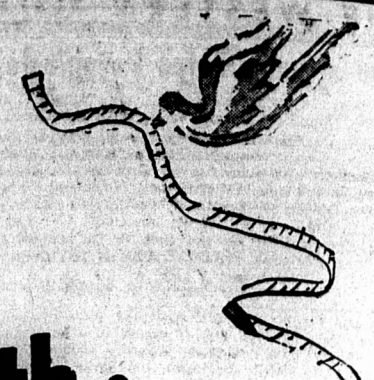

#### See Moscow Losing Ground In West Europe

WASHINGTON, March 5—(AP)—The State Department said today that Moscow is losing its fight to take over Western Europe by "boring from within" and cited figures to back it up. The figures showed a reduction in Communist Party strength in Western European countries ranging from 30 per cent in France to 84 per cent in Luxembourg during the last several years. The department's estimate that the west is winning the battle against Communist subversion in Western Europe, together with the figures, was given by Homer M. Byington, Jr., director of the Office of Western European Affairs. Here are country-by-country Communist Party membership figures assembled by Byington.

Byington said that in 1945 international Communism seemed ready to take over Western Europe but today "we find that the living conditions of the people have greatly improved and that democratic government where it was once weak has been strengthened."

#### Pope Plus X To Be Beatified

VATICAN CITY, March 5—(AP)—Pope Plus X, revered by Roman Catholics for his great humility, will be beatified in the great Basilica of St. Peter June 3. This is usually a step toward elevation to sainthood. He will be the first pope raised to the blessed in 270 years. In 1672 Pius V was beatified by Pope Clement X, and made a saint by Clement in 1712. Formal announcement of a date for the beatification came after the reading Sunday of the decree "In Tuco" in the presence of Pope Pius XII. Pius X was born Giuseppe Melchiorre Sarto in the North Italian province of Treviso, the son of a postman. During his 11-year papal reign from 1903 to 1914 he was

affectionately known by Italians as "Papa Sarto." He was Archbishop of Venice when he was chosen Pontiff. He died in 1914 at the age of 76. Thousands of pilgrims are expected to come to Rome for the beatification. Beatification is a long, detailed process. In 1940 the Congregation of Rites ordered examination of the writings of Pius X—the first step. In June, 1948, it was announced that he was on trial for beatification and his body was placed in the Basilica of St. Peter. Last Sept. 4 the Congregation of Rites took a near final step for beatification—the issuance of a decree approving his heroic virtues. This paved the way for consideration of the miracles attributed to Pius X.
