

**A GREAT RAILWAY BRIDGE.**

The North River is soon to be spanned at St. Anthony's Nose, not far from Peekskill, N. Y., by a railway bridge. The design is to carry a double track railway across the river, so as to afford direct railway communication with the Eastern States, by a single magnificent span of 1,680 feet in extent. The following are the dimensions of the work proposed: Entire length of the bridge, 2,230 feet; distance between centres of towers, 1,680 feet; clear span, 1,680 feet; clear height above water, 165 feet; railway grade above water, 190 feet; and height of towers above water, 340 feet. The towers are to be built of wrought iron, with granite foundation piers.

**TRADE OF THE UNITED STATES.**

A corrected statement, prepared by the Bureau of Statistics, shows the exports and imports of the United States for the ten months ended April 30, 1877, to have been as follows:

Foreign goods re-exported	10,964,819
Coin and bullion exported	35,285,212

Imports, including coin and bullion	395,916,351

Excess of exports over imports \$154,052,723. Compared with the corresponding period of 1876, the exhibit on the score of economy, is quite flattering. For the same ten months of last year the balance of trade in favor of the United States amounted to \$90,068,567 against \$154,052,923 in 1877, showing a gain in favor of 1877 of \$63,984,356. For the ten months ending April 30, 1876, the exports of coin and bullion amounted to \$41,082,512, and the imports to \$13,977,501, leaving a balance against the United States of \$27,105,011. The exports and imports of coin and bullion for the ten months of the present fiscal year is as follows: Exports, \$35,285,212; imports, \$38,331,534; balance in favor of the United States, \$3,047,322.

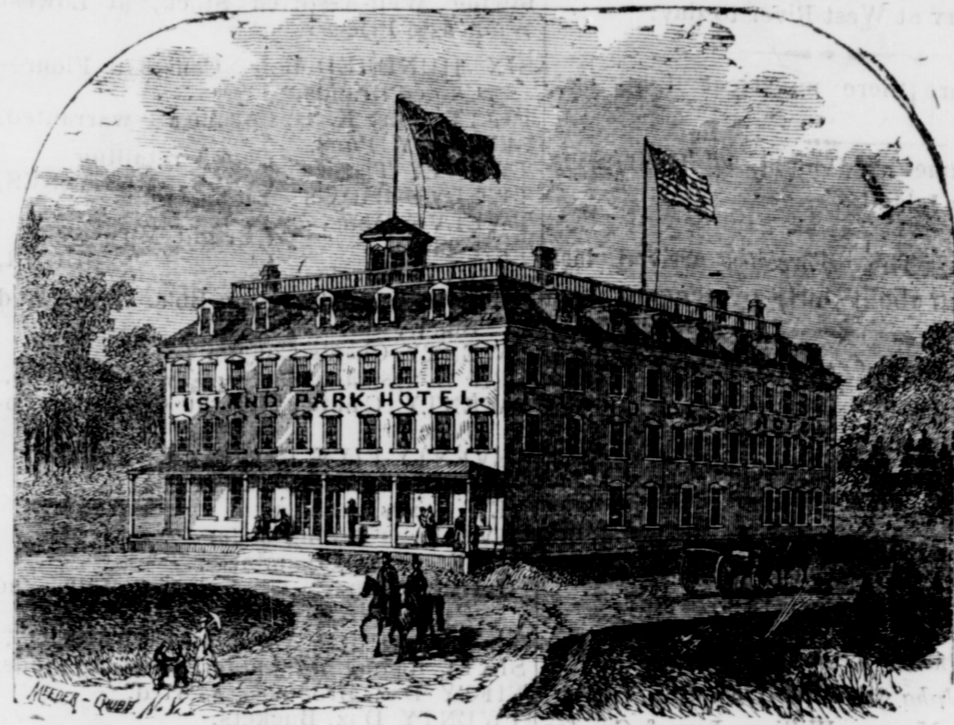
