## Coaches Report Only Few Athletes Use Pep Pills

Canadian athletes are using pep pills to improve their performance on the field or in the arena, it is news to most Canadian coaches.

Most of them say they have never known any athlete who used them, let alone recommended or even condoned their use with any athlete under their command.

Delegates to the American Medical Association at its convention in New York Wednesday condemned indiscriminate use of this type of drug which they said was used far too often by professional, college and even high school athletes in the United States.

But no Canadian professional football coach consulted had ever used them or knew of anyone using them.

In Montreal, Ernie McKenzie, trainer of the Alouettes of the Big Four Football Union and former trainer at Wake Forest College in North Carolina, said: "I would never prescribe any form of drug, I would favor vitamins or delectable, but only when an athlete has a cold or some other weakening ailment."

**HEARD OF USE**  
Hampton Pool, new coach of the Big Four Argonauts and former coach with Los Angeles Rams, said he had heard of drugs, but had used to pep up athletes, but had no personal experience of their use.

Canadian professional football champions, the Edmonton Eskimos, don't use them, says coach Frank Pop Ivy.

"I've been around athletics for quite a few years, college and professional football and other athletics, and I've never heard of any athlete using any kind of drug that might be harmful to them."

If athletes are taking pills to pep them up while the rest of North America takes tranquillizers to calm them down, Canadian hockey coaches don't believe it.

Howie Meeker of Toronto Maple Leafs of the National Hockey League said:

"We use absolutely no drugs. It would kill your men in hockey, where you would have to take the stuff about 70 times a season. I know of no Canadian athletes using the stuff."

**70-GAME SCHEDULE**  
NHL teams play a 70-game schedule.

Rudy Schaffer, general manager of the Toronto Maple Leafs baseball club, said the team does not use stimulants.

Canada's amateur coaches professed as little knowledge of the use of stimulants.

Fred Foote, who coached the Canadian track and field relay team in the Olympic games at Melbourne, said in Toronto: "I've never heard of any one using the pills—and anyway I can't see what good they would do. No one coached by me has ever used them."

Marathon swimmer Marilyn Bell's coach, Gus Ryder, said he had "never at any time" considered use of drugs to increase stamina or speed of Marlin, and that went for any swimmer he had coached.

Dennis White, head of the Canadian Amateur Boxing Association, said he had never heard of amateur boxers taking drugs or pep pills.

**BAKERSFIELD, Calif. (AP)**—Take it from a man who is in a position to know, pep pills aren't going to enable any athlete run a four-minute mile.

Franz Stampf, European coach who conditioned and tutored Roger Bannister, Chris Chataway and Brian Hewson for their successful attempts to shatter the four-minute barrier, is not impressed by the AMA decision.

"I think it is quite obvious that an outstanding performance in the mile run is going to be the product of systematic conditioning. It would be my opinion that the use of stimulants or sedatives of any kind whatsoever would destroy the effectiveness of the conditioning work."

Dr. Herbert Berger of New York City said in connection with the AMA decision that the "rush of four-minute miles is no coincidence."

# Chicago-New York Make AL Race Two-Team Effort

Chicago and New York made the American League pennant race look more than ever like a two-team scrap Thursday.

The White Sox, beaten only five times in the last 25 games, swept a three-game set from Boston as Jim Wilson's seven-hit pitching and Minnie Minoso's two-run homer beat the Red Sox 3-2 and maintained Chicago's five-game lead. The second place Yankees continued to fatten their batting averages, slugging 20 hits to pound Cleveland 14-5 and drop the third place Tribe 8½ games behind as Bill Skowron and Mickey Mantle batted in 10 runs.

Detroit edged past Boston into fourth place with a 7-6 victory over Washington, decided by Frank House's solo home run in the eighth.

Only two-day games were sched-

uled in the National League, with the New York Giants beating fourth place Milwaukee 2-0 and the St. Louis Cardinals swatting Pittsburgh 6-0. First-place Cincinnati was at Philadelphia and second-place Brooklyn in night games.

**SIXTH VICTORY**  
Wilson, a 35-year-old right-hander, gained his fifth complete game and sixth victory in eight decisions as the Sox made it eight out of nine. Mickey Vernon drove in both Boston runs with a home run and a double. Nellie Fox drove in the first Chicago run with a third inning single against loser Dick Sisler that extended his consecutive game hitting streak to 11. Ted Williams, the Red Sox thumper, was 0-for-3, skidding his league-leading average to .333.

Skowron, who was 10-for-14 as the Yankees swept the three-

game set at Cleveland and stretched their winning streak to four games, batted in six runs with a two-run homer and a pair of two-run singles. Mantle, 8-for-12 against the Tribe to push his average to .368, walloped a two-run 450-foot homer in the first inning and added a two-run double in a five-run fifth. Mike Garcia was the loser with Johnny Kucks winning his third with a five-hitter.

**THREE-HIT PITCHING**  
Lou Slesater won his second for the Tigers with a three-hit, 5-2-3-inning relief job after Billy Hoelt left in a three-run Senator fourth that wiped out a 4-3 Detroit lead. Hoelt's first major league home run scored two in a four-run Tiger second against Pete Ramos-Bud Byerly lost it.

