

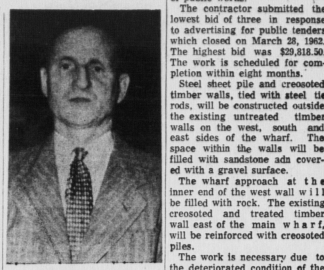
Major Project Undertaken
By Southern Kings Co. Ass'n

The King's County branch of the Fish and Game Protection Association was formed on May 29, 1960 with Cyril Johnston, its first president. The provincial association was instrumental in forming County branches to increase interest in the preservation of fish and game and to provide a stronger voice in determining regulations governing these sports as well as to acquaint sportsmen of these laws and to report violators.

Among sportsmen present at this initial meeting were: Graham Rogers, Frank Acorn, S.S. Heslin, Peter MacLellan, Earl Ings, Harry Webster of the Dominion Wildlife, Stewart Jones, Harold Shaw and Dick Young.

Some of the aims and projects laid down at this meeting which have since been accomplished were: That Sportsmen respect the wishes of the farmers. That School children be taught conservation to construct dams and improve streams. Crow Sheds Moore's Sanctuary. A Hun and Pheasant program and many others.

The association also has on record as being against the enclosure of property except for sanctuaries. In December, 1955 at a meeting in Bridgetown and with the consent of the parent association it was decided to form two associations in Kings County. As it was felt that due to distance, members in the different sections of the County might find it difficult to attend meetings other than in their own districts. Following two active years in this office ever since. During Mr. Cantelo's 5 1/2 terms in office, a number of dams have been built, streams have been improved, upland game pro-

grams tried out, and through his efforts and with a small membership, dams have been rebuilt at Cardigan head in 1959, Rose-nath in 1960, St. Georges in 1960, and Mitchell River in 1961. He also was a strong spokesman for a Causeway to replace the bridge at Cardigan. At a previous meeting the Southern Kings Association had recommended the rebuilding of the Seal River Bridge with a causeway in 1962. Construction proposed for this association for this year include the Thompson dam at Lower Montague, Creeds dam at Sturgeon and possibly the Stewart dam at Murray Harbor South. On speaking of his terms as president of the Southern Kings branch, Mr. Cantelo said that this association took advantage of the winter works program which was of great benefit to them; The co-operation of members; The assistance of the

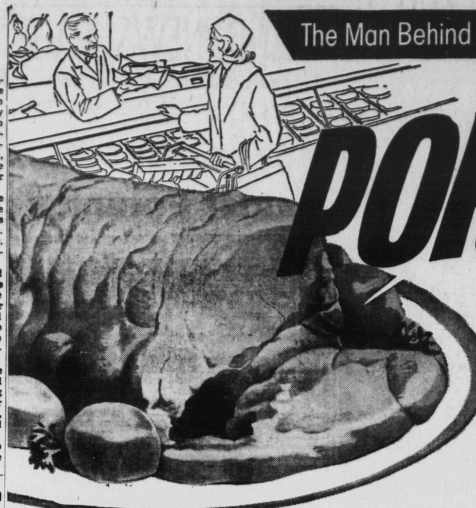
Contract Given
For Wharf Job
At Bay Fortune

OTTAWA — A \$27,520.30 contract has been awarded by the Department of Public Works to Norman N. MacLean of Murray River to carry out repairs to the north wharf at Bay Fortune. It was announced Wednesday by Mrs. M. MacDonald, M.P. for Kings, on behalf of the Hon. David J. Walker, minister of public works.

The contractor submitted the lowest bid of three in response to advertising for public tenders which closed on March 29, 1962. The highest bid was \$29,810.30. The work is scheduled for completion within eight months. Steel sheet pile and cross-tied timber walls, tied with steel tie rods, will be constructed outside the existing untreated timber walls on the west, south and east sides of the wharf. The space within the walls will be filled with sandstone and covered with a gravel surface.

The wharf approach at the inner end of the west wall will be filled with rock. The existing cross-tied and treated timber wall east of the main wharf, will be reinforced with cross-tied piles.

The work is necessary due to the deteriorated condition of the existing structure.
