Feb. 15 Proclaimed Civic Holiday At Montague

Friday, February 15th, was proclaimed a civic holiday in the town of Montague at the regular meeting of the Town Council last night. His worship, Mayor B.H. Yeo presided. Present were Councillors MacGowan, Jamieson, and Nicholson. The newly appointed town clerk, Arnold Wightman, was welcomed by the Mayor and Councillors. Following routine matters of minutes, bills, and correspondence, the reports of the committees were received. The police committee was instructed to look after framing and procuring traffic violation tickets. Councillor McGowan reported that three fines had been imposed for traffic violations in the past week. Councillor Jamieson, reporting for the light committee, stated that several new lights were required in the town. It was moved that \$10.00 be allocated to Fireman Douglas Coffin for cleaning the fire station following the occurrence of a fire in the town. Councillor Nicholson was appointed to determine if the firemen's telephone could be connected to one circuit at the telephone office so as to inform all at the same time in case of fire, and the Town Clerk was instructed to inquire regarding a louder siren, the present one being unable to be heard at the farther points of the town. It was moved that the sidewalks in the town of Montague be cleaned by the residents and property holders after each snow storm. Sidewalks not cleaned within reasonable time will be cleaned by the town and charged to the resident or property holder. Considerable discussion ensued respecting the sanding of streets, and it was proposed that a truck be hired, and used for the purpose of sanding during times necessary. It was further proposed that levy in the town on business houses in the town be used to be used to pay for the use of the truck, and man, and the purchase of sand. On motion, Mr. Joseph MacDonald was re-appointed magistrate for the town of Montague for the current year. It was decided that copies of the financial statement of the town would be made and sent out to all tax payers in the town. It was moved that dog tax arrears would be collected in the near future, and that the dog owners would be given a dog tag for the current year, which would be used to indicate that the tax for the current year had been paid. In the interests of publicizing the town of Montague, it was moved that the town would sponsor a half-page ad in the tourist publication "An Invitation From Canada's Garden Province." Notice was given that a special meeting would be called in the immediate future to arrange for the collection of all town tax arrears.

Sidewalk barbers are doing a land office business shaving the heads of many citizens who are going into mourning for the Maharajah of Jodhpur, who was killed in a plane crash on Jan. 26, near Jodhpur. The shaven skull is the traditional badge of mourning in this part of central India. The death of the Maharajah removed from the political scene a colorful and controversial personality who was giving a tough fight to Prime Minister Nehru's Congress party in the national elections. With his immense personal popularity and hailed by his devout subjects as the King of Kings, the 28-year-old Maharajah entered the election battle a few months ago with the declared objective of forming an opposition group of "progressive independents".

Memorial Service At Valleyfield

At the regular morning service at Valleyfield United Church last Sunday a brief memorial service for King George VI was conducted by the pastor, Rev. A. C. Fraser. In a tribute to the late King Mr. Fraser stated that "we think of our beloved King as a good man, patient, peaceable, kind and unselfish. A humble Christian, actually a 'Defender of the Faith' in his inner life as well as outward form. As he himself quoted a few years ago at Christmas we believe he actually did put his hand into the hand of God. Better than the known way. His way was not easy handicapped by physical illness and by troublesome world conditions. He was well beloved by his own family, his subjects, and by all nations." In memory of the King, the congregation joined in singing "The King of Love My Shepherd Is". Rev. Mr. Fraser then spoke of our Queen. At the age of 25 she is called on to assume great responsibility, and "we pray God to protect her, that she may reign for many years. While we mourn the loss of our King, we rejoice that in his daughter we have one so well fitted to be our Queen." "As in the reign of the noted Victoria, and Good Queen Elizabeth I we anticipate a forward march under the reign of Queen Elizabeth II." The congregation stood and sang "God Save The Queen."

Royal Designer's Evening Dresses

Evening dresses by Norman Hartnell are short but still carry all the romantic glamor of court ball gowns. Women who recall with horror the skimpy short dresses of the early 1920s can relax. Hartnell's new styles show little sign of the jazz age influences. Instead there are glorious semi-crimolines of embroidered tulle, showing entrancing glimpses of silk or nylon-clad ankles and delicately-styled shoes. Length is four inches from the ground at back, six in front. Voluminous skirts flare out from tiny waists over several layers of petticoat. One example is a semi-crimoline in white tulle with narrow shoulder straps, its full skirt and tight bodice embroidered in iridescent scallops of emerald sequins. Hartnell, dressmaker to the Royal Family, has long kept royal favor with his exquisitely embroidered crinolines gowns, and despite the new trend towards shorter styles his designs contrive to retain their intricate charm. Named For Film A daring short number with sophisticated appeal is a navy faille dress called "La Ronde." This is slim and clinging with a straight, ballet-length skirt which gets merry-go-round fullness from a spiral pouf frill. The dress takes its name from a French film which has proved a hit in London. Among other styles by Hartnell is a black dress called "Zombi." Although this year's fashions generally avoid the nude neckline, this has a strapless top covered by a short bolero. Fashioned from inch-wide cirl braid hand-sewn in a circular movement, the dress flounces outwards from a smooth hip-line to a Mae West hemline and has something of the dark drama of Gypsy costume. Return of the fichu neckline is seen in "Star of Eve," a crinoline of midnight blue over white tulle.
