PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The report of the President fol-
lows: Once again, I would like to
officially welcome you all to the
annual meeting of the Prince Ed-
ward Island Boy Scouts Associa-
tion, and, knowing you are all
busy people, want to express my
sincere appreciation that so many
leading people of our community
are attending out here this eve-
ning their confidence in the
Boy Scout Movement.

And you will hear in the reports
to follow, 1949-1950 has been a
good year in Scouting in the Pro-
vince of Prince Edward Island. We
have had a goodly amount of
camping, regular Cub and Scout
meetings, Courses, wonderful sup-
port from the citizens of the Is-
land, Canadian Headquarters has
been exceptionally good to us, for
the first time we were able to
send a self-contained Prince Ed-
ward Island Troop to a Jamboree
outside the Province, our Apple
Day was the most successful to
date, and through the efforts of a
few faithful members of your Ex-
ecutive and through approximately
sixty volunteer workers Scouting
and Cubbing has really been kept
alive and brought to the point
where I feel we are now ready to
expand and do a better job for all
the boys of Cub and Scout age on
Prince Edward Island.

One year ago some of you will
recall I stated my object would be
to have three things accomplish-
ed during the year as far as your
Executive was concerned. These
three things, namely, the appoint-
ment of three working committees,
a Field Commissioner, and a Lone
Scout Commissioner, have all been
accomplished and I feel today our
Finance, Training, and Medal
Committees, our new Field Com-
missioner, and our Lone Scout
Commissioner, all deserve our
sincerest thanks for their splendid
work during the past year. Our
new working committee, particularly
should be commended for the estab-
lishment of Accident Insurance for
all boys and Leaders in the move-
ment, and also for the splendid
finances on a sounder footing. To
those of the other Committees,
I would like to say many thanks for
a real effort during the year, and
to Field Commissioner Gordon Kerr
and to Lone Scout Commissioner
Walter LePage, for your work on
the "Monthly Scout News" and
"Lone Scout Magazine" respec-
tively, many thanks.

Looking to things which should
be done during the coming year,
I might be permitted to suggest
that the Association foster greater
interest everywhere and build up
the Scout population. This can be
done by the Commissioner with our
all-round support. Secondly, we
should continue camp improve-
ments including the planting of
more trees, etc. some pioneer work
in the various Troops, and the
checking of the old storage well
and old pump on the property.
The last suggestion I would like
to make for expansion work would
be that the Association authorize
your Executive officially to provide
a loan sufficient for the purchase
of a car by our Field Commissioner
in order to carry on his work more
efficiently.

In conclusion, I would like to
take this opportunity of thanking
His Honour the Lieutenant-Gov-
ernor, the Honourable J. W. Wal-
ter Jones, Premier of the Province
for their patronage and support
for their untiring efforts and co-operation
throughout the year. At this time
too I would like to say how much
your Executive appreciated the
splendid job done by the Hon-
ourable J. H. L. Palmer in
handling our annual campaign for
funds. At this time also I would
like to congratulate Mr. Gordon
Kerr on the fine start he has made
in his capacity as Field Commis-
sioner and I would ask the assist-
ance of you all in helping him in
every way during the coming year.
Last, but not least, I would like
to take this opportunity of thank-
ing our volunteer leaders of the
various Packs and Troops through-
out the Province for their con-
tinued efforts on behalf of the
Association and the boys. We all
realize full well that at times
there is a difficult task but we
are fortunate in securing the ser-

Citation in respect to the pres-
entation of the Certificate of Merit.
Mr. Fred Driscoll was appoint-
ed Scout Master of the 6th Char-

lottetown Troop (Holy Redeemer)
in 1932. The same year he attend-
ed Part II Gilwell (practical) and
received his certificate for this part
of the Gilwell training. Mr. Dris-
coll was an active Scout Master of
the 6th Charlottetown Troop until
1946 when he joined the Reserve
Army as a part time instructor in
the Army Cadets. He remained in
this service until his discharge in
1946. Mr. Driscoll became a member
of the Provincial Council in
1940 and was appointed Secretary-
Treasurer in May, 1949.

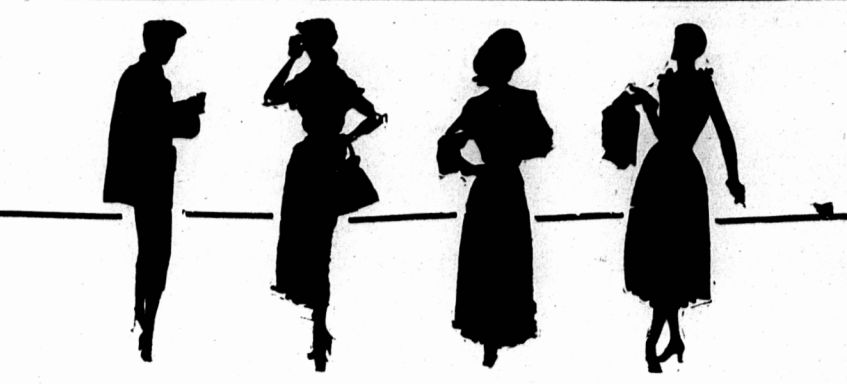
Mr. Driscoll has assisted at, or
acted as Camp Chief at many
Scout and Cub camps in P. E. Is-
land including one at Fairview,
one at Dunstaffnage, one at Rut-
tice, three at Brudenell and five
at Camp Buchan. In 1949 Mr. Dris-
coll was the leader of the P. E. Is-
land Jamboree contingent of
Scouts.

As there was no suitable Scout
hall, Mr. Ceretti and the boys built
one paying for the material and
carpenters themselves. The Troop
continued to operate until 1943
when most of the boys either went
into the Armed Forces or worked
away from Borden. Mr. Ceretti was
too busy himself to keep those re-
maining in active Scout work.

The hall was sold to the Cana-
dian Legion and with a portion of
the proceeds Mr. Ceretti bought a
tract of land of eight acres at
Camp Buchan to complete the
Camp site donated by Honourable
G. D. DeBlois and presented it to
the Provincial Council of the Boy
Scouts Association for Prince Ed-
ward Island.

In 1948 Mr. Ceretti, at the age
of almost seventy, again saw the
need of a troop in Borden. He or-
ganized a troop once more and
has been fortunate in securing the
services of several younger lead-
ers. Again, no suitable hall was
available and Mr. Ceretti bought
a dance hall for two thousand dol-
lars, fixed it up at considerable

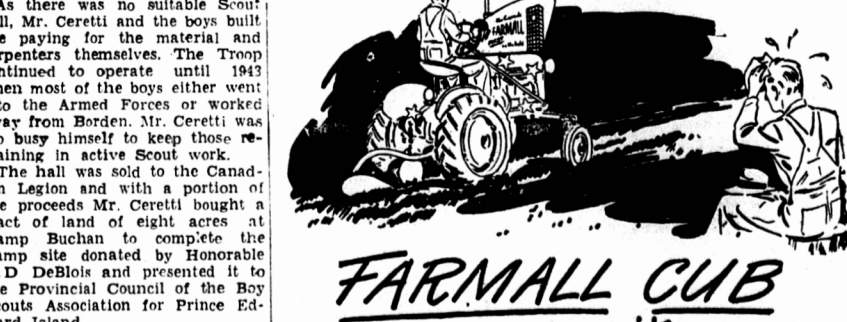
