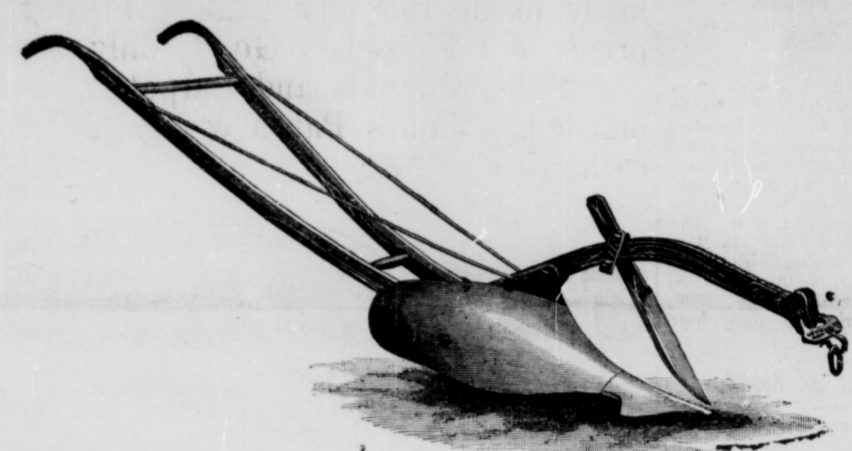

FIGHT AT YALU RIVER. Additional Particulars. The special correspondent of the London News at Tien Tsin reports further details of the naval battle of the mouth of the Yalu River as follows: The work of transferring troops and stores from the Chinese transports to the shore was proceeding rapidly when the Japanese fleet was sighted. Admiral Ting signalled to his fleet to weigh anchor and form in line of battle. In obedience to this order the fleet was formed in a single line, with the exception of the cruisers Kwang Kai and Kwang Ting and four torpedo boats, which were formed in a second line at the mouth of the river.

As the Japanese ships advanced at full speed the Chinese ships 'Ching Yuen and Chao-Yuen' lacked full speed astern to avoid a disaster. The Japanese torpedo boats fired, but their projectiles were stopped by nets. The guns of the other Chinese ships were quickly trained on the Japanese cruisers, and they were rendered, after a short time, helpless. The Chinese declared they were sunk. The Ching-Yuen was several times pierced by shells. The Chao-Yuen ran ashore while retreating and became a target for the Japanese guns until she was set on fire. The King-Yuen was a terrible sight. The Netherland budget shows a deficit of 8,000,000 florins. A loan will be negotiated immediately. Charles Green, charged with the murder of Patrick Cosgrove at Cornwall, is now in jail at that place.

Dr. Dewar the deposed editor of the Christian Guardian, has been elected delegate to the Methodist Episcopal Conference. He received 91 votes as against 45 for Carman and a few scattering votes for others.

Dr. Nettleship, the oculist, has just made another examination at Hawarden of Mr. Galesstone's eyes. The doctor expressed himself as satisfied with the condition of the eye—Premier's eyes, and gave ground for hopes that no further operation will be necessary.

A favorite way among poor people, even professional men and clerks, in England, to get a little recreation in summer is to turn hay-picker during the first two weeks of September. In Canada the poor student turns waiter on a steamboat during his vacation.

Queen Elizabeth of Hungary is supposed to have over the marvelous preservation of her extreme liveliness to the use of a certain toilet water, and as, when she attained the age of 70, her beauty was still dazzling enough to inspire a burning passion in the 18-year-old Grand Duke of Baden, who never recanted until she consented to become his wife.

The theory of naval experts has been that a battleship is equal in fighting power to several cruisers, that a cruiser outruns many thousands yards of a battleship for a certain number of minutes was inevitably doomed. The Yalu fight seems to have shaken this theory severely.

—Montreal Gazette: By the latest reports it would appear that at the battle of Yalu the Chinese outnumbered the Japanese in ships, and had more powerful ships as well. Better management, greater boldness and better men secured the victory for the smaller force.

A significant point bearing upon the destitution of the Pullman employes was brought out by a witness before the Labor Commission investigating the great strike. This witness, a resident of Pullman, and for five years an employe of the car company, stated as his opinion that the company would not have been so successful in better had they not drunk so much.

APPLES IN SIGHT.—The Nova Scotia crops will reach a total of 120,000 barrels, and the Canadian crop about 600,000 barrels. It is expected that Boston will be able to ship between 300,000 and 400,000 barrels, and New York about 1,500,000 barrels.
