QUICK PASSAGE.—The bark "M. J. Foley," owned by Mr. M. Foley, Alberton, P. E. I., Capt. Townsend, chartered by the Carvill line, arrived at London on the 30th ult. from Halifax, making the passage in 16 days.

SIXTY THOUSAND silver dollars were paid to Government employes at Washington the other day in part payment of salaries. All were treated alike, from the Cabinet officers down.

GO AND HEAR the lecture in the basement of the Methodist Church this evening, on "The model young man." The proceeds are to be used for clothing poor children, to enable them to attend Sabbath School. Persons attending will get far more than the worth of their money, besides contributing to a worthy object.

GAMBLERS TAKEN IN.—A New York despatch says that considerable excitement exists among gamblers and sporting men who bet on the recent alleged International "Walk," by the discovery that the track was short 59 feet on each mile. This would make only three of the late contestants entitled to a share of the gate money.

ON Saturday evening John Ring, a plasterer, entered the surgery of Messrs. Jenkins & McLeod, on Queen Street, and purloined a silver-mounted stethoscope. He was shortly afterwards arrested by Officer Hertz, who found the stolen instrument in the interior pocket of Ring's coat. Ring denied stealing it, swearing that it must have fell into his pocket. He was sentenced to 3 months imprisonment with hard labor.

AT THE Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon, James Carroll, drunk and incapable, was fined \$1 and costs or 4 days. John Ring, for larceny, was sentenced to 3 months imprisonment, with hard labor. Augustus McLeod, on complaint of George Edward DeCoursey, for assaulting with a stone, was fined \$2 or two months imprisonment.

AN Egyptian letter says Gordon Pasha distrusts his native subordinates, and is almost without European assistance. The letter states that should he resign, everything would fall to pieces. The "Times" says it is officially informed that Gordon will resign as soon as the difficulty between Egypt and Abyssinia is settled.

IN our route of the mail service between Vernon River and this city, published on Saturday, we omitted giving due credit to Mr. Robert Crabbe, the contractor. To him is chiefly due the great success in that service. During the past seven years Mr. Crabbe, as contractor for the service between Georgetown and Charlottetown, has not failed in any respect to give the greatest satisfaction to the people residing at both places, as well as along the route. The courtesy shown by him and his driver to passengers has caused many to regret the expiration of his contract. We might here mention that during the fulfillment of the contracts the postal authorities were never obliged to fine him, and that he always kept three or four stage horses for the route. We hope the present contractor will continue the service and give as good satisfaction as did Mr. Crabbe.
