SUMMERSIDE WILL CELEBRATE.—The
wheelmen of Summerside are preparing
for a grand parade on Tuesday evening
next, through the principal streets of the
town, concluding with a display of fire-
works on Market Square.

OLD MANUSCRIPTS.—At the sale of old
manuscripts in London a few days ago
Sir Walter Scott's "Lady of the Lake"
(published 1810) and other poetical manu-
scripts brought £2,250 and his "Old
Morality" (published 1816) and the other
prose manuscripts brought £600. The
Nelson memoir realized £5,000, and a
collection of Robert Burns' manuscripts
brought £365.

engagement closes tonight, and they will

FINE CATTLE.—The Jacques Cartier
brought from Crapaud today, thirty-one
fine cattle fed by the leading farmers of
Crapaud and Tryon. They were sold to

trade.

CHANGE OF TIME.—Grace Church Sun-
day School, instead of meeting at 2.15
tomorrow, will assemble with the congrega-
tion at 7 p. m., when the Pastor will
address the audience on the subject of
Jubilee celebration.

FIRST METHODIST CHURCH.—Special and
appropriate music will be rendered by the
Choir of the First Methodist Church at
all the services tomorrow. The programme
for the afternoon contains Gounod's
vocal march, "Praise ye the Fathers" and
Cherubini's "Ave Marie" and a Grand
Te Deum.

REMOVAL OF REMAINS.—The remains
of Lt. Colonel Sir Aretas William Young,
Knight, for some time Lt.-Governor of
this Province, were removed today from
the vault under the old St. Paul's Church
where they had lain for nearly sixty-two
years, and placed in a newly constructed
vault, built of brick and Portland cement
and covered with Nova Scotia free-stone,
under the nave of the new St. Paul's.
According to his monument in St. Paul's
Church, Sir Aretas William Young served
in Ireland during the rebellion of 1798. He
fought in several memorable actions in
Egypt, afterwards served in the Mediter-
ranean, Spain, Portugal and the West
Indies, and was engaged in the battles of
Vimiera, the Duoro, Talavera, Busaco,
Sobral and Redinilla, and was present at
the siege of Badajos, the taking of Olin-
zenza and the capture of Guadaloupe. He
died on the 1st December, 1835, aged 58
years.
