TORONTO (CP)—A shapely 17-year-old Toronto girl who was convicted here of stealing a sweater said she got "boiling mad" when she was criticized by Magistrate M. J. Cloney for her appearance.

The magistrate told Mary McLean's lawyer that "the first thing she needs is a new hairdo," referring to the girl's Cleopatra-styled hair.

When the lawyer told Magistrate Cloney she has been promised a job in a restaurant, he added:

"If anyone would give her a job in a restaurant or any other type of job looking like that, they ought to have their head read."

He said her hairdo made her look like "a prehistoric monster," and also told the defendant to "take off those eyelashes."

Miss McLean said Wednesday night: "When I realized what he was saying about me I got boiling mad. Lots of girls wear their hair this way... It's the fashion. And as to my eyelashes—look—they are real. I can't help it if they are long, and anyway I like them that way."

rest of the tricks to make the contract.

He still had the nine of spades left, which he knew could not be successfully ruffed in dummy because East would be able to overruff. He also had a diamond loser to take care of. He could discard one or the other on one of dummy's high hearts; but not both.

Of course, declarer knew he could stake his hopes on a diamond finesse, but he also knew there was practically no chance that this finesse would succeed. It was hardly likely that West, who had shown up during the play with the A-K-Q-10 of spades, would have passed originally if he had also had the king of diamonds.

So rather than rely upon a diamond finesse that looked hopeless, South played a trump to his hand, led the queen of diamonds and went up with the ace when West followed low, and then drew four more rounds of trumps to produce this position:

South now led his last trump. West had to keep the ten of spades—so he discarded a spade. After dummy discarded a diamond, East had to keep the king of diamonds—so he also discarded a heart. Dummy thereupon won the last three tricks with the A-K-10 of hearts.
