Russian troops, has officially notified the foreign consuls through the Russian consul that the land on the river side opposite the British and German settlements has been annexed to Russia by right of conquest. Unless all foreign owners of property immediately deposit documents proving their ownership no claims will be entertained. Much railroad property as well as the east arsenal is included in the territory annexed by Russia.

The consuls will protest against the annexation.

Steyn on His Mettle.

PRETORIA, Nov. 8.—Surrendered burghers assert that Mr. Steyn, after a council of war with General Botha and General Delarey, addressed the burghers with great passion, urging them to continue the war. He told them he was going south and hoped to return with 5,000 men, assuring them that he knew that Germany had delivered an ultimatum to Great Britain, demanding the retrocession of the republic.

Good Crops in Russia.

LONDON, Nov. 9.—The preliminary official report of the Russian crops received here materially conflicts with the rumors of the alleged failure of the Russian cereals which have been circulating for some weeks. According to the report referred to, the wheat crop is 45,150,000 quarters. Rye 97,250,000 quarters, oats 82,000,000 quarters. This is the best wheat crop since 1896.
