Auxiliaries Spurred At YWCA Lecture

KITCHENER Ont. (CP) — Women's auxiliaries and sex-segregated organizations should be abolished says Vivien Batke special service officer for the National Employment Service here.

The whole tribe of auxiliaries should be wiped out. And that includes various wives' associations like the University Wives Association and the Ditchdiggers' Wives Association. It also includes the polite segregation of political parties' organizations. Such parties are no place for segregation by sex.

Mrs. Batke, wife of the University of Waterloo vice-president Dr. T. Louis Batke, discussed the changing role of women in the last of a series of lectures at the YWCA.

Educated women who stay home to keep house haven't provided much in the way of political leadership, she says.

"This may be because they lack the focus that employment provides, as well as the continuing contacts, the rubbing of minds which keeps one in the mainstream of events.

"Growth tends to diminish as one is removed from economic participation and concentrates on the pleasantly slower pace of domestic life.

"The various informal ruling devices of the community are also closed to her. There should be women Rotary members. Instead of a member of the Kiwanis we have the Kiwanis queens... not women involved, finding a focus of action and interest, but women as auxiliaries, brought into the organization by reference to a man, her husband."
