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**Seek 12 Possible Typhoid Carriers**

CALGARY (CP) — Medical health officials here are trying to locate 12 persons who may be carrying typhoid fever.

Dr. W. H. Hill, medical health officer, said his department has been making extensive checks for the 12 persons since early Thursday.

He said the persons may have brought the disease while on the liner Vulcania which arrived in Halifax Dec. 4.

Several days after the ship reached Halifax three cases of typhoid fever were discovered among passengers he said. Since then five other passengers from the ship have come down with the fever. The five are reported to be living in various parts of Canada.

Dr. Hill said he received word Thursday that 12 persons who were on the Vulcania now are in

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## New York Stock Market Shows Slight Increase For The Week

**FIN NEW YORK STOCK**

**NEW YORK (AP)** — The stock market made some feeble efforts to rise last week but they lacked conviction.

Although the market spent three consecutive days on the upside, the total gain was washed out as of noon Friday; but a slight recovery before the close was enough to put the market barely ahead on the week.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was up 20 cents to \$176.20.

The small gain was insignificant in view of the gradual decline this month of January on Jan. 4. The month of January seems to be paralleling last year's performance when the average of stock prices declined steadily. Historically, January has not been a lively month. Most years the market scrapes its yearly bottom in January.

The five most active stocks on the American Stock Exchange were: Devon-Palmer Oils, up 1-1/4 at 2 on 161,400 shares; Nortspan Uranium, off 1-1/4 at 6 9-16; Swan-Finch Oil, up 3/4 at 3 3/4; Barium Steel, up 1/4 at 11; and White Eagle International, off 1/4 at 2 1/4.

The five most active stocks on the New York Stock Exchange were: U. S. Hoffman Machinery, off 1/4 at 13 1/4 on 163,500 shares; North American Aviation, unchanged at 34 1/4; General Motors, off 1/4 at 40; Atlas Corp., up 1/4 at 11 1/2; and U. S. Steel, off 1/4 at 63 1/4.

Canadian issues generally followed the trend. However, there were exceptions. International Nickel finished the week at 108, up 5, but this was still under the figure of a week earlier. Canadian Pacific closed the week 3/4 lower at 73 1/2. Hudson Bay Mining was up 1/4 at 85.

On the American Stock Exchange, Brazilian 10 closing the week at 8 1/4, had a net gain of 1/4.

The magazine said steel mills operated at 97.5 per cent of capacity during the week ended Jan. 27, down one point from the preceding week. Steel's composite price was unchanged at \$37.98 a net ton. The composite on scrap was \$59.17 a gross ton, down 66 cents.

**Reduced Orders Reported For Steel In The U. S.**

**CLEVELAND (AP)**—Steel Magazine said today this month will be the best January on record for industrial production. But it noted that there is "a reduced rate of ordering" by steel customers.

The trade weekly's production index, based on steel electric power, freight car loadings and auto assemblies, averaged 161.3 each week in January. That compares to 100 for 1947-49. The January index is almost the same as the record peaks in November and December.

The decline in orders for steel is permitting mills to stockpile certain semi-finished materials. The magazine called it a "rolling adjustment," with the demand for some products falling. But some steel products — plates structural shapes, tin plate, oil country tubular goods and large pipe — still are hard to get.

Steel predicted wage increases in the metalworking business will average eight cents an hour this year, one of the highest in five years. It was 8.5 cents in 1955, but only five cents in 1954. Most of the pay increases will come in automatic boosts provided in multi-year contracts, some in cost-of-living adjustments.