Ruben Gomez, who hadn't beaten the Braves since his "hit-

and-run" fracas with Joe Adcock last July 17, permitted just four singles—two by Ed Mathews—in winning his seventh. Bob Buhl lost his fourth, giving up Red Schoendienst's eighth home run, fourth in the last three games, and a first-inning score on two singles, a walk and a force out.

Stan Musial regained the NL batting lead from Pirate Dee Fondy with two doubles in four trips for a .361 average. Fondy, 0-for-4 as Murry Dickson won his second with a six-hitter, fell to .356. Musial also had two runs batted in, taking the league RBI lead with 39. Del Ennis homered in the Cards 12-hit attack that that handed Ron Kline an eighth defeat. Gene Baker had half the Pirates' hits.

Baltimore was at Kansas City in the only AL night game.

## Claims Fines Plastered On 6 Yankees Players Are Illegal

**NEW YORK (AP)**—Frederic A. Johnson, New York lawyer who represented Danny Gardella in his suit against organized baseball, said Thursday the fines plastered upon six New York Yankee players recently are illegal and could not stand up in court.

The fines were imposed for a late night club fracas. Bill Martin, Mickey Mantle, Yoel Berra, Hank Bauer and Whitey Ford, were assessed \$1,000 each, and pitcher Johnny Kucks was fined \$500.

"Baseball has no right whatsoever to impose fines on players," asserted Johnson. "It is entirely an arbitrary action to impose a penalty without a hearing violates the due process clause of the federal and state constitution."

Johnson's opinion, however, was not shared by Rep. Emanuel Celler, "Dem.-N.Y.", head of the House Judiciary committee which next week will start a congressional investigation probe of all sports.

"I think it's part of the baseball structure to permit an owner-

to fine the players," he said. "However, this is just another illustration that the players are just poems for the owners."

Neither commissioner Ford Frick nor anybody in the commissioner's office commented on the statements made by Johnson and Celler but another high baseball official said:

"We never do anything in baseball that's not legal. We have to have discipline. We have to have curfews. It is the duty of ball players to stay in shape."

Yankee player representative Jerry Coleman, reached by telephone in Cleveland, declared neither he nor any of the punished players ever contemplated challenging the fines.

## Fullmer Starts Comeback Tonight

**CHICAGO (AP)**—Ex-middleweight champion Gene Fullmer tonight starts a comeback, after the only knockout of his career against dangerous Tiger Jones in a 10-rounder at the Chicago Stadium.

Just 37 days ago, in this ring, Fullmer was knocked cold in the fifth round of his first title defense by Sugar Ray Robinson.

Fullmer is rated a 9-5 favorite over Jones, who nearly wrecked a Robinson comeback at the Chicago Stadium in January of 1955 by soundly pummeling Sugar Ray.

Fullmer, No. 1 middleweight contender, has a 40-4 record with 20 knockouts. Jones, from Yonkers, N.Y., has 44-17-4 with 11 knockouts.

## Rangers, Hawks Trade Players

**NEW YORK (AP)**—New York Rangers Thursday sent winger Ron Murphy to Chicago Black Hawks in exchange for Henry (Bank) Ciesla, a strapping center.

Ciesla, 22, of St. Catharines, Ont., scored 10 goals in National Hockey League competition last year although he wasn't used regularly. Murphy, 23, of Hamilton, Ont., was hampered by injuries suffered in training camp. He was sent to the Providence farm club and returned to New York in mid-season, scoring seven goals and receiving 12 assists in 33 games.

## French Horse Is Cup Winner

**EPSOM, England (AP)**—Fric shot into the lead half a mile from the finish and raced on strongly Thursday to win the 1½-mile Coronation Cup for France.

It was the eighth time since the war that French owners and

trainers have won the race.

Fric, a five-year-old by Vandale out of Fripe, won £2,542 for owner M. Calmann. Fric overpowered the turf course in 2:34.8 and was ridden by J. DeForge.

English-owned and trained Donald was 1½ lengths away in second place with Queen Elizabeth's High Veldt another three lengths away in third.

Fric and Donald were joint 7-to-2 betting favorites. High Veldt was 10 to 7 in the field of eight. The Coronation Cup was first run in 1902.

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## Phillies Score 3 Homers, Down Redlegs 6-2

**PHILADELPHIA (AP)**—The Philadelphia Phillies beat Cincinnati in its own game, the home run, slugging three out of the park for a 6-2 victory over the National League leading Redlegs before 27,307 at Connie Mack Stadium Thursday night.

Stan Lopata, Bob Bowman and Rip Repulski each socked homer number five for the season to help Robin Roberts set his sixth win against the same number of defeats.

The Phillies got 10 hits off three Cincinnati pitchers, including starter and loser lefty Don Gross, now 4-2 on the campaign.

The victory moved the third-place Phillies to within a game and a half of the pacesetter Redlegs and percentage points behind the runnerup Brooklyn Dodgers.

## U. K. Promoter Pays His Bet

**LONDON (AP)**—On June 5, 1952, British fight promoter Jack Solomons bet 10 pounds (\$28) against a bookmaker's 10,000 pounds (\$28,000) that he would produce a British world heavyweight boxing champion within five years.

Solomons paid the bookie the 10 pounds Thursday. The closest he came to winning was when Britain's Don Cockell fought champion Rocky Marciano in San Francisco in 1955. Marciano stopped Cockell in nine rounds.
