Saints Defeat Summerside Aces 8-5

Penalties Galore In Third Period

The Saint Dunstan's University hockey team defeated the Summerside Aces at Civic Stadium last night by the score of 8-5. For two periods the game was fast and clean, but in the third session one of the wildest donnybrooks seen at Civic Stadium since it was built got under way. Spectators jumping over the boards to watch proceedings made it more complicated for the overworked referees. After much too long a delay four major penalties, four individual misconducts, and two team misconducts were handed out by McCallum and Kelly. Apparently someone interfered with young Jack Kane along the west boards and Vance Harris and the S. D. U. youngster raised the curtain on the pugilistic displays. Gaudet, Roy and Pe Gaudet made it a foursome. Kane had just finished serving his misconduct when he tangled again with Syl Bernard and disorder reigned once again on the ice surface.

Outside of these outbursts the game was very cleanly played, and a good one to watch. The Aces led 2-1 at the end of the first period, but the Saints roared back with four unanswered goals in the first five minutes of the second period, and that was all the scoring for that frame which had only one minor penalty.

In the rugged final chukker the Saints' defencemen, Lewis MacDonald, scored two goals in a little over a minute. Scoring the second, he fired the disk into an open net. Pe Gaudet, the goalie, had been injured on the leg immediately before and was lying on the ice to the left of his cage. The game was held up until Claude Gaudet, one of the Aces forwards, could don the pads, and Gaudet, totally inexperienced, made a creditable showing, stopping a few hard shots. After the melee the teams played three more minutes, and during this time the Aces got one goal. When the teams were returned to strength the home boys outscored the visitors by two goals to one, making the final score 8-5.

DAVEY, whose rushing was brilliant, Lou MacDonald, the big rear-guard, and Rod MacInnis shot a brace of tallies each. The line of Cutcliffe, Clow and Taylor accounted for four of the five Aces goals and Leroy Clow won the Holmes Men's Wear shirt award.

Will Spend Big Money To Build Up Ailing Chihawks

PALM BEACH, Fla. (AP)—"We will spend \$100,000 for the acquisition of additional hockey players before the start of the 1956-57 hockey season," J.D. Norris, president of Chicago Blackhawks hockey club, said Monday.

Norris made his announcement to members of the National Hockey League during their annual meeting at the Palm Beach Biltmore hotel.

He said the expenditure had been decided upon as the success of the Chicago Blackhawks had not been quite up to his hopes this season and that the strengthening program of buying additional players had been agreed upon. He said 35 home games will be played in the Chicago Stadium in 1956 and 1957.

Clarence Campbell of Montreal, president of the league, said it had been decided to advance the date of the draft meeting to early June, which is calculated to make players available at an earlier stage and would facilitate planning for the 1956-57 season.

In addition to Campbell and Norris, others attending the meeting were W.A. Brown of Boston, B.A. Norris of Detroit, F.J. Selke of Montreal, Conn Smythe of Toronto and Gen. J.R. Kilpatrick of New York.

Moore To Arrive For Title Fight On February 23

LONDON (AP)—Arlie Moore, world light heavyweight boxing champion, will arrive in Britain Feb. 23 to defend his title against Yolande Pompey of Trinidad in London March 13, promoter Jack Solomons announced Monday.

He said Charley Johnston, Moore's manager, advised him of Moore's plans in a telephone conversation.

Solomons' announcement ended rumors that Moore would refuse to fight in Britain, following the controversial fight at London's Harringay Arena Feb. 7.

Bickering Among Figure Skaters Becomes Worse

GARMISCH, Germany (AP)—Feuding and bickering among American figure skaters — became worse Monday.

Coach Ted Patterson of Cambridge, Mass., said, "In honesty I must admit" that part of the team refused to move into the hotel where the Americans are headquartered for the Feb. 16-19 world figure skating championships.

He said he "hesitated to take disciplinary action" at a time like this. It was too close to big competition.

Team members not living with the remainder of the Americans are Carol Heiss of Ozone Park, N. Y., and Ronnie Robertson of Long Beach, Calif. Their mothers and personal coaches are with them at another hotel in Garmisch.

"I gave them until six o'clock last night to get out here with the rest of us," Patterson said. "They did not show up."

Patterson said he was unable to explain Robertson's attitude.

Miss Heiss, however, starred in a hassle at Corvina, Italy, which caught the attention of 10,000 spectators and brought heavy criticism on her. The 16-year-old New Yorker refused twice to pose with Olympic champion Tenley Albright of Newton Center, Mass.

Miss Heiss placed second to Miss Albright and Robertson placed second to Hayes Jenkins of Colorado Springs, Colo., in the men's Olympic championship.
