Latest from Montreal. PROJECTED RAILWAYS.

THE QUEBEC LOAN.

Special Dispatch to Daily Examiner.

MONTREAL, Aug. 23.

A new railway running North from Montreal has been opened. It develops a new country in Bagot and La Assumption counties.

A company has been formed in Minnesota to establish railway communication with Manitoba.

The City of Quebec has floated a 5 per cent. loan at 95.

Business is still very quiet throughout the country. Flour dull but steady. The English market is steady. The following are the quotations:—

WAR DISPATCHES.

(Special to the Daily Examiner.)

HALIFAX, August 23.

The Russians report that a battle in Shipka Pass is progressing. The enemy were attacked with fresh troops many times, but were repulsed with heavy Turkish losses.

The German remonstrances against the Turkish atrocities was made at the suggestion of the Emperor. He thought the protest contained no threat. It was, however, very significant.

THE WAR.

LONDON, Aug. 22.

Eighteen thousand Turko-Egyptian troops are attempting to cut the railway between Kustendji and Tchernavoda.

The troops from Silistria are making an attack on Kustendji from the other side. The Turks assaulted and carried the works of the enemy at Shipka, taking possession of the village and pursuing the Russians out of the Pass.

Tirnova is now considered untenable. The Porte has ordered the concentration of fifty thousand militia, of second class, at Adrianople, Sofia and other points near the scene of operation.

The organization of the new Turkish gendarmie by Colonel Valentine Baker has been completed.

LONDON, Aug. 22.

The following official Russian dispatch has been received: "Russian General Headquarters, Gorny Studeni, Aug. 21.—Forty battalions, under Suleiman Pasha, renewed the attack this morning on Shipka Pass, and were repulsed. Fighting continues, although darkness has set in. The enemy advanced simultaneously from Lofcha toward Selvi. Rifle firing began at noon. All points are occupied by our advance guard and the result is unknown."

BERLIN, Aug. 22.

It is officially confirmed that the German Government has taken occasion to remind the Porte of the Genoa Convention, to which it is a party. Germany simultaneously asked other powers whether they would make a similar representation at Constantinople.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 22.

The Governor of Trikala. Thessaly telegraphs, on the 21st, that the Turks have carried by assault some entrenchments erected at Legina by the Greek insurgents. Osman Pasha, under date of the 21st, reports encounters with Russian cavalry at Nereivok, west of Pleyna, and at Antekion, on the road to Oretanie. In both cases the Russians were repulsed.

GENERAL NEWS.

OTTAWA, August 22.

The friends of the Dunkin Act in Toronto, after a gallant struggle of two weeks, have thrown up the sponge and accepted their defeat. For some days past it has been quite evident that they were engaged in a hopeless struggle, the close of the poll every day showing an increasing majority against them. By an arrangement between the parties it appears that an hour was allowed to elapse this morning without a vote being recorded, so that the Mayor could bring the poll to a close. The number at the close were—For the bill, 2943; against, 4095; showing a majority of 1152.

It is now stated that the correct majority for Mr. Langevin was twelve at the last election.

A new stock of war material of the latest pattern is being disembarked at Quebec. New York, Aug. 22.

A Nashville despatch states that Sheriff Myrick, ex-Sheriff Salenger, Charles Gardner and Nat Orrall, well-known citizens, prove to be the assassins who shot the draughter of Anderson some time ago. Anderson had been warned off for some rea-

son, but would not go, and the above parties fired his house at night. The daughter came to the door to get water to extinguish the fire, when she was shot dead on the threshold, and finding that they had shot the girl and not Anderson they kept the matter secret, but a detective unearthed the affair. Orr made confession and they are all under arrest.

S. E. Hardman, of Providence, while testing Kenyon's fire escape which is a coil of wire, fixed to a bedstead in the room and fastened around the body, allowing a person to lower himself out of the window fell to the sidewalk on Broadway, in front of the Astor House, and was instantly killed. The wire broke by abrasion on the edge of the stone window sill. The remains were taken to the police station.

FALL RIVER, Mass., Aug. 22

A jack wheel exploded in Linen mill No. 1, yesterday noon, the fragments tearing through the first story, destroying a spinning frame, passing up to the ceiling of the second story, making a heavy dent. The machinery in the engine-room was slightly injured. The woman attending the spinning frame had just left work. The windows were torn out by the shock and the engine-room was badly wrecked. The damage was about \$6,000.

PARIS, Aug. 22.

Elections for the Councils General will be held in the beginning of November. A sessions of the Councils will be ordered at the end of that month, so that they can apportion among Arrondissements the direct taxes for 1878.

DUBLIN, Aug. 22.

A great meeting was held in the Rotunda, Dublin, last night. Biggar and Parnell were enthusiastically received. Both members strongly condemned the inactivity of the Home Rule party generally. A resolution finally passed that the meeting takes occasion to offer hearty thanks to those Irish representatives who, in honorable contrast to the tame and spiritless conduct of the mass of the Home Rule members, supported Mr. Biggar and Mr. Parnell.
