Furillo's double play ball. The Dodgers had men on first and third with nobody out and a run in when Woodling took Billy Cox's fly ball and doubled Hodges at the plate with a beautiful no-bounce throw to Berra. Mantle's homer in the five-run third gave the Yanks a 6-1 cushion that looked mighty soft to McDonald, the fellow the Yankees tried to trade away all last winter.

McDonald kept skirting disaster time after time until he was flattened in the eighth. But the Yanks kept adding to the lead while Brooklyn threats blew up. Carl Furillo rapped into a double play when the Brooks began to get tough in the fourth but a fifth inning spurt finally produced a run. With one out, Junior Gilliam was hit by a pitch. Singles by Pee Wee Reese and Duke Snider rode him home. Then McDonald tightened up again.

Meyer eased through a rough sixth when the Yanks loaded the bases with only one out but finally hit the dead end in the seventh. Billy Martin, the series' leading batter with 10 hits, only two short of the record, blasted a Meyer pitch into the left field stands following Berra's single, widening the gap to 8-2. Rizzuto's single and McDonald's double that took a bad hop past Jackie Robinson ran it to 9-2 later in the same inning.

The Yanks piled on another in the eighth on Collins' double off Ben Wade, a sacrifice and Berra's fly ball. McDonald finally got the bus-iness in the eighth. Singles by Robinson, Campanella and Furillo produced one run and brought up Cox whose three-run homer closed the gap to 10-6.

In from the bullpen came Kuzava, a lefty who likes to pitch to right-handed batters. He promptly struck out Dick Williams on three pitches as Drensen replaced pinch-hitter George Shuba with pinch-hitter Williams. McDougald's home run off Joe Black in the top of the ninth seemed a lead enough. Stengel, however, wanted to make certain. When Gilliam led off with a homer, Reynolds began to throw hard in the bullpen. Reese flied out but Duke Snider singled to right.

That was all for Kuzava. Stengel waved for Reynolds, the opening day hurler who was supposed to be "out for the series" with a bad back. Jackie Robinson was the batter. With the count two balls and one strike, Jackie rapped into a game-ending double play. The game started in bright sunshine and mid-70 degree temperature. By the eighth inning it was cloudy and growing dark, prompting the umpires to order the lights turned on for the last two innings.

Duke Snider And Billy Loes Heroes As Dodgers Win Saturday Game 7-3

By JACK HAND BROOKLYN. (AP)—Duke Snider, Brooklyn's home run hero of last October, hammered home four big runs to back up Billy Loes' gritty pitching Saturday as Brooklyn squared the world series with a 7-3 victory over New York Yankees in the fourth game.

Bouncing back to even matters at home after losing the first two at Yankee Stadium, the Dodgers clobbered Eddie Ford, Tom Cop-man, Johnny Sain and Art Schall-ack for six doubles and a home run in their 12-hit total. Starter Ford was the loser although he pitched only one inning. When Loes, a sad failure since the all-star game in July, faltered in the ninth to load the bases with nobody out, manager Chuck Drensen called for Clem Labine to choke of the Yanks.

The game closed with a flourish when Billy Martin, trying to score a second run on Mickey Matle's single, was cut down at the plate by Don Thompson's peg to Roy Campanella. Campanella tagged Martin on the shoulder hard to make certain of the final out. Martin turned and glared but made no menacing gestures.

Snider, whose four homers helped Brooklyn take the Yanks to the seven-game limit last year, smashed a tremendous 425-foot blast over the right-field screen and off building across the street in the sixth inning.

It was Snider's double high off the same screen that drove in two big runs in the first inning when the Dodgers unloaded on lefthander Ford for three runs. Again in the seventh, a Snider double to the left-field corner drove in a fourth run.

Junior Gilliam with three doubles, two of the fluke variety, and Loes with a pair of singles were the other big Dodger hitters. Loes had won only one complete game since July 8 and wasn't expected to last the route against the Yank team that beat him 3-2 in last year's sixth game. But the tall, skinny righthander kept firing the ball past the Yanks to strike out eight men in a fair follow-up to the job Carl Erskine did Friday when he set a series record of 14 strikeouts.

Not until the fourth inning when Yogi Berra singled with two out did the Yanks have a hit. By that time, Loes was rolling along with a 3-0 bulge. He lost his shutout in the fifth on Martin's triple and Gil McDougald's 370-foot homer. Although the 23-year-old hurler was being hit hard for long fly balls, he skirted serious trouble un-
