TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

WAR NEWS

Skirmishing at Ismailia—Highlanders to the Front—100 Egyptians Killed—British Casualties—Arabi Removes his Headquarters.

WOLSELEY'S PROCLAMATION

Special to the Examiner.

ALEXANDRIA, Aug. 22.

On Sunday, Captain Hastings commanding the gunboats Sea Gull and the Mosquito, assisted by two hundred brave Highlanders landed and attacked an Egyptian force six hundred strong at Shaluf. Some fine fighting took place, and the men behaved with remarkable coolness and steadiness. The attack was wholly successful, the Egyptian forces flying pell-mell, and throwing down their arms. Forty-five prisoners were taken together with a considerable quantity of stores and ammunition. Over one hundred Egyptians were left dead upon the field. The British loss was remarkably slight, showing the bad marksmanship and inefficiency of the Egyptians, engaged. Only two of the British seamen were wounded, and two of the Highlanders were killed by drowning.

The fleet and many of the transports entered the Suez Canal Sunday night en route to Ismailia.

General McPherson, who has command of the Indian contingent, has arrived at Suez, and is preparing to start at once for Ramleh.

Arabi will concentrate his full forces at Damauhour, and will remove his headquarters to Tantap.

The British Government have resolved to wait no longer for the Sultan's proclamation of Arabi; they have taken the final step themselves, and General Sir Garnet Wolseley, to-day, issued a proclamation against Arabi and his followers, and stating that hereafter anyone resisting the authority of the Khedive will certainly be treated as rebels.

A despatch has just been received from General Wolseley saying that skirmishing is taking place at Ismailia, and that at present it is slight and apparently unimportant.

SYRIA'S TROUBLES.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 22.

The Turkish Foreign Minister officially denies the exaggerated reports of anti-christian disturbances in Syria. There is some discontent, but it will probably be kept under control, as the Governors have received orders to take special precautionary measures for securing peace.

RUSSIA ON THE MOVE.

The Russian Corvett "Skobeloff" left Cronstadt for Alexandria to-day. The purpose of her movements is not known.

GENERAL CABLE NEWS.

TORONTO, Aug. 20.

The war news to-day excited much interest and some anxiety lest Sir Garnet Wolseley had felt obliged to act without sufficient support. His usual good fortune inspires the hope of success.

Montreal is crowded with visitors, owing to the scientific, forestry and other gatherings.

The receipts at the Windsor Hotel, Montreal, are between four thousand and five thousand dollars a day. The hotel is to be enlarged.

DUBLIN, Aug. 19.

One of the two boys wounded at the time the Joyce family were murdered near Cong, has died of his wounds. He was fourteen years old. The other boy, who is twelve years, is in a very prostrate condition. He states that the assassins, who were disguised, numbered four or five. Joyce's mother was over eighty years of age. Part of her body was devoured by dogs before the corpse was discovered. The house in which the family lived presents a most shocking spectacle. The bodies of the victims lie on the floor, riddled with bullets, and mangled as if they had been battered with a hammer. The murder is the most horrible that ever disgraced even Ireland. Four persons have been arrested on suspicion of being concerned in the murders.

ALEXANDRIA, Aug. 19.

Sir Wilfred Blunt's house was searched and looted to-night by a party of natives. Seven cases of revolvers and a quantity of ammunition were found in the building.

NEW YORK, Aug. 19.

Hardman, Dowling & Peck, piano manufactory, south-east corner of Tenth Avenue and Fifty-seventh streets, was burned this morning. The fire was one of the fiercest ever seen. The factory was ablaze at two o'clock and nearly all the walls fell down at 2.15. The houses on the north side of Fifty-seventh street, tenements in Fifty-sixth and a lumber yard east of the factory were damaged. Loss a quarter of a million dollars.
