PARLIAMENT OF CANADA.

Railway Extension and Fast Atlantic Service.

Both Contracts Accepted.

OTTAWA, June 17.—At two o'clock this morning the motion that the House of Commons go into committee on the bill to extend the I. C. R. to Montreal was put and carried by a vote of 91 to 47. Two Government supporters voted against the contract, namely, Monette and Angers, and three Opposition members voted for it, namely, Pope, Moore and Poupere. Otherwise it was a straight party vote. The Fast Atlantic mail contract resolutions were afterwards adopted by a vote of 134 to 22. There was much speech-making on both questions.

Toronto Exhibition, 1897.

TORONTO, June 17.—The Exhibition Company have decided to abandon the acrobatic and ballet performance in front of the grand stand this year to substitute a reproduction of the London Jubilee parade.

Behring Sea Commission.

MONTREAL, June 17.—The Behring Sea Commission sat here yesterday and adjourned to meet at Halifax August 25th.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL.

GLASGOW, June 15.—The visiting colonial premiers were tendered a banquet tonight by the municipality. A large and distinguished company was present. Mr. Wilfred Laurier, the Canadian premier, replying to the toast, Our colonial Empire, said: "Proud as I am to be a citizen of the great republic on the banks of the St. Lawrence, I value still more the privilege of being a citizen of the British empire. Today we are colonial; but we aspire to be more and to see removed whatever disparity exists between the people of the home country and the colonial subjects of her majesty."

LONDON, June 16.—The morning papers continue to discuss the annexation of Hawaii to the United States. The Daily Graphic says: "Had England been in the position of the United States she would probably have annexed Hawaii years ago." The Daily Chronicle, whose Washington correspondent gives a forecast of the contents of the annexation treaty, says: "The United States has entered upon the thorny path of colonial expansion. We wish the new experiment, though with some misgivings, all success."

LONDON, June 16.—A despatch to the Daily Mail from Cape Town says that Cecil Rhodes had a narrow escape from death before he left Kimberley for Rhodesia. A fire broke out in his bedroom, but he slept on unaware of it until aroused by the policeman, who broke into the premises. Mr. Rhodes arose and with the utmost coolness, after dressing himself, deliberately assisted to put out the fire.

KINGSTON, Ont., June 15.—Mrs. Sullivan residing on Wellington street, went to a dentist's this morning and had a medical attendant administer chloroform. Before the dentist could operate the woman died.

A PLEA FOR OUR CLERKS.

DEAR SIR,—I understand that market day is to be held on Monday next instead of Tuesday, which is supposed to be a public holiday. I have heard that one of our leading dry goods merchants intends keeping open on Tuesday morning, thereby depriving his clerks (as well as those of all the other dry goods stores) of their right to a public holiday to celebrate the 60th anniversary of Her Majesty the Queen's reign. I think a whole day would not be too much to give us. One merchant keeping open deprives all the clerks in the same line of business from having their holiday. We might get a couple of clerks to go around and get the merchants to sign an agreement to close; but this has been proved useless, as some of them do not consider it binding after having signed their names to that agreement. There will be no more business done that morning than there is on the afternoons of the horse races during exhibition days. On these two days the clerks stand around looking at one another, swearing at fate and the men who deprive them of their rights. We were fortunate enough a few years ago on one exhibition day to see the races, but it was afterwards learned that one of the merchants was open for business that afternoon (the blinds down but the door open) after having signed an agreement to close. Why cannot men in the same line of business pull together? The barbers all agree to close at one o'clock on Monday for a certain season and they keep their agreement. The grocers, merchant tailors, hardware men and watchmakers all have their hours at which they agree to close, and they close at the agreed time. The only merchants who cannot pull together are the dry goods merchants, and the clerks have to suffer. Could you not, Mr. Editor, use your influence in securing for us what we rightly deserve as loyal clerks, viz., a whole holiday? And the dry goods clerks of Charlottetown will be ever grateful to you.

A VOICE FROM MURRAY HARBOR.

SIR,—I would like to ask a few questions through your paper hoping that the mouthpieces of the grit party will answer. When the Liberals gained the day on June last I applied for a place on the dredge through Mr. D. A. McKinnon. As I was always a true Liberal I thought I was entitled to something when they got in power. I was told I would be all right and fully expected to get on through the summer. I did not, however, but I was faithfully promised a position in the spring. I arranged everything to suit but when the crew was called I was left. I at once inquired the reason why. I was told that Davies notified "Mack" that none from his district could get a place. I tried to believe this but found out afterwards that many other applicants were told the same story both by Dr. Robertson and Mack, and again I found that a man from Murray Harbor was put on and I have come to the conclusion that McKinnon, Robertson & Company were fooling us all. If I was told at first that I could not get the position I would push no further. But when I was so faithfully assured that I would get the job, and after arranging my work in accordance with that (and nearly lost a chance of any work for the summer), I must confess that I was more than put out about it, for I don't believe in being fooled in that way. If Davies (when he got his own nest well feathered and is getting between twenty and thirty dollars a day) is so very ungrateful to the electors of the Murray Harbor district, who gave him the first chance to warm a seat in the legislative halls of P. E. Island, that he in answer to McKinnon's plea for a place for one man on the Government steam dredge actually said "no," I must say that he is, to say the least, no man at all. Now, my question is this: Did Mr. Davies really tell McKinnon what he told us applicants, or is McK. trying to get out of a difficult hole at the expense of Mr. Davies? I await a reply and then will have more to say.
