MEETING THE TEACHER SHORTAGE

Do you know that in 1954-55 in Prince Edward Island, out of our 753 public school teachers, 92 were not fully qualified.

From a study made by the C. T. F. Research Division. Recruitment and retention - not simply recruitment - equally affect teacher supply. It is significant that teacher's organizations across Canada emphasize retention rather than recruitment. All provincial teachers' organizations have committees which work constantly on some phase of teacher retention or recruitment, looking for solutions which will improve the status of the profession. As a result of such study and research, teachers are convinced that teacher drop-out is more responsible for the present teacher shortage than an actual lack of recruits.

Teachers feel that pressure on recruitment and the methods used to induce candidates into the profession mainly through short courses and the lowering of standards, constitutes a short-term and short-sighted program. These short-term measures are not getting candidates who stay in the profession and they are steadily lowering the prestige of all teachers. In radio talks this past year, LAZerte said, "Short-term rather than long-term policies have resorted to on every hand... Government policies of the past have given us a teacher shortage. The solution to the teacher shortage problem is to raise the standards."

NO EASY SOLUTION

We do not contend that the achievement and maintenance of high standards of certification will solve the teacher supply problem overnight. There are no quick and easy solutions to the shortage of qualified teachers. We do contend, however, that the only effective solution to obtaining and keeping sufficient qualified teachers for our schools is the high standard approach, and that any other approach only produces a chronic and increasingly acute shortage of qualified teachers.

It is very difficult in Canada to show how our chronic teacher shortage might be eliminated. This is because differences in minimum qualifications for permanent certification across Canada have not differed generally by more than one year of training. In addition, nearly all provinces have given individuals permission to teach when they did not have the minimum qualifications.

capital. At least two families share most homes. Peddlers trot through streets of tree-shaded bungalows, balancing wares on bamboo poles. From door to door, they offer met, drinks, toys, bean curd, fish, eggs, vegetables, pots and pans, furniture, batik, and between meal snacks. Djakarta housewives wash clothes, vegetables, youngsters in city canals.

From Djakarta to Surabaya on Java's east coast, rice paddies sparkle on plains and terraced slopes. Improved seed developed by United States scientists now gives a quarter of Java's farmers 20 to 30 percent more rice. Soil owes fertility to 300 island volcanoes, more than 50 are still active, which spewed rich ashes, mud and lava. Families on small farm produce, pineapples, sweet potatoes, bananas, bread fruit, avocados, and beans for their own needs and for market too. Trees yield coconuts, mangoes, oranges, papayas. Harvests come twice, sometimes three times a year, in a warm unchanging climate.

Soft breezes rustle through grass-roofed huts on mystical Bali where brown-skinned beauties dance to tinkling oriental music. Evening winds carry whiffs of roasting goat meat, saté sauce, millet cakes and bananas sizzling in iron bowls of hot coconut oil. North of Bali lies Celebes - replete with Makassas come graceful praus and modern freighters on circuit voyages that the Indonesian scattered islands together. Holds bulge with coffee and copra from Celebes, silverware from Java rich, rare spices from the Moluccas. These were the Spice Islands that lured Columbus and Magellan. Today they form part of Indonesia. GREAT BRITAIN.

Half of the first trans-Atlantic telephone cable system was completed Sept. 26. The final splice was made aboard the British Port office ship Cable Monarch a few miles south of Oban, Scotland. The actual splicing operation took 12 hours and Newfoundland and Britain became linked by submarine telephone cable. However, not until the second cable is laid by the end of 1956 will both-way conversation be possible. At the moment speech can go only in one direction.

FINLAND Moscow has agreed to give up control over a tiny strip of Finnish territory. Known as Parkala the area was taken by Russia during World War II and has been used by the Reds as a military base since that time.

Porkkala on the southern tip of Finland has a total area of 152 square miles. It was seized by Russia in an armistice agreement signed by the Finns and the Soviets in 1944 ending a war between the two countries in which Finland unsuccessfully tried to regain land lost to Russia at the start of World War II. Until now, Russia has had a secret naval base at Porkkala before any Finnish trains were allowed to cross the area, windows were tightly covered with iron shutters so passengers couldn't see the secret installations.

ISRAEL AND EGYPT Relations between Israel and Egypt are at a critical stage. Along the border which separates Egypt from the Jewish state, a fairly large scale battle has occurred. Each side claimed to have inflicted heavy casualties upon the other. Arab countries, including Egypt, have long regarded the Israelis as Jewish settlers, rightfully theirs, since it was the homeland of their people many centuries ago.

AFGHANISTAN Afghanistan is the latest country in the Middle East to announce plans for buying arms from the Communists. Others include Egypt, Syria, and Saudi Arabia. Western observers fear that a flow of Communist arms to Afghanistan will increase Communist influence there and also stir up new trouble between Afghanistan and neighboring Pakistan. The two countries have been quarreling for some time now over a border province.

MOROCCO Spain and France are arguing over their Moroccan territories. France charges that Spain is permitting rebels in Spanish Morocco to aid rebellions in the French section. Spain, on the other hand, has accused the French of making armed attacks on Spanish Moroccan villages. Until these charges started flying back and forth, Spanish Morocco had seemed undisturbed over what was happening in French Morocco. The Arab natives in the colony ruled by Spain have been content to let their neighbors in French Morocco fight for independence from European control.

Spain Morocco is a rugged land about four times the size of Prince Edward Island. It has 1,398,000 people, most of them farmers. The leading crops are grains, olives, grapes, citrus fruits, and almonds. Europeans run the few industrial plants.
